BEAUTIFICATION COMMITTEE MEETNG OCTOBER 17, 2022

CALL TO ORDER

Chair Rahmlow called the meeting to order at 4:01 pm.

ROLL CALL

Executive Assistant Nubia Sanchez conducted roll call; Nelson, Lennox, Ferrer, Alsheimer, Rahmlow present; Prince and Krummrich absent.

APPROVAL OF AGENDA

It was moved by Nelson and seconded by Lennox to approve the agenda as presented. The motion carried 5 to 0; Krummrich and Prince absent; Ferrer, Lennox, Nelson, Rahmlow voting in favor; none opposed.

APPROVAL OF MINTUES

It was moved by Alsheimer and seconded by Nelson to approve the minutes of the October 3, 2022 regular Beautification Committee Meeting as presented. The motion carried 5 to 0; Krummrich and Prince absent; Rahmlow, Ferrer, Lennox, Nelson, Alsheimer voting in favor; none opposed.

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AUDIENCE PARTICIPATION

City Manager participated during the meeting and gave an update of upcoming changes:

- Community Development Department structure and additions from a new facilities manager, and economic development officer. With these changes, there could be coordination of services.
- Also, let the committee know that the City will be looking into getting a RARE volunteer next year. Time line: Apply in April and having the RARE volunteer in September.
- Executive Assistant will be working on bringing back a local government academy where residents will learn what local government does and therefore have more people wanting to volunteer in committees or even run for city council.
- Asked for help regarding potential trashcans for 2nd street. Information attached.

Nelson mentioned 2nd street and what is being done to address it; City Manager mentioned that there are positives and negatives going forward but there is a homelessness meeting happening with several agencies trying to the homelessness on sidewalk on Pentland Street.

COMMITTEE REPORTS

Stop the Drop/All Together The Dalles Monthly Cleanup

Rahmlow volunteered to represent the committee for November and report back. Any question the committee can reach out to Rachel at Columbia Gorge Toyota.

Trees

Ferrer reported that she had not heard back from Hood River or Redmond after two phone call attempts and email. Sanchez offered to follow up with them. Ferrer also mentioned that the Climate Resiliency Committee was interested in hearing back from the Beautifications finding related to trees/shade.

DISCUSSION ITEMS

Community Outreach - small grants for yard upgrade; recognition

Here is a start to a list of resources from other communities who offer mini grants for neighborhood or individual home beatification, improving community spaces, art, landscaping, xeriscaping and lots more.

City of Portland offers mini grants of up to \$5,000 to community organizations for projects that align with the Portland Clean Energy Fund (PCEF) goals of tackling climate change while advancing racial and social justice.

The City of Arvada, CO offers residents two grant opportunities for neighborhood groups: the

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Neighborhood Improvement Grant (up to \$3,000) and Neighborhood Mini-Grants (up to \$100, \$250 and \$500) with the goal of promoting positive neighboring activities and community improvement projects with attention to three focus areas: Connection, Sustainability and Resilience.

Hillsborough County, FL offers neighborhood mini grants of up to \$5,000 based on a set of guidelines. Projects last year included bat houses for mosquito control, digitizing a community newsletter, and replacing thirsty vegetation with xeriscaping.

Mesa, AZ has a <u>Grass-to-Xeriscape</u> and <u>Trees are Cool</u> program to help residents reduce their landscape water use and create shade to adapt to climate change. If residents remove 500 square feet or more of established grass and replace it with a water-thrifty landscape, the city will provide a \$500 incentive. For installing at least one low-water use tree, there is an additional incentive - \$50 for one tree and \$75 to two trees.

Wheeling, WV is offering mini grants to neighborhood groups for improvement projects such as litter removal, beautification with public art created by the community, landscaping, brush removal, cross walk painting, bench installations, vacant lot activation, and green space improvements such as pocket parks.

- Addressing litter issues with the City Council; advocating for more City resources. If there was no private business involvement...imagine....
- POSTCARDS TO RESIDENCES thanking them for their beautification efforts; we have a large supply of cards (we did this project year #1)
- CARDS/CERTIFICATES/AWARDS to BUSINESSES recognizing their beautification
- STOP THE DROPsome kind of effort in the schools. I will be in each elementary school in some capacity.
