Council Chambers, Agenda Item IV-1 - Report on Sitka Street Assessment Bonds per the Advertisement to Bid for General Obligation Improvement Bonds, Series 1982 of the City of Newberg, pursuant to Ordinance No. 2102 which authorized the Sale of General Obligation Bonds in the sum of \$127,664.00 to pay for the Sitka Local

Improvement District Project No. 213.

The bid opening was held at 2:00 p.m., today, October 18, 1982 in the offices of our bond counsel, Harvey Rogers of Ragen/Roberts in Portland. Bids from 3 different banking institutions were received as follows:

- The Oregon Bank for net effective interest rate of 9.1916% at a 2% discount rate.
- 2. First Interstate Bank at a net effective interest rate of 8.9355% at a 2% discount rate.
- 3. U. S. National Bank of Oregon at a net effective interest rate of 8.73434% at a 1.8% discount rate.

Present at the bid opening were our bond counsel, Harvey Rogers of Ragen/Roberts and our bond consultants, Bob Moore and Jim Breithaupt of Moore and Breithaupt, Arvilla Page, City Recorder and Rick Faus, City Attorney. After evaluation of the bids, all of which conformed to the requirements of the bidding documents, it is the recommendation of all that the Council accept the bid of U. S. National Bank of Oregon with the net effective interest rate of 8.73434% at a 1.8% discount, this being the lowest and most favorable interest rate obtainable on our bonds. Attached to this memorandum is the resolution accepting this bid and authorizing sale of bond and copies of the bid documents.

It was the view of all present that the bid of U. S. National Bank was extremely favorable to the City.

#### RESOLUTION NO. 82-955

WHEREAS, the City Council of the City of Newberg met on October 18, 1982 at 5:00 p.m. within four hours of the public opening of said bids; and

WHEREAS, after due consideration, the bid from the United States National Bank of Oregon was the one most favorable to the City.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Council of the City of Newberg as follows, to-wit:

1. The Council awards the bonds to, and accepts the bid from United States National Bank of Oregon in accordance with Ordinance No. 2102 passed and approved September 23, 1982, a copy of which is attached hereto as Exhibit "A".

SUBJECT: PRIMARY DIGESTER REPAIR

Last week when the October 18 special Council meeting was called, we had anticipated the need for a resolution to waive competitive bidding for the digester repair as the material and labor to restore the broken piping exceeded the \$2,000 limit for purchase orders.

The plant personnel have spent the latter portion of last week raising the piping to its original location in anticipation of the repair work. This was the portion of the labor that the metal fabricator was uncertain about the actual amount of labor involved.

Dawn Metal Fab was back out this morning to look the repairs over and submit a revised price for the repairs. In view of the labor that was performed by the plant personnel, it is now anticipated that approximately \$1,800 for material is needed, and approximately \$800 for labor to restore the piping to operable condition. The previous quotation was approximately \$1,600 for material and \$3,000 for labor. An alternate quotation was received from Harter Mechanical of Portland for approximately \$6,500. Both metal fabricators were only willing to perform the work on a time and materials/not to exceed basis.

Dawn Metal Fab has also advised us that he has to purchase the stainless steel material for the repairs on a C.O.D. basis and wanted a cash advance for the material. In view of this procedure, it is prudent that the City issue a purchase order directly to the stainless steel supplier for the materials, and issue Dawn Metal Fab a purchase order for the labor to weld up the material and repair piping. This would then eliminate the need for a resolution to waive competitive bidding in that both purchase orders would be less than the \$2,000 amount.

As you are aware, we are essentially in an emergency condition in that we have not been completely digesting our sludge now for several weeks, and are continuing to dispose of partially digested sludge on farm land which must be incorporated into the soil within 24 hours by the farm manager. It is essential that we proceed as hastily as possible with the repairs so that we not only accommodate the farm manager in his planting operation, but also restore the sludge digestion cycle so that we can meet our DEQ permit requirement. Proceding with the two purchase orders will allow the material to be purchased today, and the repairs begun as soon as possible.

Motion: Halstead-Rementeria to approve the Consent Calendar as follows: 1. Approve minutes from the following meetings: September 7, September 23 and September 24, 1982.

- 2. Communication from Leonard Rydell regarding video game amusement tax.
- 3. A communication from the Newberg Chamber of Commerce President requesting City to proceed with development of the new Sewage Treatment Plant.

Motion carried unanimously.

#### Requests from the Floor and Communications:

Jerry Rutschman, 2902 E. Second stated he would like to begin a taxi service in Newberg. He has completed the applications and has applied for home occupation approval with Planning Department. He stated he would like to go into business as soon as possible.

The City Administrator stated that no background check had been done yet so that staff could not make a recommendation. The application should be reviewed by the Police Chief, the City Attorney and the City Administrator.

Mr. Rutschman asked that the Council approve his application conditionally then have the staff approve. He would then be ready to go before the next Council meeting in November.

The Planning Director stated that it would take three or four days to review and approve or deny the home occupation application.

Mr. Rutschman was questioned by Councilmembers and staff regarding

who would do the actual taxi cab driving, what kind of vehicle would be used, whether he had checked with the Mobile Home Park owner regarding an occupation within one of the mobile homes, whether his dispatching unit would interfere with TV and radio reception, and the rate structure. Mr. Rutschman responded to all the questions and stated that the rates now in the ordinance were acceptable to him.

Motion: Gano-Halstead to approve the request for the taxi franchise subject to final approval by the City Administrator, City Attorney and the Police Chief. Carried unanimously.

Stewart Low, Rt. 2, Box 93 stated he wished to speak regarding the sidewalk required by the City of the First Presbyterian Church. He stated they had received a letter dated October 1, 1982 from the Public Works Director. Several items in the letter were contrary to their understanding of the action taken at the last Council meeting. He asked that the Council arrange a meeting with Church representatives to clarify the conditions.

The Public Works Director stated that the matter was discussed at the Public Works Committee meeting and the proposed ordinance change is to mandate that sidewalks be constructed as required in the ordinance regarding the 99W sidewalks. Completion of the sidewalk on the parking lot will be required of the Church when \_\_\_\_ Mission Street is extended, when sidewalk enforcement is made on 99W or when the Church does any construction of any value.

Mr. Low stated they still would like to have a meeting with a committee of the Council to review the proposed ordinance. The Mayor stated there would be a Public Works meeting on October 19, 1982 at 7 a.m.

Appointments by the Mayor. The Mayor made the following appointments: For the George Layman Award Committee: Councilman Richard Rementeria, City Administrator Mike Warren, and himself.

As delegates to the National League of Cities Convention in Los Angeles Councilman Roger Gano and himself.

Communication has been received from the Uptown Merchants regarding parking time limit on First Street. The City Administrator stated that parking enforcement is primarily for the merchants benefit. Time limits should be determined as desired by the Merchants. He stated he would recommend that the Council work with the Chamber of Commerce and let them do the leg work to determine what the merchants want. It should also be determined what it will cost to change the signs if the time limits are changed.

A communication from Delores Hamilton has been received regarding long distance telephone rates in Newberg.

Mrs. Hamilton was present and stated that there needs to be a petition of the people to initiate action so that Newberg residents can call Portland toll free.

Mike Fagan, Newberg Graphic Reporter, stated that the Public Utility Commissioner will send out ballots through the mail to determine peoples desires.

It was recommended that the City Administrator write to the Public Utility Commissioner to determine procedures for initiating action and send a copy of the letter to the Phone Company.

## Reports from the City Administrator.

Mr. Warren stated the Newberg Centennial Redevelopment Commission has been meeting weekly, they have adopted eight goals. The Civic Center and Traffic Rerouting Committees have provided input to the Redevelopment Committee. At the present time a survey is being done.

Mr. Warren stated that George Layman had saved two stained glass signs which used to be at the entrances to the City. Several months ago he turned these over to the City. One sign has been hung over the main entrance to the City Hall. The other sign was in very poor condition. Councilmembers Tucker and Halstead have repaired the second sign and it is now ready to be put into use. The Librarian has suggested that the second sign be hung over the circulation desk in the Library.

Mr. Warren stated a report has been received of a violation to the DEQ standards at the Sewage Treatment Plant. DEQ is working with the City to resolve the problem. So far, the City has not been able to determine the source of the excess BOD.

Mr. Warren reported on the results of the September 24, 1982 City Council meeting. The meeting was an emergency meeting called to award a contract for cleaning the sludge from the Sewage Digester at the Treatment Plant.

Mr. Sanders reported that the contractor had stated that they would be able to clear it in three days. The City crews were making little headway on the problem at the time. The contract was awarded and the contractor spent seven days instead of his estimate of three. The material was extremely heavy. The contractor stuck by his bid and did not ask for additional compensation. It was a tremendous savings in staff time to have it contracted. When the sludge was removed, it was found that pipes and a rack supporting the pipes had broken away from the wall. Bids will now be called for to repair the damage.

The Council recommended that a letter of appreciation signed by the Mayor be sent to the contractor on the project.

Mr. Warren reported on Ballot Measure 3 which will be on the November 2 Election. He stated that the measure would mean a 25% loss of General Fund Revenues. In addition, it takes away local control of the Budget process and destroys the democratic process. The City would not be able to issue General Obligation Bonds as repayment would have to come out of the tax limitation.

Motion: Gano-Halstead that the Council go on record opposing Ballot Measure 3 and appeal to the citizens to support local government. Motion carried unanimously.

Mr. Warren stated that he would be out of town from October 16 through October 21.  $\_$ 

Police Chief Hawkins reported that Captain Larry Hailey of the Police Department will be gone for three months to the FBI Academy at Quantico, Virginia. An application to the Academy was filed two years ago. Applicants must meet certain standards and be selected by the FBI Director.

Mr. Warren stated he had gone to Seattle and met with two firms that specialize in feasibility studies for motels and hotels. He and Ed Lee of the Meyers Financial Group met with the applicants who were Laventhol and Horwath and Pennell, Kerr, Forester. Both are well known CPA firms that specialize in financial and feasibility studies. Mr. Lee and he both agreed that Laventhol and Horwath would best meet our needs. Mr. Warren pointed out that the completed feasibility study would be owned by the City and not by any particular hotel/motel that wished to locate here.

Motion: Gano-DeMay to approve Laventhol and Horwath for the feasibility study and that a resolution be prepared to that effect if required. Carried unanimously.

Mr. Warren stated that the City Attorney has recommended that in the City Charter revision one portion that was deleted should not be deleted upon further review and consideration. The change is in old section 23 and new section 24 of the Charter. The words deleted were "and of all actions brought to recover or enforce forfeitures for penalties defined or authorized by an ordinance of the City." The City Attorney states that he believes retaining the ability to enforce forfeitures for penalties for civil violations is important and that the section should not have been deleted.

Motion: Grobey-DeMay to approve the recommended Charter change.
Carried unanimously.

A letter has been prepared and addressed to U.S. Senator Robert Packwood and U.S. Senator Mark Hatfield opposing Senate Bill 2172 sponsored by Senator Barry Goldwater. This Senate Bill affects the relationship between local government and cable television companies. It removes control of cable television from State and Local Governments and gives it to the Federal Government. The letter is to be signed by the Mayor and all members of the Council.

Motion: Grobey-Halstead to approve the letter and that a copy of the letter be sent to Senator Barry Goldwater. Carried unanimously.

Application from Shaw's Restaurant, 1819 Portland Road, liquor license change to include the cook's name as one of the applicants along with Indetti Shaw and Aloha Chandler. Police Chief Hawkins stated that they have had no problems with Shaw's and would recommend granting the application.

Motion: Gano-Grobey to approve the liquor license application for Carried unanimously.

Motion: Gano-Grobey to approve the September 1982 accounts payable. Carried unanimously.

Mayor Hall called the Council into Executive Session under the rules

of ORS 192.660 (1) (a) relating to employment of public officer or employee. All members of the public and staff not required were excused. The press was informed that they could stay but could not report on any matters discussed.

All members of the Council as previously noted were present. Also present were Michael Warren, City Administrator and Arvilla Page, City Recorder.

The Council and City Administrator discussed the staffing level in the Building Department. Building permit revenue is still down and there is little prospect that it will improve.

The Council instructed the City Administrator to take into consideration the needs of the individual employees affected and also the best interest of the City.

Regular session of the Council was called back to order and Executive Session adjourned.

Basically he has said that a carsis going to be required sometime in the future if we do not buy it now: We do have the money in the budget and bids have come in under the \$7,000 budgeted amount (with trade-in). The car we would buy would be more efficient in gas mileage and certainly in upkeep than the one we have now.

If cutbacks are made because of Ballot Measure 3 passage then we will be relying more and more on our equipment and less on manpower. This should be part of the City Council's consideration in determining whether or not to purchase this automobile.

SUBJECT: DIGESTER REPAIR AT THE SEWER TREATMENT PLANT

We have contacted two contractors to perform the repair work on the digester. Don's Metal Fab of Newberg was the contractor that installed the original equipment, and has advised us that there will be approximately \$1,600 worth of material, and the labor for the repair is too difficult for them to give us a fixed price bid on it. Don's Metal Fab will only do the repair work on a time and materials basis. The second contractor, Harder Mechanical of Portland has been contacted for a bid. Harder Mechanical will give us a bid, however, they would prefer not to do a small job like this, and have recommended that we get a local metal fabricator to do the job. This is the same comment we received from Harder Mechanical when the original equipment was installed three years ago.

As a means of expediting the repair in light of the emergency situation to get the digester back into operation as quickly as possible. I would like to have you include on the October 18 Special Council Meeting agenda an item to consider a resolution to waive competitive bidding on the digester repair.

We should be able to obtain a proposal from Don's Metal Fab and possibly one from Harder Mechanical by Friday so that Monday a resolution can be prepared for consideration at the 5:00 Council Meeting. The contract will be a time and materials not to exceed contract.
