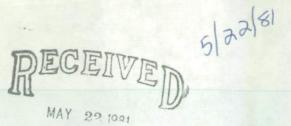

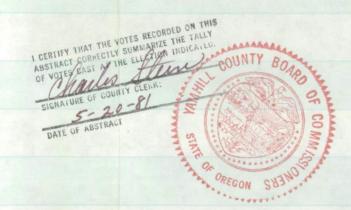

A REGULAR MEETING OF THE CITY COUNCIL

The meeting was called to order by Mayor Elvern Hall.

Minutes of the previous meeting should be corrected to show that Mayor Elvern Hall was absent March 2 and also March 31. In addition, correction of the March 2, 1981 minutes on page 5 should delete the beginning of paragraph 5 - Mr. Moorhead had no right. Add to the end of paragraph 4 - Mr. Moorhead stated the applicant had no right to extension or new issue. Minutes of the previous meetings were then approved as corrected.

There were no requests for petitions from the floor.

Peggy Campbell, 911 E. Third, Chairman of Tree People, stated the group originated from the Town Hall meetings last fall with the goal to improve the downtown area. They plan to install street trees. Several businesses and organizations have volunteered labor and services. Park and Recreation will service the trees but cannot take care of the watering of the trees. At this point, the watering problem is unresolved. She stated she asked to address the Council so that Council would be informed of what they were doing.

Request by Mrs. Claudine Word for a water hookup. Mr. Warren stated that the City now has water available where previously they had a shortage. The Council should consider and set the policy on new hookup requests outside the City Limits.

The Public Works Director stated there is a hardship ordinance but the ordinance does not define hardship. It is difficult to determine who qualifies when they request hookups outside the City Limits.

Mayor Hall stated that he was present at the time the original ordinance restricting water hookups was enacted. He stated he felt a need to wait to change the ordinance until the people inside the City have been shown that the water supply is now abundant. Mr. Grobey stated that each case should be reviewed by its merits.

Claudine Word, Rt. 1, Box 223A, Newberg, Oregon, stated that her property is located outside the Urban Growth Boundary. The Public Works Director also advised that each case should be investigated and an appropriate development fee charged for any hookups outside the City Limits.

Mr. Tucker, now present at 8:00 P.M.

Mr. Sanders, Public Works Director, continued that the people benefitted should assist with a share of the City residents cost and also should allow only existing homes with existing problems.

Motion: Gano-DeMay that the City Attorney and City Administrator draft appropriate legislation to grant water hookup outside the Urban Growth Boundary but not until October, 1981 to allow the citizens to know that sufficient water is available to allow the hookups. Motion carried unanimously.

Request from Home Builders Association of Metro Portland urging the City to support the President's economic recovery program. A suggested resolution was read. Motion: Grobey-Tucker that staff draft a resolution in support of the President's economic recovery program. Carried unanimously.

Public Hearing: Continuation of public hearing on the Comprehensive Plan.

Mr. Tucker stated he has property involved. Mr. Gano he has property adjacent. Mr. Grobey stated he had property involved. Each stated they did not wish to abstain.

Diane Canfield, 115 E. Illinois, representing the area residents presented three petitions. Petitions number 1 with 64 names was opposing zone changing on the area, north of the drainage dip, west of Main, south of Columbia. Number 2 with 75 names north of Illinois, east of Main, west of College, south of the drainage dip. Number 3 with 63 names north of Illinois, west of Main, south of the drainage dip. Reasons stated for opposition were property tax increase, increased traffic flow, noise, overcrowded schools, disruption of the family unit with example of contrasting life styles with contemporary dwellers.

Donald King, Rt. 2, Box 59B, stated he was opposed to changing the area north of Mountain View in the Springbrook area.

Robert Hill, 214 W. Fifth Street, presented a petition with 34 names from the Fifth Street area at Lincoln and Grant. The petition stated the change would be detrimental to the stable character of the neighborhood.

Lucille Adams, 1404 Hoskins stated she was opposed to changing the area north of Mountain View. The view of the mountains needs to be maintained for the current residents.

Jan Johnson, Rt. 2, Box 40B, located just off Zimrye Drive opposed changing the area north of Mountain View. Changing to higher density would disturb the character of the area.

Judy Brunner, 413 W. Fifth Street stated she favors the upzoning in the Fifth Street area. She had been trying to get the street paved in the area. The area has been zoned R-2 for years. Just recently it was rezoned to R-1. The City is on top of inspections and higher density would not impact the area.

Judy Welter, who lives on Zimrye Drive stated she was very opposed, and would be looking into backyards. The street would need to be widened and the speed limit is needed now.

Terry Mahr, attorney, 115 N. Washington, stated he represented property owner, C.R. Moe, in the area north of Mountain View. Higher density is desirable, as it would act as a buffer between the industrial and the lower density residential areas.

Mrs. Fern Roberts, 2514 Roberts Lane, stated no buffer zone is needed. Industry is nicely landscaped. An example of poor apartment complexes would be those now located on Springbrook Street.

Letters were received from Dale and Deborah Fessenden, 110 W. Fifth opposing upzoning on W. Fifth and from Lucille Adams opposing upzoning north of Mountain View and west of Zimrye Drive.

Public hearing closed. Mr. Warren stated that the Council must comply with the LCDC. The people voted for LCDC. If the Council removes any of the areas recommended by the Planning Commission and the CIAC, they must add areas equal.

The Planner stated the Council must act tonight.

Mayor Hall stated that the original Comprehensive Plan of Newberg was meant to be just a guideline. The Baker Milwaukie decision made it law. The majority of the voters of Newberg have voted in favor of land use planning.

City Planner, Clay Moorhead, then described the areas recommended by the Planning Commission and the CIAC and pointed them out on the map.

Motion: Halstead-Gano to read Ordinance No. 2049 amending Ordinance No. 1967 which adopted the Newberg Comprehensive Plan; amending Ordinance No. 1968, the Newberg Zoning Ordinance; repealing Ordinance No. 2011 which amended Ordinance No. 1967 to revise the Inventory of Natural and Cultural Resources adopted in Ordinance No. 1967; to revise the Newberg Comprehensive Plan and Newberg Comprehensive Plan Designation Map adopted by Section 2 of Ordinance No. 1967; to revise Sections 552, 554, 562 and 564 of Ordinance No. 1968 and the Newberg Zoning Map adopted by Section 900 of Ordinance No. 1968; and to repeal all of Ordinance No. 2011 all amendments being required for compliance with the Oregon Statewide Land Conservation and Development Commission goals for acknowledgment of the Newberg Comprehensive Plan. Motion Carried. The ordinance was then read for 2 hours and 15 minutes.

Motion: Gano-Grobey to delete the upzoning to R-2 of that area south of Second Street and west of Blaine Street and to substitute 9 acres west of Airpark and 10 acres north of Columbia Drive. Aye 6. Nay 2 - Halstead, McIntosh. Motion carried.

Motion: McIntosh-Rementeria to delete that area north of Illinois Street totally 11.2 acres and substitute the area on west Main Street north of Newberg Garbage Service.

Motion amendment: Gano-Rementeria to add just that area south of Pinehurst. Amendment to motion carried unanimously. Original motion as amended carried with Grobey nay, Tucker abstaining. Roll Call on the Ordinance as amended: Aye - 8, DeMay, Gano, Grobey, Halstead, McIntosh, Probst, Rementeria, Tucker. Nay - 0. Absent - 0. The Mayor then declared the Ordinance passed.

Motion: Halstead-McIntosh that City Attorney and others begin immediately to update and amend Charter and Ordinances specifically that portion of the Charter which requires reading of all ordinances in full. Motion amendment: Grobey-DeMay to form

a charter committee consisting of members of the City Staff, Council Members and citizens at large to update the Charter. Carried 1-Nay, Halstead. Original motion carried unanimously.

<u>Public Hearing</u>: Requesting of Comprehensive Plan Amendment from Lee W. Anderson was postponed to the May meeting.

Mayor Hall reported on the Mayor's Task Force which is composed of a broad selection of citizens. The Task Force was the result of the Town Hall meetings last fall.

Resolution 81-886 creating the Mayor's Task Force was read. The Mayor added the names of 10 members selected. Motion: Gano-McIntosh to adopt the resolution. Carried unanimously.

New Business:

Bids for carpeting in the hospital. Bids were requested and 2 bids were received. Johnson's at \$18,920. and Wallace at \$16,345. The Hospital Board recommends accepting the Wallace bid of \$16,345. Motion: Halstead-Gano to accept the bid of Wallace Floor Covering as recommended by the Hospital Board. Carried unanimously.

Bids were requested for Opthalmic microscope. 4 bids were received. The low bidder was Storz Company for an Olympus Operating Microscope at \$11,800. This item did not meet the specifications. The Hospital Board of Commissioners recommends the bid of Bartell and Stout for a Zeiss Operating Microscope at \$14,739. Motion: Gano-McIntosh to accept the recommendation of the Hospital Board and award the bid for the Opthalmic Microscope to Bartell and Stout. Carried unanimously.

Motion: Gano-Halstead to approve the March accounts payable. Carried unanimously.

Mrs. Steve Watt, 104 Pinehurst Drive, who had presented petitions from property owners in the Illinois and North Main area stated she opposed the manner in which the Council abruptly changed the areas to be rezoned.

Mr. Warren presented his report on "B" Ballot items listing some items which could probably be included in the "B" Ballot. Items were from nearly every department in the General Fund. The listing is still short \$74,000. He asked for suggestions from the Council members and also for ideas for the future if the "B" Ballot fails.

Resolution 81-887 placing before the voters tax levy for "A" Ballot of \$376,612. and a "B" Ballot of \$394,537. was read. Motion: Gano-DeMay to amend the ballot title to read under the "A" and "B" Ballots and to change the wording in the "B" Ballot explanation to read near the bottom, it will represent a 30¢ increase of the General Fund tax rate levied in 1975-1976, the highest tax previously levied. Carried unanimously. Motion: Gano-Halstead to adopt the amended resolution.

Resolution 81-888 placing before the voters a second "B" Ballot for street improvement purposes. It was read. Motion: Halstead-DeMay to adopt the resolution on the second "B" Ballot. Carried unanimously.

The Mayor adjourned the Council meeting to an executive session under ORS 192.660. The purpose of the executive meeting was to discuss labor negotiations. All members of the Council were present. Press, public and members of the staff not required at the meeting were excused.

Council meeting called back to order. The Mayor assigned member Harold Grobey as co-chairman of the Finance Committee and as a member of the Public Safety Committee.

He appointed Richard Rementeria as chairman of the Finance Committee.

Motion: Halstead-Tucker to adjourn to April 13, 1981.

Requests from the floor.

Sally Marshall, 200 Pinehurst Drive, representing people at Pinehurst and Main Street regarding the area upzone south of Pinehurst. She read a letter into the record dated April 11, 1981 which objected to the upzoning of the area north of Illinois, south of Columbia, east and west of Main that is located south of Pinehurst. Also presented the petition bearing 36 signatures from area residents. The method in which this area was upzoned was also objected to. Motion: Probst-Grobey to reconsider the upzoning of the area west and east of Main, south of Pinehurst. Carried unanimously.

Mr. Moorhead stated that if in the first motion of the Council on April 6th, upzoning properties, they recommended 9 acres east of Airpark. The nine acre parcel was actually about 18 acres. Therefore, they have excess properties upzoned by approximately 9 acres.

Motion: Gano-Grobey to amend the McIntosh-Rementeria motion upzoning property on April 6, 1981 and delete any mention of upzoning on North Main, south of Pinehurst. Motion carried with Tucker abstaining.

Mr. Warren reported on a letter received from the Chehalem Valley Heritage. Suggest that the City of Newberg start now to make plans for observing its 100th anniversary in 1989. Newberg became a town in 1889 and was incorporated as a City in 1893. Mr. Stanley presented a calendar of goals which included sewer improvement, new city hall, and other items.

Motion: DeMay-Tucker that the City Administrator accept the proposal for the centennial and thank the Chehalem Valley Heritage for their interest.

Motion: DeMay-Halstead that Mr. Warren address the letter to the Tree People that the City approves of their objectives and encourages continuation of their plans to improve the appearance of the downtown area. Carried unanimously.

Mr. Warren reported on the status of revenue sharing funds the City receives and other federal grants and funding the City possibly could receive. The only federal funds now received by the City are the Federal Revenue Sharing Funds. sources.

Mr. Warren called the Council's attention to an article taken out of Public Management Magazine, February, 1981 issue outlining some innovative revenue

Mr. Warren reported on the property insurance. The City's property insurance policies expired March 31, 1981. The League of Oregon Cities is now forming a pool to insure property for cities which will mean a substantial savings for the City. The City's property insurance has been extended for a short time until the League insurance is available. The next step in saving on insurance costs would be self-insured.

Motion: Gano-Halstead to pool with the League of Oregon Cities to obtain the same property insurance for approximately \$2,798.00. Carried unanimously.

New Business:

Mr. Warren reported on the Mayor's Task Force with a suggestion for 10 goals: 1) Current and future neighborhood beautification; 2) Rerouting of traffic around the downtown area; the traffic plan; 3) Downtown beautification and reconstruction; 4) Improved sewer plant; 5) That the City have a theme, suggested was the old fashioned bike as used by the Old Fashioned Days Committee; 6) New civic center; 7) An improved economic base; 8) A new tax base for the City; 9) Community involvement; 10) Have a volunteer awareness month where volunteers for different departments in the City are recognized for their contributions.

Mr. Warren presented a letter that will be printed responding to comments he has heard on the 1981-1982 proposed budget to date.

A hearing at the Capitol on post review by Land Conservation and Development Commission was announced. Mr. Stu Harris, 1209 N. Springbrook objected to the Council's negative views of LCDC.

Publicizing of the 1981-1982 budget was discussed with various Council members designating which organizations they would contact.

Resolution 81-889 supporting President Reagan's economic program was read. Motion: Tucker-Rementeria to adopt the Resolution. Carried 1 nay - Halstead. Motion: Rementeria-Grobey that a copy of the resolution be sent to State and Federal legislators and to the Home Builders Association. Carried with one nay - Halstead.

Motion: Gano-Halstead to read Ordinance No. 2050 declaring Cities election to receive state revenues. Motion carried. The ordinance was then read. Roll Call: Aye - 8, DeMay, Gano, Grobey, Halstead, McIntosh, Probst, Rementeria, Tucker. Nay 0. The Mayor then declared the ordinance passed.

Motion: DeMay-Gano to read Ordinance No. 2051 amending Ordinance No. 1740. Carried with one nay - Tucker. The ordinance was then read. The Council discussed that section of the ordinance concerning charges for storm sewer fees. Motion: Halstead to return the ordinance to committee. Aye 1 - Halstead. 7 nays. failed. Motion: Grobey-Gano to amend section 11B to read as follows: In addition to the foregoing charges there shall be added a development charge for storm sewers

to be computed at a rate of ½ cent per square foot for all new buildings plus ½ cent per square foot of the total land area not to exceed 25,000 square feet provided that alterations which do not increase the floor area of the structure are exempt. Motion carried. Roll call on the amended ordinance: Aye - 8, DeMay, Gano, Grobey, Halstead, McIntosh, Probst, Rementeria, Tucker. Nay 0. The Mayor then declared the ordinance passed.

The Mayor appointed the following people to committees and commissions: Scott Canfield - Citizens Involvement Advisory Committee; John Poet - Planning Commission; Arthur Heem, Sr. -- Traffic Safety Commission. Motion: Gano-DeMay to approve the Mayor's appointments. 1 Nay - Rementeria. Motion passed.

Motion: Probst-Gano to adjourn. Carried unanimously.

The City's property insurance has been extended for a short time until the League insurance is available. The next step in saving on insurance costs would be self-insured. Motion: Gano-Halstead to pool with the League of Oregon Cities to obtain the same property insurance for approximately \$2,798.00. Carried unanimously. New Business: Mr. Warren reported on the Mayor's Task Force with a suggestion for 10 goals: 1) Current and future neighborhood beautification; 2) Rerouting of traffic around the downtown area; the traffic plan; 3) Downtown beautification and reconstruction; 4) Improved sewer plant; 5) That the City have a theme, suggested was the old fashioned bike as used by the Old Fashioned Days Committee; 6) New civic center; 7) An improved economic base; 8) A new tax base for the City; 9) Community involvement; 10) Have a volunteer awareness month where volunteers for different departments in the City are recognized for their contributions. Attached is a memorandum from the Public Works Director and a proposed Ordinance from the Tree People. The Public Works Director Planning Director and myself have been working diligently with the Tree People in order to resolve the questions of who will own the trees, who will maintain the trees, who will water the trees, who is liable for the trees, what street trees are acceptable for Newberg, etc.

I believe that a good street ordinance is necessary for the City of Newberg and I feel that with the enthusiasm behind the Tree People we can capitalize on placing some trees in the downtown area. I do not feel comfortable with the ordinance at this time and would like to have another month before coming back to the City Council with something that we have worked out amongst the staff and also run by the Tree People.

In the mean time the Tree People, who will be here tonight, would like to propose placing four street trees in the downtown area. I feel that this would be a good idea in that it would give us a chance and see how the trees are accepted, how they look and how the watering will be done. However, as I stipulated to the Tree People individually, it must be under the understanding that if the City is to own trees and be responsible for them then the future of the four trees will be in accordance with an ordinance that will be devised in the future.

RE: Street Tree Species

I have reviewed the 6 proposed species of street trees with the City Forester in Portland.

Only two of the proposed trees appear to be acceptable; the weeping cherry and the Japanese red pine. The others are all large trees and will need to be replaced in a very short time as they become root bound.

Since the City will eventually be responsible for the trees, I feel that the species selected should offer a long life, hence releasing the City of the task of replacing the trees in 2-5 years.

The following list of trees would be more appropriate for our situation.

- 1. Columbia Queen Mt. Ash
- 2. Autumnalis Cherry
- 3. Prunus Padus Alberti (Cherry)
- 4. Prunus Padus Berg (Cherry)
- 5. Columnar Siberian Crab
- 6. Profusion Crab
- 7. Pyramidal Hawthorne
- 8. Pyramidal European Hornbeam
- 9. Chanticleer Flowering Pear
- 10. Pissardi Plum
- 11. Thundercloud Plum
- 12. Krauter's Vesuvius Plum

As I mentioned to you I would suggest we prepare an ordinance which deals with the regulation of care, placement and replacement of trees over the long term with special attention to trees that will be added in the future.

An Ordinance for establishing a procedure for the placement and replacement of containers and trees in the downtown area.

Whereas, the City of Newberg is undertaking a street beautification program in the downtown area of Newberg. The trees and containers were contributed by various organizations of the City, and, therefore, a policy should be adopted to provide funds to pay for the removal of existing trees and to purchase and install replacement trees; now, therefore,

The City of Newberg ordains as follows:

Section 1. Placement and Maintenance

- (a) Containers shall be located at sites approved by the City with concurrance of the property owners.
- (b) Annual pruning maintenance of the trees shall be performed by the Chehalem Park & Recreation District.

Section 2. Construction Activities

- a) Property owners who are building, remodeling, or conducting other activities on their property which would require the relocation of containers either temporarily or permanently shall pay the cost of removal, and all related labor costs.
 - (1) Any tree costs resulting from City activities that damage, destroy, or cause the relocation of trees shall be paid by the City.

Section 3. Tree and Container Damage

- (a) Any individual who intentionally or accidentally damages or destroys a tree or container shall be liable for the repair or replacement of such containers or tree.
- (b) The value of the container shall be the actual repair or replacement value of a like container and all related labor costs associated with removal and replacement.
- (c) The value of the trees shall be established by reference to the guidelines established by the International Shade

Tree Conference, Inc. The Public Works Director will make the appraisal. Value shall be the replacement cost of the tree at the date of its destruction. Whether or not a mature replacement tree of the same age and size as the destroyed tree is available shall have no bearing on the appraisal.

(d) The decision of the Public Works Director as to the kind, size, and location of the replacement tree or container and all costs incurred in the removal and replacement, including labor expenses, based upon the time required to complete the work is final unless appealed through the City Administrator to the Council within 30 days.

Thank you for your assistance in helping to clear the confusion regarding the Dayton Avenue Bikeway project. It appears that there has been some misunderstanding or at least problems with communication between the County staff and some of the property owners. I can readily appreciate Mr. Gano's concerns and feel that those expressed by him in his representation of the property owners can effectively be resolved.

To that end perhaps a meeting with the City Council would prove beneficial to help clear the air. We plan to continue our negotiations with Mr. Waide and to try and clarify the easement situation with he and his wife.

I hope that the City can appreciate the counties need to resolve these difficulties as soon as possible, in order that we may proceed with the project in a timely manner.

We are at the point where I need to discuss the various problems and opportunities with the Board of Commissioners. 1. <u>Vacation of a portion of Franklin Street</u>. As can be seen from the attached map, the portion of Franklin Street proposed for vacation does not serve any useful purpose. In fact, it appears that there is an existing residential structure which is partially built within this area. No objections were received from any of the affected utilities or the Southern Pacific Transportation Co. Staff recommends that the Council approve the subject vacation.

- 2. PUD-1-81/Free Methodist Church. The primary hearing authority for reviewing planned unit developments is the Planning Commission. On April 21, 1981 the Newberg Planning Commission did review the request by the Free Methodist Church for a planned unit development on an 8+ acre parcel. At that time the Planning Commission found that the planned unit development is consistent with the City ordinances and policies. Planning Commission approved the planned unit development subject to the adoption of this ordinance by the City Council. The findings for approval and conditions relating to the planned unit development are attached. The primary reason why this matter comes before the Council is that a PUD is defined as a sub-district within our Zoning Ordinance, the symbols of which must be indicated upon the Zoning Map. To alter the Zoning Map in order to place a PUD sub-district upon it requires adoption of an ordinance by the Newberg City Council. Again, the Planning Commission has recommended approval of the project as proposed with the inclusion of the attached conditions.
- 3. Design Review. On April 21, 1981 the Newberg Planning Commission reviewed a proposed ordinance relating to Design Review. After a lengthy discussion relating to this matter, input from the staff and interested persons from the audience, the Planning Commission went into deliberation. At that time only 6 members of the 9 member Commission were present. As can be seen from the minutes relating to this meeting, several motions were made relating to the approval or denial of the ordinance. The final motion of the Commission was a motion to approve the ordinance which ended up in a tie vote. A tie vote in this type of procedure would mean that the motion has failed, and therefore, no formal recommendation has thus been made from the Planning Commission to the Council on this matter. Through the hearing process it also became apparent that there is a desire and a need to further determine the attitudes of the Newberg area residents relating to this matter. In addition, examples should be prepared on what the ordinance is proposed to accomplish versus what our existing ordinances can require presently. For these reasons staff would recommend that this matter be tabled until further study can be completed relating to the ordinance.

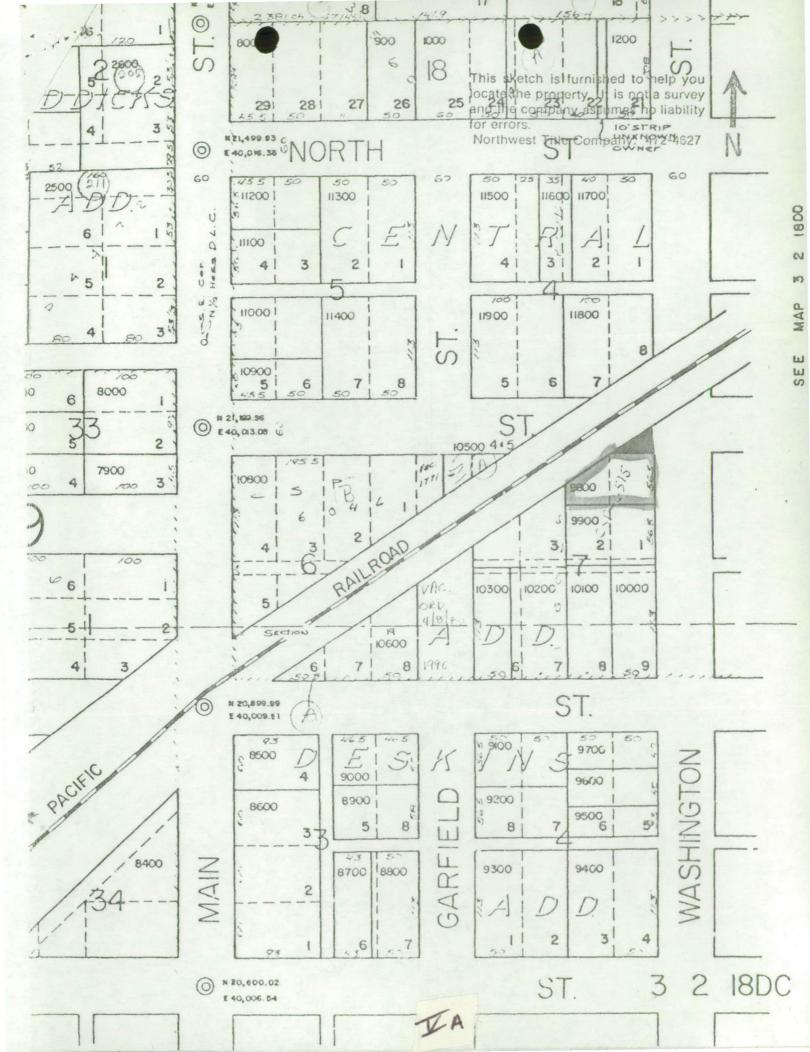

FINDINGS:

- 1. The subject property carries a Newberg Comprehensive Plan designation of medium density residential and is implemented by the R-2 (medium density residential) zoning district. The subject property contains approximately 8 acres. The applicant's are proposing to create a 62 lot subdivision/pud for elderly residents.
- 2. The Newberg Zoning Ordinance permits planned unit developments as an outright permitted use within the R-2 (medium density residential) zone. The planned unit development ordinance would permit 310 density points per gross acre within the development. Under the planned unit development process the maximum number of density points that could be used on the site would be 2480. The applicant's have indicated on Page 6 of their narrative that they are proposing 8 one bedroom units, 36 two bedroom units and 18 three bedroom units. The applicants have demonstrated that the proposed development falls within the density points as permitted within the PUD ordinance. In total the applicants are proposing to utilize 1372 density points which is slightly more than half of the permitted density within the proposed development using this process.
- 3. The primary purpose why the applicants are utilizing less density than what is permitted is because all the units are proposed to be single story structures which places limitations upon the site using the standard lot and building coverage requirements.
- 4. The applicants have indicated that the development will conform to the lot and building coverage requirements of the Newberg Zoning Ordinance. This is found on page 7 of their narrative and conforms to the lot, parking and outdoor living area coverage requirements, section 496 of the Newberg Zoning Ordinance.
- 5. The subject request was referred to all City departments, Chehalem Park and Recreation District, Newberg School District, N.W. Natural Gas, Portland General Electric and General Telephone. Portland General Electric has requested 5 ft. utility easements on all front lot lines on Aldersgate Lane and 10 ft. utility easements on all front lot lines on all private streets within the development. The Newberg School District has indicated that this proposed area of town is at the maximum distance from two existing and one proposed elementary school. They further indicated that this type of development would be ideal from the district point of view as the development would have no children to serve. City Finance Department has indicated that no private streets will have to be addressed and coordinanted between the City of Newberg and the postal service. The Newberg Police Department has indicated that they have no conflict relating to the development but they do anticipate that this will impact the traffic conditions within the area. No further responses were received relating to this matter as of the writing of this report.
- 6. The subject site is relatively flat and is located abutting and directly south of Crestview Drive. Adjoining the property to the west is a 7 acre site containing the Free Methodist Church. To the south are single family, standard lots within a development known as College Park Subdivision. To the east are single family sites containing larger acreages and to the north is the proposed Coppergold development.

Page 2 Conditions/Findings PUD-1-81 7. Applicant's are proposing to extend Aldersgate Lane and Park Lane as publically dedicated standard streets. All other roadways within the development, crafts and community center and sidewalks will be placed under a common association of property owners who will maintain them. The private street system is proposed to be 30 feet in width with a sidewalk on one side with the exception of the center drive which will have sidewalks on both sides, (review the tentative plot plan for Crestview Manor) where the residents within the planned unit development may congregate. 8. The applicants have proposed a preliminary street tree planting schedule for the development. The development is proposed to have street trees planted approximately every 30 feet on both sides of the roadways. The site plan appears to be in conformance with the applicable City ordinances relating to the planned unit development and standard building requirements with the exception that in several locations within the private area, the garages are located closer than 20 feet to the front property line. It is essential that a minimum of 20 feet be established for on site parking purposes between the roadways and the garage area. These corrections should be made prior to final plat approval. Secondly, within the private area the applicants have indicated a standard front yard setback of 10 feet where 15 feet would normally be required. Through the planned unit development process the Planning Commission does have the ability to approve general modifications relating to height, yards, areas, lot width, frontage, depth and coverage, number of off-street parking spaces and setbacks. A determination would be necessary by the Planning Commission that this alteration is acceptable. 9. The private streets are proposed to have no on-street parking. Because of this fact, parking spaces have been established in conjunction with the community facility. The Engineering Department has reviewed these plans and have found that, if a private street network is to be established, the street must be fully maintained through a working property association. Maintenance would include sweeping and cleaning out the streets and storm sewers as well as accumulating an annual or semi-annual payment for the eventual repairs necessary for such a street system. CONDITIONS: 1. All roadways, sewer, water, fire hydrants, utility easements, storm drainage and any other such use found to be essential to the development of the subdivision shall be designed, constructed and installed to meet City improvement specifications on all public improvements. The installation of all private improvements constructed and installed within the development shall be subject to approval of the design and specifications by the Newberg City Engineer. 2. A detailed drainage plan for the entire site must be prepared and submitted to staff for review and approval prior to submission of the final plat of the subdivision. The drainage plan shall indicate that all lots will have positive drainage out to the roadway systems or shall otherwise flow within a drainge easement within the development. 3. All service utilities must be installed underground. 4. Approved fire protection facilities are to be provided to comply with the requirements of the Newberg Fire Department. ZB

Page 3 Conditions/Findings PUD-1-81 5. The applicants shall dedicate additional land in the amount of 10 feet bordering and abutting Crestview Street for the entire width of the subject property. The applicants shall be required to provide a half-street road and sidewalk improvement along Crestview as part of this development. In addition, the half-street of Park Lane shall also be developed in conjunction with this proposal. 6. The planned unit development shall not exceed the density allocation points as established through the application relating to this development. 7. All attached, single-family homes must conform to the rules and exceptions governing single-family attached dwelling units, Section 492 of the Newberg Zoning Ordinance. In addition, the side-yard setbacks shall be 5 feet and shall otherwise not be less than 10 feet between buildings. All front and rear yard setback requirements shall conform to the requirements of the Newberg Zoning Ordinance with the exception that the front yard of any lot abutting a private roadway system shall not be less than 10 feet in depth. 8. There shall be provided at least 20 feet of driveway, accessway or maneuvering space from the property line to the foremost point of a garage. 9. Final plans for landscaping and the final plat for the development shall be in compliance with the intent and design of the preliminary plan. The species of street trees that will be placed within the development shall be subject to .

staff review prior to final plat approval. The street trees shall be of such

a species as not to provide for hazardous conditions relating to any public or private improvement within the development over the life of the tree.

10. All lands within the private common way area which are not covered by streets, wlakways or buildings shall be landscaped, the design of which shall be presented on the final landscape plan and submitted to staff for approval prior to final plat approval.

11. Street names for all private streets shall not conflict with existing street names and shall be subject to approval by the Planning Staff.

Facts About Oregon

In a recent paper by Karen M. Seidel, an employee of the Bureau of Governmental Research and Service Department of the University of Oregon, had some facinating statistics about the State of Oregon. As a Council member and as a Citizen, I thought that you might be interested in hearing some of these.

Oregon's final 1980 population count as of December 31, 1980 was 2,632,000. The population increase was significantly higher during the 70's than during the 60's. The State grew 26% or 541,000 persons in the 1970's. This growth rate was higher than California (18%) and Washington (21%), but lower than Idaho (32%) and Nevada (64%). The United States grew by 11%.

The City of Portland lost 13,584 residents between 1970 and 1980. The total population increase within Oregon's central cities was only 9%. Non-metropolitan counties grew faster in the State as a whole and showed a combined 10 year increase of 30%.

In 1960 there were 1,186,000 in the Willamette Valley. In 1970 there was an increase of 23.9% or a total of 1,469,000 people. In 1980 the Willamette Valley showed an increase of 23.5% or a total of 1,814,000 people. It is obvious that most Oregonians still live in the Willamette Valley (69%). The counties with greatest numerical growth in the past 10 years have been Washington, Clakamas, Lane and Marion. All are located in the Valley. Nevertheless, the Willamette Valley growth rate of 23.5% was less in the State as a whole and considerably less in the Southwest and Central Oregon (32% and 37% respectively).

In 1960 there were 216 incorporated Cities and in 1980 there are now 241 incorporated cities. Sixty-one cities have less than 500 people; 42 have between 500-1,000; 59 have between 1,000-2,500 people; 28 have between 2,500-5,000 people; 22 have between 5,000-10,000 people; 19 between 10,000-25,000 people; 7 between 25,000-50,000 and 3 have 50,000 or more people. Almost half of the population growth in Oregon cities took place in the cities that have less than 10,000 residents in 1970. Only 2 cities with populations over 2,500 lost population between 1970 and 1980 compared with 12 cities during preceding decade. The cities with the greatest numerical ten year population growth were medium to large cities in the Willamette Valley.

CONCLUSION:

In following recent national trends which are a reversal of historical trends, Oregon's population growth rate was highest in non-metropolitan areas. Although the population is still concentrated in the Willamette Valley, population growth between 1970 and 1980 was more evenly distributed throughout the State than it was in the previous decade. The trend of going to a small city that is more rural in nature is obvious in the State of Oregon.

The recommendation from the Director of Administrative Services is to hire the firm of A. John Montgomery for the fiscal year 1981 audit. A sum of \$9,500 (\$4,000 from the City Budget and \$5,500 from the Hospital Budget). This seems to be extremely reasonable compared to other cities.

The last paragraph of the contract is important to note that the contract was drawn up very wisely. The separation of accounting services from the rate is important. Often times an auditing firm must do some of the construction or accounting of various funds within a budget. When this occurs it should be differentiated from the audit fee.

I feel very much reassured to know that in the Director of Administrative Services opinion our books are well kept and the Checks and Balances system seems to be working very well. While there is always room for improvement both the Director and I feel that the improvement is more in a mechanical nature (ie. computer update, payroll update, etc.) rather than in the accounting or procedural areas.

The contract presented by A. John Montgomery for the FY 81 audit follows the form prescribed by the Secretary of State except for provisions pertaining to Medicare Cost Report preparation and accounting services. Mr. Montgomery is not responsible for the preparation of the Medicare Cost Report. Accounting services require Administrator approval, for the purpose of identifying the cost of deficiencies in the accounting systems.

A comparison of Mr. Montgomery's proposed fee with a recent OMFOA Four Year Review of City Audit Fees shows the fee to be lower than the FY 80 cost of any City of comparable size. (When the hospital is excluded). Given the complexity of the hospital the proposed fee for the audit is reasonable in my opinion.

I recommend the acceptance of Mr. Montgomery's proposal.

CONTRACT TO AUDIT THE CITY OF NEWBERG BETWEEN A. JOHN MONTGOMERY AND THE NEWBERG CITY COUNCIL

THIS CONTRACT, made this _____ day of ______, 1981 in accordance with the requirements of Oregon Revised Statutes 297.610 through 297.740 between A. John Montgomery, Certified Public Accountant of McMinnville, Oregon, and the City of Newberg, Oregon, provides as follows:

- 1. It hereby is agreed that A. John Montgomery shall conduct an audit of the accounts and fiscal affairs of City of Newberg, Oregon, for the period beginning July 1, 1980 and ending June 30, 1981, in accordance with the Minimum Standards of Audit Reports, Certificates, and Procedures as prescribed by law. The audit shall be undertaken in order to express an opinion upon the financial statements of City of Newberg. Oregon (including those of Newberg Community Hospital), and to determine if the City of Newberg has complied substantially with appropriate legal provisions. It is understood and agreed that this contract does not provide for the preparation of the Hospital's Medicare reports.
- 2. A. John Montgomery agrees that the services he has contracted to perform under this contract shall be rendered by him or under his personal supervision and that the work will be faithfully performed with care and diligence.
- 3. It is understood and agreed that, should unusual conditions arise or be encountered during the course of the audit whereby the services of A. John Montgomery are necessary beyond the extent of work contemplated, written notification of such unusual conditions shall be delivered to the City of Newberg, Oregon, who shall instruct in writing A. John Montgomery concerning such additional services, and that a signed copy of each such notification and instructions shall be delivered immediately to the Secretary of State by the Party issuing the same.
- 4. The audit shall be started as soon after this contract is executed as is agreeable to the Parties hereto and shall be completed and a written report thereon delivered within a reasonable time, but not later than six months, after the close of the audit period covered by this contract. Fifteen of such report shall be delivered to the City of Newberg, Oregon (and fifteen of a separate report to the Newberg Hospital), and its form and content shall be in accordance with and not less than that required by the Minimum Standards of Audit Reports, Certificates, and Procedures for Oregon Municipal Corporations.
- 5. It is understood and agreed that the City of Newberg, Oregon (and Newberg Community Hospital), are responsible for such financial statements as may be necessary to fully disclose and fairly present the results of operations for the period under audit and the financial condition at the end of that period.

6. In consideration of the faithful performance of the conditions, convenants, and undertakings herein set forth, the City of Newberg, Oregon, hereby agrees to pay A. John Montgomery the sum of \$9,500. (\$4,000 from the City budget, and \$5,500 from the Hospital funds). Any accounting services must be approved by the appropriate Administrator and will be billed at our hourly fees. The City of Newberg, Oregon hereby affirms that proper provision for the payment of such fee has been or will be duly made and that funds for the payment thereof are or will be made legally available.

RESOLUTION NO.

A RESOLUTION CONTINUING THE SENIOR CITIZENS UTILITY DISCOUNT PROGRAM TO REDUCE WATER AND SEWER UTILITY SERVICE RATES FOR QUALIFIED SENIOR CITIZENS LIVING WITHIN THE CITY LIMITS OF NEWBERG.

WHEREAS, the burden of meeting living expenses falls heavily upon elderly persons subsisting on limited income, which have not kept pace with the rising costs of providing municipal services; and

WHEREAS, the Council believes that members of this group should be given some relief from this burden by means of a discount on the utilities provided by the City of Newberg; and

WHEREAS, utility discounts to address these concerns have been granted in previous years by resolution since at least May 6, 1974.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Council of the City of Newberg, Oregon, as follows, to-wit:

Section 1. Purpose of Utility Discounts for Senior Citizens

There is hereby continued a senior citizens utility discount program, the purpose of which is to reduce the monthly amount due under the City's various rate ordinances for water and sewer service, to low-income senior citizens, living within the City Limits of Newberg.

Section 2. Senior Citizen Defined

A senior citizen is a person who is sixty-five (65) years of age on or before the date on which the application for discount is submitted.

Section 3. Qualification of Senior Citizen

A senior citizen desiring to qualify for a utility discount must submit to the City a written application therefore, on forms to be provided by the City. To qualify for the senior citizens utility discount program:

- (a) The applicant must be a senior citizen; and
- (b) The applicant must be a resident of, and the head of the household for which the discount is requested; and
- (c) The senior citizen shall have an income not to exceed \$5,500 from all sources; and if he is married, then their joint income shall not exceed \$7,800 from all sources during the calendar year preceding the date on which the application for discount is submitted.

Section 4. Application Required

A senior citizen desiring to receive a utility discount must submit an initial application to the City therefore, on forms provided by the City. In order to maintain continuous qualifications for such discount, the senior citizen shall, not later than June 30th of each ensuing year, file an annual application for renewal on forms provided by the City. The City Administrator shall determine whether the applicant meets the qualifications and requirements set forth in this resolution.



Section 5. Amount of Utility Discount

If the applicant has met all of the requirements of this resolution the City shall, beginning with the next billing cycle after the date of the application, discount by twenty-five percent (25%) the total amount billed for water and sewer service, not including connect fees, reconnect fees and similar charges, for the applicant's own residence.

Section 6. Termination of Program

The Senior Citizen Utility Discount Program shall automatically terminate on June 30, 1982, unless extended by resolution of the Council.

Engineering Fee to be Assessed for the City Engineer's Review of the Improvement Plans and Inspection of Public

Improvements.

The Public Works Director has met with the people concerned with various changes in his operation. The attendance at this meeting was very sparse. Those in attendance were: Dick Daugherty, Jim DeYoung, John Poet, Earl Sandager and Elisabeth Harney. Almost all of the comments were on other proposals that are not before you tonight. We will be meeting again with the developers in an attempt to hash it out so that there is hopefully total agreement, or at the very least understanding of the changes.

Tonight's ordinance before you, is a very slight change in procedure. The current procedure is to state the Engineering fee, 5% of the estimated improvement costs, in the Subdivision agreement and collect it prior to approval of the plat. In many cases the improvement plans have been approved and construction is well underway by the time that the fee is actually collected. Due to some tight fiscal constraints some developers have significantly changed their plans after a previous set of plans has been reviewed by the City Engineer and some developers have extended the construction beyond sufficient time to complete the improvements causing additional staff time for inspection. The City does not propose to change the fee, it only proposes to have 50% of the Engineer fee paid prior to the City Engineer's review and the remaining 50% paid prior to the issuance of the construction permit. If the plans are changed after the City Engineer has reviewed them the City Engineer shall have the authority to levy an additional Engineering fee of upto 21/2%.

ORDINANCE NO.

AN ORDINANCE PROVIDING FOR AN ENGINEERING FEE TO BE ASSESSED FOR THE CITY ENGINEER'S REVIEW OF THE IMPROVEMENT PLANS AND THE INSPECTION OF THE PUBLIC IMPROVEMENTS WITHIN SUBDIVISIONS AND NEW DEVELOPMENTS IN THE CITY OF NEWBERG.

WHEREAS, The City Engineer is responsible for the review of the improvement plans and the inspection of the construction of the public improvement within the public rights-of-way and public easements for new developments and subdivisions within the City of Newberg, and

WHEREAS, The City will assume the maintenance of the public improvements after the City Engineer has completed all inspection of the improvement, received the appropriate test report which shows the workmanship and materials are acceptable and has issued a certificate of acceptance, and

WHEREAS, The City has not been receiving the Engineering Fee in a timely manner and in some cases the fee has been received many months after the work has been performed, and

WHEREAS, Due to the tight financial market some developers have significantly changed their plans after a previous set of plans had been reviewed by the City Engineer and some developers have extended the construction beyond sufficient time to complete the improvements causing additional staff time for inspection.

NOW, THEREFORE, THE CITY OF NEWBERG ORDAINS AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1. In order to offset the expenditures for salaries of Engineering personnel for the review of the improvement plans, inspection of the construction of the improvement and for pertinent testing, an Engineering Fee shall be levied on all new developments and subdivisions.

Section 2. The Engineering Fee shall be based on 5% of the City Engineer's estimate of the total cost of the public improvements which shall include all water lines, sanitary and storm sewer lines, curbs, street construction, street lights, street signs within the public right-of-way and within public easements.

Section 3. Fifty percent (50%) of the Engineering Fee shall be due and payable prior to the City Engineer's review of the improvement plans. The remaining 50% of the Engineering Fee shall be due and payable prior to the issuance of the construction permit.

Section 4. The City Engineer's estimate shall be based on the anticipated unit prices and the Consulting Engineer's estimated quantity take off plus any required item which may not be included in that estimate (i.e. street signs, street lights, traffic markings, etc.).

Section 5. If the improvement plans are changed after the City Engineer has reviewed them, the City Engineer shall have the authority to levy an additional Engineering Fee up to $2\frac{1}{2}\%$ over the standard 5% fee to cover the additional review time.

Section 6. If construction is extended beyond a sufficient time, in the City Engineer's judgement, to complete the improvements the City Engineer may levy an additional Engineering Fee up to $2\frac{1}{2}\%$ over the standard 5% fee to cover the additional inspection time.
