

SUBJECT: Exploration of Oil and Gas on City owned property.

The attached letter from Nahama & Weagant Energy Company explains their desire to lease some City owned property. They apparently are very interested in their exploration and are serious about the fact that there may be some oil or gas in the area. They have obtained approximately 400 oil and gas leases from other people in the exploration belt.

The area in question is approximately ½ mile west from the intersection of the Hillsboro Highway and Bald Peak Road, being mostly north and abutting Bald Peak Road. In checking with the Planning and Engineering Department this area contains approximately 48 acres. The City owns both of these parcels. The properties were intially purchased for the purpose of maintaining a site for a water spring which supplies water directly to the City's reservoir.

Very frankly I have not been exposed to an oil company coming in and requesting such a thing, but I do imagine that it is like any other request for a contract and is open to negotiations.

My recommendation to the City Council is to hear Mr. Linscott make his presentation to the City Council and for the City Council to ask some very basic and perhaps, even naive questions regarding this matter. It is our first time of being approached as far as I know and I don't think any question that the City Council or any individuals may have would be out of line. Some examples of questions are:

- 1. What are the proposed terms of the agreement?
- What type of exploration will they be doing?
- 3. Will it disrupt the community, property owners or land?
- 4. How will they compensate for the disruption?
- 5. Will they go back and put the land into its original condition?
- 6. What benefits will the city derive if there is in fact oil or gas beneath the surface?
- 7. How will the community benefit?
- 8. What type of company are they how long have they been in existence; what is their reputation; where have they found oil and gas?
- 9. What references do they have?

Page 2 Memo to the City Council Exploration of Oil and Gas I have given the proposed lease over to the City Attorney who will by the time of the City Council meeting, I'm sure, have at least reviewed it superficially. Another caution point for the City Council is that the money that we would be receiving from the Nehama & Weagant Energy Company is minimal. Yet, the consequences could be severe. If there is in fact oil and gas, it could disrupt our water supply and may become serious. If the City did not go ahead with the lease then I'm sure that the Oil Company would do exploration around the area. If oil or gas were found it would make the property that much more valuable and would give us a stronger leverage on negotiations. In discussing this with the Planning Director, he feel that an impact study should be done prior to any agreement to proceed. At this point, there is nothing more to be done except to hear the Nehama/Weagant Energy Company give its presentation. Nahama and Weagant Energy Company, a California corporation, now a publicly held Company, has been functioning as an exploration and development firm here in California since it was originally incorporated in 1971. The principal owners of its outstanding shares of common stock, both geologists, and still the original creators and motivators of the Company, are Rodney Nahama and Frank E. Weagant.

The development of some gas production in the Mist area of Columbia County was obviously the spark needed to entice further investigation. Of course, the speculators and even many of the large independent companies made a brief run at acquiring potential development acreage in Oregon. There have been very few who stuck to the long slow process of investigating geologic features of the area, bearing the extreme cost of obtaining seismic data and then expending the considerable time and money it takes to secure oil and gas leases on a given area before drilling can begin.

I would like to meet with you and members of the City Council on the evening of June 18, at which time I can outline in greater detail characteristics of the lease document, the intentions of this firm, and answer any questions you might have. Therefore, unless advised to the contrary I will be available in Newberg on June 18, 1981.

I am enclosing a Prospectus Report concerning this firm issued in February, 1981. As evidenced by the Report, Nahama and Weagant aggressively approach the search and development for gas and oil. Incidently, we are particularly conversant with the need for the protection of surface and shallow fresh water sediments. Your State Government has enacted good and safe procedures for drilling operations by oil companies. These procedures and conditions have been complied with in wells we already have drilled in Oregon. I will explain this procedure in greater detail when we meet on the 18ths of June.

MEMORANDUM June 12, 1981 TO: Mike Warren Bob Sanders FROM: RE: Bids on the Bridge Renovation Bids were opened on the subject project on June 9, 1981. We received three bids on Schedule A only which are tabulated on the attached sheet. No bids were received on Schedule B which is the bridge pier protection. The low bidder on all three painting systems was Abhe & Svoboda of Prior Lake, Minnesota. References have been checked on this contractor and a favorable response was obtained. This company has done a great deal of bridge work across the country and one bridge very similiar to ours. Our first choice of painting systems is System A and since the bid was considerably below the estimate, it is advisable to go with this system. With respect to the bid price, last year when painting was advertised with the pipe line, the subcontractor bid around \$350,000 for the painting. The project was split up and the water line came back in at about \$100,000 less than the first bids and now the painting is about \$100,000 less. I have received a protest from the high bidder's attorney claiming that Abhe & Svoboda failed to provide their Specialty Contractor's Number with their bid, hence they were not qualified to bid. In checking with the State Highway Department, they have pre-qualified Abhe & Svoboda to bid on bridge painting and a Specialty Contractor's Number is not required. The Builders Board confirmed that by definition in ORS 701.005 a Specialty Contractors Number and a builders board number are only required to bid on residential dwellings. My recommendation is to award Schedule A of the bridge renovation project to Abhe & Svoboda using painting system A for a contract amount of \$235,740.00 and waive any informalities which may exist in the bid. Schedule B will be readvertised as a separate package. TX -2

AN ORDINANCE AMENDING ORDINANCE NO. 1386 PASSED AND APPROVED OCTOBER 5, 1964, AS AMENDED RELATING TO THE INTEREST RATE CHARGED FOR FINANCING CONNECTION AND DEVELOPMENT FEES FOR EXISTING PREMISES SERVED BY A SEPTIC TANK THAT ARE REQUIRED TO CONNECT TO THE CITY SANITARY SEWER SYSTEM; AND DECLARING AN EMERGENCY,

WHEREAS, RESOLUTION NO. 76-636, Adopted December 6, 1976 allowed 90% of fees, if fees exceed \$2,000, to be financed at a rate of 8% per annum over 24 months; and

WHEREAS, The previous City Administrator has allowed financing of any fee at the rate of 8% per annum; and

WHEREAS, The City Engineer has experienced difficulty in administering this resolution in that the connection and development fees for an existing house to connect to the sanitary sewer are \$1,025 which means that no one can qualify for the financing; and

WHEREAS, The existing ordinance (No. 1386) is worded to allow financing of the entire connection fees at the rate of 7% per annum; and

WHEREAS, The Public Works Committee has recommended that Ordinance No. 1386 be amended to increase the interest rate to 12% per annum and include the development fee which would be in the best interests of the City of Newberg and REPEAL Resolution No. 76-636; and

WHEREAS, A number of homeowners are currently being required to connect to the City's sanitary sewer system and the owners should be allowed more flexible financing immediately thus requiring the declaration of an emergency.

NOW, THEREFORE, THE CITY OF NEWBERG ORDAINS AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1. That Section 404 (8) of Ordinance No. 1386 passed and approved October 5, 1964 shall be amended as follows, to-wit:

(8) Where existing premises are presently being served by a septic tank, the owner may apply for permission to pay the sewer connection and development fees in equal monthly installments, not exceeding 24 months. When aforesaid owner elects to pay said connection and development fees in monthly installments, the unpaid balance of said connection and development fees shall bear interest at the rate of 12 per cent per annum; and the unpaid balance of said connection and development fees, together with the interest charges thereof, shall constitute a lien upon the property until paid in full.

Section 2. NOW, THEREFORE, an emergency is hereby declared to exist and this ordinance shall become in full force and effect immediately upon it's passage by the Council and approval by the Mayor.

SUBJECT: Garbage Franchise Amending Ordinance

This subject matter was referred back to the City Ordinance Committee after the franchisee suggested some changes in the ordinance. The Ordinance Committee has recommended that the Franchise be awarded and the attached ordinance be put into effect.

The new ordinance provides for an exclusive franchise for the hauling and collection of garbage and refuse plus recycleable solid wastes in the city. The Council can terminate the lease but there shall be a ten year termination date. That is, the City Council will have to allow approximately ten years prior to the actual final termination.

Since the contract is worded so that we will have this franchisee for at least ten years, I suggest that the City Council look at it very carefully, as did the Ordinance Committee.

RE: Conversation with Marvin Schneider of the Garbage Franchise May 21, 1981 from 9:30 to 10:15 A.M.

After discussion of a number of points on the amender, it came down to desiring three changes on the amending ordinance to reintroduce in the definition of recyclable materials in Section 1 the following definition:

Any materials that are collected for further processing to save energy and/or raw materials or transfer to another party for such processing.

This is on page two of the example.

Section 6 to add a subparagraph 3 which reads as follows:

3. The Grantee may subcontract with others to provide a portion of the service where grantee does not have the necessary equipment or service. Such a subcontract shall not relieve the Grantee of total responsibility for providing and maintaining service and from compliance with this ordinance.

The rationale in that is clear and I indicated that I thought that this is an ability that he should have stated in the franchise. It is an ability that I believe he already has under the current terms but it would be best to spell it out in the franchise and I would recommend that it be included. This is on page 3 of the draft.

Page 4 of the draft, Section 8, bottom of the section, he desires to have the language: The Grantee shall provide drop box service by providing drop box to customers requesting such service within 24 hours of such request, deleted.

He provided a written statement to go with this material. The most important thing however, is that he will come to the Ordinance Committee meeting at 7:00 a.m. at J's Restaurant on June 1, 1981 to discuss these three changes in the final draft produced. Further, we indicated that he will submit in written form the approved receptacle descriptions per section 8 of the ordinance. I suggested this be in typewritten form and signed by he and the City Administrator, thereby that could be diseminated to anybody questioning the franchisee about what an approved receptacle was.

AN ORDINANCE AMENDING ORDINANCE NO. 1909, PASSED AND APPROVED JUNE 12, 1978, GRANTING NEWBERG GARBAGE SERVICE, INC., AN EXCLUSIVE FRANCHISE FOR THE HAULING OF GARBAGE AND REFUSE AND INCLUDING IN SAID FRANCHISE THE COLLECTION OF RECYCLABLE SOLID WASTES AND MATERIALS AND REGULATING SAID COLLECTION WITHIN THE CITY OF NEWBERG; MODIFYING THE TERM OF SAID FRANCHISE; PROVIDING PROCEDURES FOR SUPERVISION OF SAID FRANCHISE; AND DECLARING AN EMERGENCY.

WHEREAS, the Ordinance Committee of the Council of the City of Newberg and the City Administrator of the City of Newberg have reviewed Ordinance No. 1909 and have evaluated said ordinance and have recommended to the Council that it would be in the best interests of the City of Newberg that the franchise granted by Ordinance No. 1909 be amended to include recyclable materials and also be modified to make changes in the franchise term, in the procedures for supervision of said franchise and make other changes to said ordinance; and

WHEREAS, the City Council after having reviewed the recommendation of the said Committee and the City Administrator does find that it would be in the best interests of the City of Newberg that the Ordinance be so amended and that it would be in the best interests for the peace, health and safety of the people of the City of Newberg, as garbage collection is an essential activity in the City of Newberg, that an emergency be hereby declared to exist.

NOW, THEREFORE, THE CITY OF NEWBERG ORDAINS AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1. That the title of Ordinance No. 1909, passed and approved June 12, 1978, as amended, shall be amended to read as follows:

An ordinance granting Newberg Garbage Service, Inc. an exclusive franchise for the hauling of garbage and refuse and collection of recyclable solid wastes and materials in the City of Newberg; regulating the collection of recyclable solid wastes in the City of Newberg, appealing Ordinance No. 1976 and declaring an emergency.

Section 2. That Section 1 of Ordinance No. 1909, passed and approved June 12, 1978, as amended, shall be amended to read as follows:

Section 1. Definitions

For the purpose of this ordinance the following words and phrases shall have the meaning respectively ascribed to them:

City - The City of Newberg, Oregon, a municipal corporation.

Grantee - Newberg Garbage Service, Inc., a corporation incorporated under the laws of the State of Oregon.

Garbage - Any broken ware, filth, house dirt, rubbish, debris, every refuse accumulation of animals, food or vegetable matter, liquid or otherwise, attended upon or resulting from preparation, use, cooking, dealing in, storing or handling of meat, fish, fowl, fruit or vegetables inleuding but not restricted to combustible materials, and including recyclable materials which are deposited in, on or around containters furnished by the Grantee or the customer of Grantee for Grantee's use.

Gross' Revenue - Any revenue earned within the City by the Grantee for garbage and refuse collection after adjustment for the net write-off of uncollectible accounts annually, but excluding gross revenue from any recyclable materials. Hauling for Hire - Any person transporting garbage not produced by that person. Person - Any person or persons, firm or corporation or other legal entities. Receptacle - A can of approved construction sufficient to receive the deposit of garbage that may accumulate on private premises. The can must be equipped with suitable handles, a tight fitting cover to exclude water and flies and must be able to hold the garbage without spilling, leaking or escaping of odors. Recyclable Materials - Any materials that are collected for further processing to save energy and/or raw materials or transfer to another party for such processing. Section 3. That Section 2 of Ordinance No. 1909, passed and approved June 12, 1978, as amended, shall be amended to read as follows: Section 2. Purpose and Terms The City hereby grants to Newberg Garbage Service, Inc., for a period of ten years from and after January 1, 1981 an exclusive franchise for the hauling and collection of garbage and refuse, recyclable materials and recyclable solid wastes in the City and disposal, recovery or sale thereof. The Council may terminate renewals of this franchise by resolution by the Council, however, unless so terminated prior to January 1st of each year, this franchise shall be renewed for a full term of ten years upon January 1st of each succeeding year. For other termination provisions see Section 11 of this ordinance. It shall be unlawful in the City for any person to haul for hire or collect garbage or refuse or collect or haul recyclable solid wastes or materials over the streets of the City unless they have first entered into a contract or franchise with the City for such services, it being the intention of this privision to grant an exclusive franchise for the collecting and hauling for hire of garbage and refuse and/or recyclable solid wastes and materials in the City to the Grantee. No franchisee shall be required to collect waste oil or vegetable fats or scrap metal which is part of a junk or scrap business. Section 4. That Section 3 of Ordinance No. 1909, passed and approved June 12, 1978, as amended, shall be amended to read as follows: Section 3. Compensation to the City. As compensation to the City for the franchise hereby granted, the Grantee shall pay to the City three percent (3%) of its gross annual revenue for local garbage collection service rendered within the City Limits for each calendar year during the life of this franchise beginning with the year 1981. As further compensation, the Grantee shall provide service to the City Hall, City Library, City Hospital, City Fire Station, City Garage and dump privileges at Grantee's dump at no cost to the City. As further compensation to the City for this franchise, as it relates to recyclable materials, Grantee shall pay to the City a flat fee of \$100. each calendar year for the first three years of this franchise subject to renegotiation after that period at the request of either party for an additional or lessor amount to be paid for the remaining years of the franchise. On or before March 1 of each year during the term of this franchise, the Grantee shall file with the City a statment under oath showing the amount of gross revenue the Grantee received for services within the City for the calendar year XT3

immediately preceding year in which the statement is iled. The annual franchise fee for the year in which the statement shall be computed on the gross revenue so, reported. Such franchise fee shall be payable annually on or before March 1, beginning with the year 1982.

3. If controversy arises as to the amount of gross revenue within the meaning of this ordinance, the amount of such gross revenue as determined by audit by a certified public accountant shall be deemed the correct amount.

- 4. Any difference of payment due either the City or the Grantee through error or otherwise shall be payable within 15 days of discovery of such error.
- 5. Should the Grantee fail or neglect to pay any of said annual payment for 30 days after an annual payment shall become due and payable and after 30 days written notice from the City, the City by its properly constituted authority, may at it's option either continue this franchise in full force and effect and/or proceed by suit or action to collect payment, or declare a forfeiture of this franchise because of failure to make such payments, but without waiving the right to collect earned franchise payments.
- Section 5. That Section 4 of Ordinance No. 1909, passed and approved June 12, 1978, as amended, shall be amended to read as follows:

Section 4. Service Rates.

The City expressly reserves the right to fully regulate and fix the rates for the service to be rendered hereunder by the Grantee to the end that such rates shall always be reasonable and in the public's interest. Rates shall be in a schedule form and adopted and amended by the City Council by resolution and attached to this ordinance as Appendix A. The rate schedule shall be executed and signed by the Mayor of the City, the City Administrator and an authorized representative of the Grantee.

Section 6. That Section 6 of Ordinance No. 1909, passed and approved June 12, 1978, as amended, shall be amended to read as follows:

Section 6. Renegotiation and Notice.

- 1. The City or the Grantee may request renegotiation of the franchise and/or rates to be charged under the franchise by giving notice in writing during any year that this franchise is in force. All notices given in connection with the franchise shall be in writing and delivered to the parties as follows, to the City through the City Administrator at City Hall and to the Grantee at it's office at 1119 N. Main Street, Newberg, Oregon.
- 2. Grantee may apply for interim relief or change in recycling services if the cost of disposal or other costs set by government or the cost of meeting government regulations increases substantially or recycling markets, materials or participation warrants a change.
- 3. The Grantee may subcontract with others to provide a portion of the service where grantee does not have the necessary equipment or service. Such a subcontract shall not relieve the Grantee of total responsibility for providing and maintaining service and from compliance with this ordinance.
- Section 7. That Section 7 of Ordinance No. 1909, passed and approved June 12, 1978, as amended, shall be amended to read as follows:

Section 7. Accumulation of Garbage and/or interference with collection and receptacles is prohibited.

No person shall throw or deposit upon any public property within the City any garbage nor shall any garbage be allowed to accumulate or remain upon private premises within the City, except as herein provided. All garbage accumulating on private property shall be kept, while on such private premises, in a receptacle or

shall be removed therefrom before the same shall become a nuisance or offensive to others or detrimental to the public health or a fire hazard; and any person owning or occupying such private premises within the City are required to provide for the prompt and sanitary removal from time to time of such accumulation of garbage. Solid wastes, garbage, rubbish and refuse place out for collection, whether or not source separated belongs to the franchisee. No person, firm, corporation or legal entity shall take or interfere with the collection of the named wastes and materials. No unauthorized persons shall deposit material or solid wastes in any container or drop box supplied by franchisee, nor remove the materials or wastes placed in the container box by any customer of franchisee. Section 8. That Section 8 of Ordinance No. 1909, passed and approved June 12, 1978, as amended, shall be amended to read as follows: Section 8. Receptacles. The owner or occupant of any premises served by the Grantee shall provide an adequate receptacle for receiving and holding garbage that accumulates on said premises. The receptacle shall comply at all times with the requirements of the franchise and shall comply with the rules and regulations of the Grantee as approved by the City. Section 9. That Section 11 of Ordinance No. 1909, passed and approved June 12, 1978, as amended, shall be amended to read as follows: Section 11. Acceptance, Waiver, Repeal Supervision and Savings Clause. 1. The Grantee shall file with the Recorder of the City within 30 days after the passage of this ordinance its acceptance of this franchise and its waiver of any rights, obligations and claim it might have under Ordinance No. 1796 of the City. Ordinance No. 1796 is hereby repealed when the Grantee files the aforementioned acceptance. Service provided under the franchise shall be under the supervision of the City Council. Grantee shall, at reasonable times, permit inspection of his facilities, equipment and personnel providing service. A. The garbage collection and hauling service and recycling service is necessary for the peace, safety, health and welfare of the people of the City of Newberg. Therefore, failure by Grantee to comply with a written notice to provide necessary service or otherwise comply with the provisions of this ordinance after written notice and a reasonable opportunity to comply shall be grounds for modification, revocation or suspension of the franchise. B. After written notice from the City Council that such grounds exist, the Grantee shall have 30 days from the date of mailing of the notice in which to comply or to request a public hearing before the City Council. C. If the Grantee fails to comply within the specified time or fails to comply with the order of the City Council entered upon the basis of findings at the public hearing the City Council may suspend, modify or revoke the franchise or make such action contingent upon continued non-compliance. D. At public hearing, the Grantee and other interested persons shall have an opportunity to present oral, written or documentary evidence to the City Council. E. In the event that the City Council finds an immediate and serious danger to the public through creation of a health hazard, it may take action within a time specified in the notice to the Grantee and without a public hearing prior to taking such action. XI3

3. The Grantee agrees as a condition to this franchise that whenever the City Council determines that the failure of service or threatened failure of service would result in creation of an immediate and serious health hazard or serious public nuisance, the Council may, after a minimum of 24 hours actual notice to Grantee and a public hearing if Grantee requests it, authorize another person to temporatily provide the service or to use and operate the land, facilities or equipment of the Grantee through leasing to provide emergency service. The Council shall return any seized property and business upon abatement of the actual or threatened interruption of service. The Grantee shall not terminate service to all or a portion of its customers unless: A. The street or road access is blocked and there is no alternate route and provided that the City of Newberg, Oregon, shall not be liable for any such blocking of access. B. Excessive weather conditions render providing service unduly hazardous to persons providing service or such termination is caused by an act of God or a public enemy. C. A customer has not paid for service provided after a regular billing and after a 7 day written notice to pay. D. Any customer who is terminated hereunder shall be entitled to appeal the letter to the City Council, where both customer and Grantee will be entitled to be heard. Any findings by any court of competent jurisdiction that any portion of this ordinance is unconstitutional or invalid shall not invalidate any other provision of this ordinance. Section 10. That Section 12 of Ordinance No. 1909, passed and approved June 12, 1978, as amended, shall be amended to read as follows: Section 12. Emergency Clause. The regular picking up of garbage and recycling service and the supplying of garbage and recycling service to the people of the City is necessary for the peace, health, and safety of the people of the City of Newberg, therefore, an emergency is hereby declared to exist.
