Sealed proposals for furnishing and installing a deep well submersible pump will be received until 7:30 P.M., February 4, 1952. Proposals shall be addressed to the City of Newberg and mailed or delivered to the City Recorder.

The equipment to be bid and installed consists of submersible pump, motor, starting gear and cable to be installed in a well along-side of the State Highway about two miles south of Newberg. The site is accessible by truck.

All proposals shall be on regular forms furnished by the City or its Consulting Engineers, Carl E. Green and Associates, 510 Henry Building, Portland 4, Oregon.

A certified or cashier's check in the amount of five percent (5%) of the total bid shall accompany the proposal. Should the successful bidder fail to enter into a contract within ten days after notice of award, the City will retain the check.

Specifications, proposal and form of contract for said equipment may be obtained by bona fide bidders free of charge at the office of the City Recorder, City Hall, Newberg, Oregon, or at said office of Carl B. Green & Associates. Proposals will be opened and considered by the Common Council of the City of Newberg at a regular meeting to be held at and after 7:30 o'clock P.M. February 4, 1952, at the Council Chambers in the City Hall, Newberg, Oregon.

The City reserves the right to reject any or all hids and to accept the proposal deemed in the best interest of the City considering bid prices, experience of bidder, equipment, and time required to furnish and install the equipment.

1. Operating Conditions

cased well having a total depth of 90 feet and with perforations from the 65 foot to 85 foot levels. It is anticipated that the static level in the well during pumping periods will vary from about 50 to 40 feet below ground level and the draw down at the specified pumping rate should not exceed six feet. The well will be subject to flooding by the Willamette River during extreme high water. The starting equipment will be mounted on power poles along with a transformer at an elevation about 15 feet above ground level and about 150 feet distant from the well.

The pump is to deliver water by means of an 8" connection to a 12" steel pipe line which crosses the Willamette River bridge north of the well.

The equipment furnished shall have a capacity in the order of 750 gallons per minute against a total dynamic head of about 125 feet including head losses in pump and 8" riser pipe.

2. Pump

The pump shall be of the deep well turbine, vertical, multistage type direct connected to a submersible motor. The entire assembly shall be designed and constructed so as to operate satisfactorily with the entire unit suspended in the well below water level. The inlet strainer shall be located under the lowest stage bowl and above the motor.

The pump shaft bearings shall be of the water lubricated type and the motor bearings shall be oil lubricated within a water proof, sealed assembly.

5. Pipe Column

The pipe column supporting the pump and motor assembly shall be not less than 8" in diameter and of standard weight steel pipe. The top of the 8" discharge pipe shall be fitted with a flanged cover plate which may be bolted tightly on the well. The cover plate assembly shall be fitted with an 8" flanged steel or cast iron discharge elbow for installation in a concrete pit below ground level.

The length of column shall be such that the center line of the strainer inlet shall be located about 75 feet below the top of well casing.

4. Pump Bowls & Shaft

The pump bowls shall be of close grained, high quality, dense cast iron. Pump impellers shall be of all bronze construction, carefully machined. The pump shaft shall be of ground and polished extra heavy stainless or rustless steel.

5. Motor

The motor shall be forty horse power, 440 volt, three phase unit entirely enclosed and sealed in a steel assembly so as to prevent the entry of any water to the motor unit, and shall be manufactured by a concern having extensive experience with the fabrication of motors of this type.

6. Depth Gauge

A water level depth gauge shall be installed with the equipment. The air line into the well shall extend to a point approximately seventy feet (70°) below the top of the well. The pipe or tubing so installed shall be fitted with a brass or copper tag in the concrete valve pit indicating the exact length of pipe or tubing in the well. The bidder shall also furnish all required fittings; air valve connections; an

accurate, first quality depth gauge having face not less than 5" in diameter and calibrated in feet of water; and hand air pump.

7. Operating Speed

The bidders shall clearly indicate the speed at which the motor and pumping unit are designed to operate, and whether or not the unit bid may meet the required conditions by operation at different speeds.

8. Starting Equipment and Switching Gear

The starter shall conform to the design, construction and performance requirements of the N.E.M.A. and shall be totally enclosed within a weather proof sheet metal case. The starter shall have a rating equal to or in excess of the pump motor and shall provide thermal overload protection. Heater elements or relays shall be of the manually reset type. A magnetic, reduced voltage starting compensator shall be provided.

The starting equipment shall permit either manual or automatic operation. A selector switch of the "Manual-off-Automatic" type shall be included, as well as a start-stop push button station for manual operation.

A fused disconnect switch of the three pole, enclosed type built for quick make and break shall also be included with the starting equipment. A separate pole shall be provided for each ungrounded conductor in the starting equipment. Overload and undervoltage protection shall also be included. All of the foregoing equipment shall be designed for use with 440 volt, 3 phase, 60 cycle A.C.

9. Power Cable

Power cable supplied with the equipment shall be especially

designed and constructed for underwater service and shall be of sufficient length to run to starting gear to be installed about 15 feet above ground level and about 150 feet distant from the well horizontally. Cable shall be rated in accordance with the National Electric Code of the National Board of Fire Underwriters.

10. Automatic Control

manually but later will be remotely controlled from a proposed water treatment plant to be constructed on the north side of the Willamette River. Such equipment will be automatic and will control relays to be provided with the starting gear at the well site. The City will furnish and install the automatic remote control equipment at a later date, but the starting equipment furnished shall be so designed and built as to operate satisfactorily under the described conditions.

11. Installation

The Bidder shall deliver the pumping equipment to the well site and install it complete exclusive of concrete pit to house gate valve, check valve, water level gauge, etc. The City will construct the necessary concrete enclosure, but the equipment, top plate, and discharge elbow shall be furnished and installed by the Bidder. Installation of 8" check valve, 8" gate valve and connections to the pipe line from the well will be made by the City.

12. Performance Curves, Cuts, Catalogs

Bidders shall submit with bids complete descriptive data, outs, catalogs, performance curves showing head-capacity, horse power and efficiency throughout the entire operating range of the equipment

bid. Data furnished shall clearly and accurately show the type of construction, materials, and design of all of the equipment.

13. Guarantee & Tests

Proposals shall include statements of efficiencies of both the pump and the motor, and the overall water to water efficiency will be determined by actual field tests. The Bidder shall state the KWH of power consumption per 1000 gallons of water pumped against the head specified. The complete unit in place shall be guaranteed by the bidder to show not less than the product of the pump and motor efficiencies, and acceptance and payment for the equipment shall be contingent upon the results of such test made under actual working conditions after the pump has been installed and in operation.

The total head shall be computed from the difference in level between the point of discharge and the level in the well during pumping operations plus an allowance for friction losses in the valves, fittings and pipe line from the pump discharge to the point of delivery of water, as determined by the Consulting Engineer.

The test shall be jointly conducted by a representative of the Bidder or manufacturer of the equipment and the Engineers. In addition to the efficiency test, a continuous run of not less than 24 hours shall be used to check lubrication, etc.

14. Experience In Manufacture and Use

The manufacturer of submersible pump and motor bid shall have a record of successful manufacture and performance of the unit bid.

15. Delivery and Payment

Bidders shall state time of delivery of equipment and the successful bidder shall furnish drawings of cover plate, discharge elbow, setting of air line equipment, etc. well in advance of contemplated delivery in order that the concrete structure may be ready for the installation.

Briefly stated, this cause consists of a suit to quiet title brought against the City of Newberg by 110 parties plaintiff at seeking to quiet the title to their respective properties and invalidate City liens for street improvement thereon. There were 75 separate tracts of land involved and the total amount of the liens thereon was \$36,692.60. The total amount of liens arising from the street improvement was \$132,376.21. Therefore, approximately 27 per cent of the total liens was involved in the proceeding.

The improvement proceedings were started in February, 1948, and the contract was let in November, 1948. The work was done during the spring and summer of 1949 and the assessment proceedings and apportionment of the liens to the properties was completed in April, 1950. The above suit was filed June 28, 1950, and decree was rendered therein September 30, 1952.

In contesting this suit, the City answered, setting up all of the proceedings on which the liens were based and asking for the foreclosure of the liens should they be held valid. The decree of the Court held the liens valid, dismissed plaintiff's complaint, and ordered the liens foreclosed.

Prior to the trial of the case in August, 1952, 36 of the plaintiffs either paid or bonded their liens and withdrew from the case. The amount so paid or bonded was the sum of \$8663.06 and in addition thereto partial payments were received on the property of plaintiffs, Pearl White and Charles M. Christian, in the amount of \$1565.03. As the result of the foregoing, the principal amount of liens unpaid and still in litigation at the time of trial was \$26,464.51. Since the trial, additional plaintiffs have paid off, including in their payment the costs and interest allowed. The principal amount so paid is the sum of \$26.464.66.

In order to properly provide for the foreclosure of the liens on the numerous properties involved, it was necessary to investigate the title to 62 separate tracts and secure reports thereon at a cost of \$930.00. As a result of this investigation it became necessary to bring in 58 new parties as Cross-defendants and later investigations, including changes by death or otherwise, resulted in the addition of 3 more. Subsequently, by securing evidence in the form of affidavits, death certificates, etc., 15 of said cross-defendants were removed from the case by clearing their claims on the titles involved. While this was incidentally beneficial

The City paid an additional sum in cash. Since the warrants were issued, the City has been able to pay thereon the principal sum of \$70,499.89, leaving a principal balance of \$60,805.90. These payments have been derived from payment of liens not in suit and also the above described payments on liens in the suit. The City now has a cash balance in the street improvement fund in the amount of \$70.662.67

A number of owners have failed to take any action whatever, whether by paying or bonding their assessment or by joining in the lawsuit. The total principal amount owed by such owners is the sum of \$10,202.46, excluding alley assessments. Total principal covered by bonding applications is \$23,362.69.

The total number of owners originally affected by the improvement, disregarding multiple and joint ownerships, was 207. Approximately 113 such owners have fully paid and approximately 33 have bonded their assessments. Approximately 20 have taken no action of any kind and approximately 44 such owners are still involved in the lawsuit. Of 42 alley assessments, 34 have been paid and 8 are still unpaid, although only 2 of these are involved in the lawsuit.

In the original assessment proceeding covering the years 1948, 1949 and approximately half of 1950, the sum of \$1500.00 was included to cover attorneysfees and this amount is reflected, in part, in each of the assessments. The firm of Marsh, Marsh & Dashney, Attorneys at Law, McMinnville, Oregon, was associated with the City Attorney throughout both this procedure and the litigation, although no additional charge was made for this association and this firm was paid from the fee allowed to the City Attorney. At the present time, the City Attorney has been paid no fee for this procedure. The firm of Marsh, Marsh & Dashney has been fully paid for their assistance in connection with the assessment procedure in the amount of \$250.00 and the sum of \$127.70 has been paid to the City Attorney for additional clerical work required in the assessment. Therefore, the following shows the status of attorney fees for this procedure:

The Court allowed the sum of \$930.00 title search directly to the City, leaving a balance of \$312.71 costs advanced to be covered, together with attorneys' fees, by the allowance of 72 per cent of the liens in suit as allowed by the Court. The total amount of allowance by the Court for both costs and attorneys' fees is \$1992.08, and after deducting therefrom the balance of \$312.71 advanced by the City for Court costs, there is a balance of \$1679.37 left for attorneys' fees. It is the opinion of both Mr. Marsh and the City Attorney that this amount is inadequate in view of the work involved. Most of the members of the current Council and the 2 preceding Councils, as well as the present Mayor and his predecessor, are familiar with the volume of work required in this case. The statute allows and the Court confirmed interest at 6 per cent from July 10, 1950, on all liens until paid. This give the City a difference of 4 per cent between the amount it is paying Mr. Compton and the amount it is receiving. This additional fund should make it possible for the City to pay an additional attorney fee without going beyond the proceeds of the assessments. It is our opinion that a net attorney fee of \$3000.00 should be paid for this litigation. It should be borne in mind that the foregoing does not include any fee to cover the cost of resisting an appeal should one be taken by the plaintiffs.

It has come to the attention of the City Attorney that several of the plaintiffs have requested permission to bond their assessments. Before investigating the law in detail regarding this request, it will be necessary that the Council decide whether such action will be permitted. It should be borne in mind that if any of the unsuccessful plaintiffs are allowed to bond, that privilege must be available to all of them. Based on previous experience in this and other towns, it can be assumed that some of the parties, who so bond their property, will eventually default on their payments, whereupon the City will be compelled to foreclose through court procedure. At the present time, as a result of the decree of the Court, all of these liens are foreclosed and the only step necessary to sell them, is an order to the Sheriff and the publication and posting of notices. Should the City accept bonding applications under these circumstances, the current litigation will have been wasted and the City will be required to foreclose again on any properties defaulting in the future. All property owners were given an opportunity to bond in June and July, 1950, at which time they were notified that their failure to bond or pay would force the City to take steps to collect. I understand that the contractor feels that he has waited long

DEFINITION OF THERMS

Whenever the words "Standard Specifications" are used herein, they shall be construed to mean Oregon State Highway specifications.

DESCRIPTION OF WORK

The work, including labor and material for which bids are to be received and the work to be done under the contract, if awarded, consist of the following work in the City streets and on the City Parking Lot in the City of Newberg, County of Yanhill, State of Oregon.

- 1. Prepare 28,100 sq. yds. of base for resurfacing pavement.
- 2. Place 2500 tons asphaltic concrete pavement on streets.
- 3. Place 150 tons asphaltic concrete pavement on parking lot. Above quantities estimated only.

PREPARATION OF BASE

WORK TO BE DONE:

Under this specification, the contractor shall clean the existing pavement in accordance with the standard specifications for asphaltic concrete pavement as given in Section 30-9 of said standard specifications form except as that form is supplemented by the provisions which follow.

ASPHALT PRIME:

Under this specification, the contractor shall, after the surface or base has been made clean and free of all dust, dirt or other objectionable materials, apply emulsified asphalt at the rate of 0.20 gallons per square yard, to be covered with a spread of finely crushed rock or sand at the rate of 0.001 cubic yard per square yard.

The cover material shall be broomed or by other suitable means made to cover the entire surface in a uniform manner.

REMOVAL OF COVER MATERIAL:

Previous to the construction of the asphaltic concrete surfacing all excess sand or lose material shall be removed from the surface to the satisfaction of the Superintendent of Public Works.

MEASUREMENT AND PAYMENT:

Payment for the preparation of base constructed as specified above, will be made at the price bid per square yard for "Preparation of Base", which price shall be understood to include and cover all labor, materials,

supplies, equipment and all other expenses and work involved in the construction of the "Preparation of Base" as specified.

ASPHALTIC CONCRETE PAVEMENT OF STREETS AND PARKING LOT

STANDARD SPECIFICATIONS TO APPLY:

The asphaltic concrete shall be furnished, placed, and paid for in accordance with the standard specifications for "Asphaltic Concrete Pavement", given in Section 30 of the standard specifications form of the Oregon State Highway Department except as that specification is supplemented and qualified by the provisions which follow.

LINES, GRADES, AND CROSS SECTIONS:

The lines, grades and cross sections to which the asphaltic concrete is to be constructed are as shown by the plans attached hereto.

CLASS OF ASPHALTIC CONCRETE TO BE USED:

The asphaltic concrete shall be class "B" according to standard specifications.

MEASUREMENT AND PAYMENT:

The basis of measurement and payment shall be as stated in the standard specifications.

FRE-QUALIFICATION

All bidders shall furnish to the City of Newberg, evidence of prequalification with the Oregon State Highway Commission for 1952.

ESTIMATION OF QUANTITIES

The quantities given in these plans and specifications are approximate is only, and it neither expressly nor by implication represented or agreed that the actual amount of work to be done and paid for will correspond therewith.





CITY OF NEWBERG NEWBERG, OREGON February 29, 1952 TO THE HONORABLE MAYOR AND COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF NEWBERG, OREGON Gentlemen: At the time of the February Council meeting you referred to me the question of providing for city employees certain reductions in the cost of water supplied to them by the City of Newberg. Charter Under the provisions of Chapter III, Section 13, the Council is authorized to set the amount of compensation payable for each officer and employee. This is subject to certain qualifications regarding councilmen not relevant to this question. The general rule set up in Volume 2, McQuillin, on Municipal Corporations, Second Eddition Revised, Section 535, Page 304 and 5, is that salaries should be fixed by ordinance and not by resolution. At the present time all compensation payable to city officers and employees is set by ordinance No. 898 as amended. In my opinion, such a reduction would amount to an increase in the compensation of the officers and employees involved and, therefore, would require an ordinance amending ordinance No. 898. 1. Operating Conditions

cased well having a total depth of 90 feet and with perforations from the 65 foot to 85 foot levels. It is anticipated that the static level in the well during pumping periods will vary from about 50 to 40 feet below ground level and the draw down at the specified pumping rate should not exceed six feet. The well will be subject to flooding by the Willamette River during extreme high water. The starting equipment will be mounted on power poles along with a transformer at an elevation about 15 feet above ground level and about 150 feet distant from the well.

The pump is to deliver water by means of an 8" connection to a 12" steel pipe line which crosses the Willamette River bridge north of the well.

The equipment furnished shall have a capacity in the order of 750 gallons per minute against a total dynamic head of about 125 feet including head losses in pump and 8" riser pipe.

2. Pump

The pump shall be of the deep well turbine, vertical, multistage type direct connected to a submersible motor. The entire assembly shall be designed and constructed so as to operate satisfactorily with the entire unit suspended in the well below water level. The inlet strainer shall be located under the lowest stage bowl and above the motor.

The pump shaft bearings shall be of the water lubricated type and the motor bearings shall be oil lubricated within a water proof, sealed assembly.

3. Pipe Column

The pipe column supporting the pump and motor assembly shall be not less than 8" in diameter and of standard weight steel pipe. The top of the 8" discharge pipe shall be fitted with a flanged cover plate which may be bolted tightly on the well. The cover plate assembly shall be fitted with an 8" flanged steel or cast iron discharge elbow for installation in a concrete pit below ground level.

The length of column shall be such that the center line of the strainer inlet shall be located about 75 feet below the top of well casing.

4. Pump Bowls & Shaft

The pump bowls shall be of close grained, high quality, dense cast iron. Pump impellers shall be of all bronze construction, carefully machined. The pump shaft shall be of ground and polished extra heavy stainless or rustless steel.

5. Motor

The motor shall be forty horse power, 440 volt, three phase unit entirely enclosed and sealed in a steel assembly so as to prevent the entry of any water to the motor unit, and shall be manufactured by a concern having extensive experience with the fabrication of motors of this type.

6. Depth Gauge

A water level depth gauge shall be installed with the equipment. The air line into the well shall extend to a point approximately seventy feet (70°) below the top of the well. The pipe or tubing so installed shall be fitted with a brass or copper tag in the concrete valve pit indicating the exact length of pipe or tubing in the well. The bidder shall also furnish all required fittings; air valve connections; an

accurate, first quality depth gauge having face not less than 3" in diameter and calibrated in feet of water; and hand air pump.

7. Operating Speed

The bidders shall clearly indicate the speed at which the motor and pumping unit are designed to operate, and whether or not the unit bid may meet the required conditions by operation at different speeds.

8. Starting Equipment and Switching Gear

The starter shall conform to the design, construction and performance requirements of the N.E.M.A. and shall be totally enclosed within a weather proof sheet metal case. Gentlemen:

Re: Daylight Saving Time

The question of local adoption of Daylight Saving Time has been again brought to my attention. The situation and the law applicable have changed since my last report to the Council dated April 25, 1949. At the present time, Chapter 373, 1949 Laws is in effect in this state having been adopted by the legislature April 12, 1949, and subjected to referendum election to the people November 7, 1950, at which time it was approved by a vote of 277,633 to 195,319. This law provides that standard Oregon time, for all purposes mentioned in the act, shall be Pacific Standard Time or Mountain Time depending on the area in the state, unless the Governor issues a proclamation, which he has refused at present. The law further provides that standard Oregon time shall be uniformly observed throughout the state unless the Governor so acts. Finally, the law provides that in all statutes, orders, rules and regulations relating to the time of performance of any act by any officer or department of the State of Oregon, whether in the legislative, executive or judicial branches of the state government, or relating to the time within which rights shall accrue or determine, or within which any act shall or shall not be performed by any person subject to the jurisdiction of the State of Oregon, the time understood and intended shall be standard Oregon time as fixed by the law.

It should be borne in mind that the City of Newberg is a municipal corporation of the State of Oregon and its officers derive their powers from the state even though Article XI, Section 2 of the Oregon Constitution, commonly called the "Home Rule Amendment," provides that the people of each city have power to enact and amend their charter and the legislature does not.

Similar situations are discussed in 143 ALR 1246 wherein cases on this subject from other states have been collected. Here we find that in a Pennsylvania case where the state law established Eastern Standard Time, a Justice Court having rendered judgment against defendant who failed to appear at the time set according to Daylight Saving Time, was reversed by the Supreme Court of the state. Another Pennsylvania case involving a Pittsburgh ordinance advancing all clocks in the city by one hour was held void because of the state law, although the Court refused an injustion, holding that it was quite lawful to change the time for the activities of the individual or the public, but whenever a specific hour was fixed for legal duties standard time must be followed. We also find an Ohio case against the City of Cincinnati which provided for Daylight Saving Time by ordinance contrary to state law and the Court held the ordinance valid under the "Home Rule Amendment" to the state constitution as long as the ordinance was limited purely to matters of local concern.

To the Honorable Mayor and Council Page 2 May 1, 1952 From the foregoing it would appear that if action is taken by the Council all official activities must be closely watched and an appropriate distinction made or the City may be confronted by void contracts, illegal judgments by the municipal court, and other confusing results The general rule is set forth in 52 Am Jur, Time, Section 7, to the effect that where acts are required by law to be done at a prescribed time and there is a statute defining standard time, the statutory standard must be followed. In a recent decision of the Oregon Supreme Court entitled Webb vs Clatsop County School District, 188 Ore 324, decided in 1950 but which arose prior to the effective date of the 1949 statute, it was held that even though Daylight Saving Time was generally in use in Clatsop County at the time of the school election in question, standard time must govern in the holding of the election. In my opinion, this holding is reinforced rather than weakened by the present state statute, although in that case there was no municipal ordinance in effect at that time. In other words I think that such an ordinance would now be invalid in spite of the "Home Rule Amendment" granting certain powers to the people in connection with changes in city charters. Gentlemen:

With the permission of the Mayor, I wish to submit to you a few facts regarding my request for a pay-raise.

First, I receive the lowest pay of any full-time city employee. I have worked at this low salary for 4 years without requesting a raise, except the \$25 raise promised to me at the end of the first six months after I started work,

I am very interested in the work of the Police Department. I think we have a fine department, the members of which are efficient and conscientious officers. I do not believe any one of them is overpaid. However, it hardly seems fair to me that the lowest paid patrolman receives \$110 a month more than I do, besides a \$10 allowance on uniforms. I do not undervalue these officers-- I would not want to take one penny away from their pay.

While I was hired as "Police Matron", the term Matron is something of a misnomer, as my work strictly as Matron is the least of my duties, although at times I am called out in the middle of the night to take care of a woman prisoner. My chief duties, however, cover the various types of office work incident to the office. I take care of telephone and radio calls; keep the various files in the office; collect the parking meter fines; type letters and reports; at times take shorthand statements of prisoners, and take care of the complaints, information and assistance requested at the desk. I have tried to, and feel that I have given every attention to handling this work efficiently and courteously and with the poise and dignity it requires.

I submit to you my years of experience in general office procedure and my public relations standing fits me particularly well for this position.

I appreciate your giving me this opportunity to be heard, and I trust you will reconsider your decision to give me only a ten per cent pay raise.

In Judge Walker's decision of the above suit, an allowance of 72 per cent of the principal amount of each lien was provided to cover both attorney fees and costs for Defendant City of Newberg. During the course of the litigation, and after the answer of Defendant City of Newberg was filed, 4 Plaintiffs paid off their lien and costs by stipulation. At the time of these payments, the amount of the allowance for attorney fees and costs had not yet been determined and, therefore, these people were required to and did pay the full amount demanded.

It is my opinion that these people should not be penalized by reason of their prepayment, and that they should have a refund in such an amount as would reduce their payment on fees and costs to the amount allowed by the Court on the remaining liens. The following list shows these payments and suggested refunds:



To the Mayor and City Council of Newberg, Ore.

Dear Sirs;

It was my desire to appear before you and present what seems to me to be an injustice in connection with the recent pavement suit against the city. Since it was necessary for me to return to Canada before the date of your meeting, I am taking this opportunity to address you in writing.

When the suit was started we owned and were living in a house at the corner of fifth and college sts. We were asked to become a party to the suit against the city and refused, wishing to have nothing to do with it. As soon as we were notified of the assessment against the property we paid the full amount.

Early in the spring, as I recall, we bought two lots on center st. between 6th and 7th sts. where we now have our bus barn. These lots were bought of a Mr. Andrews and a lien free certificate was issued by the city. We were unaware the these lots which do not touch 6th st., were subject to a paving assessment. Without our knowlege, it seems that the notice of the lien was sent to Mr. Andrews, who kept the notice and never informed us and when suit was started against the city it seems that he involved those lots as if they belonged to him. This action was taken without our knowlege and against our wishes. We were totally unaware of any involvement until word was received from McMinnville stating that we were party to the suit. At that time I was in Canada but Mrs. Gulley tried to find Herb Swift and wh en unable to do so, went to McMinnville and talked to Mr. Marsh, the other attorney representing the city. She informed him that we were not a party to the suit and presented a receipt paid in full for the assessment against our property. This receipt, of course, was for the College st. property, since we knew of no other. Mr. Marsh looked it up and confirmed it and said, " yes you are paid up and this must be a mistake". Now it develops that we are asked to pay attorneys fees, court costs, etc. in a suit which we did not wish to be a party but did make every effort to stay free of. The city never notified us that there was an assessment against our lots and, until the present notice of possible foreclosure, we were unaware that we were in any way involved in the suit.

We are not objecting to paying the paving assessment and back interest, altho we were unaware of it, but we do think that it is unjust to make us party to a suit without our knowlege and without our consent, The fact that we did pay our assessment on the college st. property without objection is evidence that we acted in good faith and would have paid the other had we known about it.

We trust that the council will see the injustice of our being forced into this suit and will find a way to straighten the matter out. Thank you for this consideration.

Re: Street improvement assessments Bonding applications

I have been asked by Mr. James Rittenhouse regarding bonding applications by property owners affected by the 1948-49 street paving and who have not paid or bonded their assessments to date nor have they participated in the litigation recently completed in the Circuit Court. I believe there is approximately \$10,000.00 represented by owners in this class.

Mr. Rittenhouse would like to apply to bond his assessment, waiving defects, if any, in the procedure, and providing for payment of interest at 6 per cent plus semi-annual payments on principal. He understands that bonding was originally permitted on the basis of 20 semi-annual payments beginning December 6, 1950, and that 4 payment dates have passed at the present time. He proposes to pay all accrued interest to the current date and also to pay an amount equal to the 4 installments which he has missed. This will place him on an equal basis with all other bonding applications except that when his December 6, 1952, installment comes due he will only owe slightly over one month's interest in addition to the principal payment.

It should be borne in mind that whatever arrangement is made with Mr. Rittenhouse must be available on the same terms to all other property owners in the same class. In my letter to the Council at the October meeting, I stated my opinion that parties plaintiff in the suit to quiet title should not be eligible to bond their assessments. I am still of this opinion and I believe that the fact that such parties voluntarily participated in this litigation and are now affected by the judgment therein, furnishes a clear basis for a distinction between them and owners who were not so involved but who failed to bond or pay.

Based upon the foregoing, it is my opinion that the Council can authorize bonding by Mr. Rittenhouse and others as hereinabove described. Mr. Eugene E. Marsh concurs in my view of the foregoing.





PROVIDED FURTHER that in the event that the City should find it impossible to properly man such fire equipment when called for use in said District from the volunteer fire department of the City, then and in that event the District shall have the right to man equipment available hereunder for a District call from such personnel as the District may be able to secure and who are satisfactory to the fire marshal of the City of Newberg. 2. IT IS FURTHER AGREED that in the event of fire outside the District, threatening property within the District, the City shall provide fire fighting protection to property within the District as hereinabove provided. 3. The City further agrees to keep its fire fighting equipment in good repair and to furnish all gasoline and oil and all other necessary supplies therefor and to keep said equipment in readiness to answer all calls from the District, subject to the provisions hereof. IT IS FURTHER UNDERSTOOD AND AGREED that this agreement shall be effective as of January 1, 1953, and shall continue and be in full force and effect for a period of five (5) years from said last mentioned date, subject to revision as hereinafter provided. 5. In consideration of such fire fighting protection furnished by said City, the District hereby promises and agrees to pay to the City the following sums of money, to-wit: A sum equal to the total amount received by said District from a tax levy of 3 mills on all taxable property within the District in each of the first two years of the term of this agreement. A sum equal to the total amount received by said District from a tax levy of 22 mills on all taxable property within the District in the third year of the term of this agreement. A sum equal to the total amount received by said District from a tax levy of 2 mills on all taxable property within the District in each of the last two years of the term of this agreement. The District agrees to levy a tax of not less than the millage last herein-

above specified in and for each of the years covered by the term hereof and to pay to the City the amounts due it as hereinabove set forth on all tax payments and returns received by the District, whether received during the term hereof or thereafter. IT IS UNDERSTOOD AND AGREED that the consideration payable to the City by the District as in this paragraph set forth shall be subject to revision after the first year of the term hereof in the manner hereinafter in this agreement set forth. 6. All notices to the City hereunder shall be delivered to the City Recorder, City Hall, Newberg, Oregon. All notices to the District shall be delivered to the secretary of the District. The District agrees to keep the City advised of the name and address of said secretary at all times. 7. IT IS UNDERSTOOD AND AGREED that the City shall utilize such equipment as it now owns or may hereafter acquire for the purpose of carrying out this agreement and that the District shall have no right of ownership or possession of such equipment. 8. IT IS FURTHER UNDERSTOOD AND AGREED that in the event of war, strikes, invasion or other public disturbance or catastrophe the fire marshal of the City of Newberg, or his deputy, shall determine what equipment and personnel shall be kept and/or used within the City and what equipment and personnel shall be used within the District and that his decisions shall not be controlled by the restrictions hereinabove set forth. Said fire marshal, or his deputy, shall also determine all matters of method and procedure in the use of personnel and equipment of the City within the District. The City further agrees to purchase not less than one additional unit of motorized equipment as soon as funds are available therefor and the City further agrees that such additional equipment shall be satisfactory to the Oregon State Board of Underwriters for use as rural fire protection equipment. 10. The City further agrees that all funds derived by the City from this agreement shall be used and expended by the City for fire protection purposes. 3 -

IT IS FURTHER UNDERSTOOD AND AGREED that the members of the Board of Directors of the District have examined and approved the fire fighting equipment of the City for use by the District hereunder, subject however to the provisions hereinabove contained regarding an addition thereto. 12. The District further promises and agrees to levy the taxes hereinabove specified promptly and regularly in accordance with the requirements hereof and of the laws of the State of Oregon, and in the event that the District fails to make such levyas aforesaid or to pay the sums hereinabove provided, promptly in accordance herewith, then and in either of such events, the City shall have the right and privilege at its option to bring the necessary proceedings to compel such levy by the District, or to compel compliance by the District with this agreement, or to cancel and terminate this agreement upon thirty (30) days written notice to the District and in the event that this agreement is so cancelled by reason of the default of the District, said District shall forfeit all rights and privileges hereunder and the City shall have the right to bring such action, suit or other proceeding as it shall deem necessary to enforce any of the provisions hereof, including the collection of delinquent payments. The City further reserves the right to use such fire fighting personnel and equipment as may be necessary to comply with existing agreements for fire protection of individuals and organizations outside of the City and/or the District and to provide additional fire protection within or outside of the District in the future so long as such additional protection does not interfere with fire protection within the District hereunder. 14. IT IS UNDERSTOOD AND AGREED by and between the parties hereto that the rate and amount of the payments to be made hereunder by the District to the City shall be subject to reconsideration and revision annually on and after the first day of January beginning January 1, 1954. Either party to this agreement shall have the right to call for such reconsideration and revision by written notice to the other party, delivered not later than 30 days prior to the first day of January. Upon receipt - 4 -

of such notice, the parties shall jointly reconsider such payments and each party agrees to furnish the other party a full and complete accounting and report of all matters of costs and expenses relative to the performance of this agreement and also all other pertinent information relevent, necessary or desirable in arriving at a just and equitable figure to be paid to the City by the District. The parties shall then proceed to determine whether the millage rate provided by this agreement for the following year or years of the term hereof shall be revised and changed or shall remain as provided herein. The final determination of such revision hereunder shall be completed not later than January 15 of any year.

IN WITNESS WHEREOF the City of Newberg has caused its name to be signed and its corporate seal to be affixed hereto by the Mayor and Recorder of said City pursuant to a resolution duly passed by the Council, and the Newberg Rural Fire Protection District has caused its name to be signed by its president and secretary-treesurer pursuant to a resolution duly passed and approved by the Board of Directors of said District, all as of the 19 day of December, 1952.
