The City Rodent Control Program got underway on October 18, under the supervision of the undersigned and Mr. John Case, regular city employee.

During the month the business area located between Main and River Streets, and between Second and Hancock Streets; and the area bounded by First Street, Main Street, and the Southern Pacific railroad track was inspected for rats. A total of 21 blocks, having 189 premises, were surveyed.

Gentlemen:

Pursuant to your instructions, I have investigated the law relative to the formation of a sanitary district outside the city limits of Newberg for the purpose of providing sewage disposal for the proposed residential development of Koch Brothers on the Portland Road Northeast of this city. As instructed, I have also investigated the proceedings required for annexation of contiguous territory to the city for the same purpose.

The procedure for the formation of a sanitary district is covered by Chapter 378 of the 1949 Session Laws repealing the procedure formerly required for this purpose. It is now required that 25 or more persons who reside and own real property in the proposed district must petition the County Court for its formation. Petitioners must post a bond with the County guaranteeing the costs of the election if the district fails. The County Court sets a date for hearing the petitions and notices thereof must be posted in three places in the district at least 20 days before the hearing and must also be published in a newspaper at least two weeks prior thereto.

At the hearing, the Court decides whether or not the district should be formed and may change the proposed boundaries thereof. If the Court approves the formation, it must set a date for an election to be held in the district not more than 40 days later. At this election three members of a sanitary board must be elected. Copies of the order must be posted in three places in the district for four weeks before the election and also published in a newspaper for the same time.

All registered voters residing in the district may vote at this election. The County Court must select the polling places and provide other arrangements for the election including ballots.

Proposed members of the sanitary board are nominated by a petition for each signed by 10 registered voters in the district and filed with the County Clerk at least 20 days before the election. Such nominees must be registered voters residing and owning real property in the district. The one receiving the highest vote is elected for three years, the next for two and the next for one. Proceedings contesting the formation of the district must be started within 90 days after the Court's order.

If a majority votes against the formation of the district, proceedings are stopped and may not be started for one year. Elections are held annually thereafter for one board member each year for a three year term.

If the election is favorable the district is formed and has the usual powers of a municipal corporation particularly relating to garbage and sewage disposal and including drainage. It constitutes a new taxing district and may issue bonds. It may contract and join with other municipal corporations in carrying out its functions and may also condemn property, use public streets and roads for its installations, compell owners in the district to connect with its sewer system and generally operate as a municipal agency. This includes the power to make regulations and ordinances which must be published in a newspaper if general in nature. It may enforce such ordinances by fines not exceeding \$10000 or imprisonment not exceeding one month or both.

The board must appoint a secretary and elect a president and board members are entitled to \$5.00 per meeting and 7 cents per mile for travel. The secretary is paid as ordered by the board. After the first election, the secretary arranges all subsequent elections.

The board must meet at least once a month and prepare a budget each year under the local budget law, sending transcript to assessor.

The board may call elections to vote on bord issues for sewer contract, etc., amount of bonds generally limited to 25 per cent of assessed value of district and not over a 25 year term. The board may levy sewer service charges and ask the city to collect same with the water charges. It may make special assessments after notice to cover construction costs.

Generally speaking, this procedure will result in the creation of a district similar to irrigation or drainage districts or school districts. It is my opinion that this procedure is much too cumbersome and time-consuming for the purpose at hand and that furthermore, due to the proximity of the area to the city of Newberg, it might constitute wasted effort.

The procedure for annexation of contiguous territory to the city has been newly revised by the provisions of Chapter 563, 1951 Session Laws, amending Section 95-901 O.C.L.A. Under this act the older procedure may be followed whereby two elections are held, one inside the city and one in the territory proposed to be annexed. The

Council initiates the matter and the elections may be simultaneous or at different times, provided they are not over 12 months apart. Voters must be registered and a resident within the area in question. General or special elections may be used. Several territories may be voted on at once if separately stated on the city ballot and if separate ballots are provided for each proposed area. If all owners of property in the area proposed to be annexed consent in writing to the annexation, no election need be held therein.

The Council may dispense with a city election in any event by ordinance or resolution setting a date for public hearing on the proposed annexation when registered voters may be heard. This notice must be published in a newspaper for two weeks and posted in four public places in the city for same time. After the hearing, the Council may by ordinance containing legal description of property in the area, declare that the annexation will be madel without a city election, provided a majority of the voters in the new area favor annexation. This ordinance is subject to referendum and, therefore, cannot contain an emergency clause. In my opinion, it would be advisable to have separate ordinances and notices if more than one territory is proposed.

Notices of elections must be published for four weeks in a newspaper and also by posting in four places in each territory. The notices must state the proposal and designate the boundaries separately for each territory and also state the hours the polls will be open and the place of polling. The Council appoints the judges and clerks of election.

At the first regular meeting of the Council after the election or at a special meeting, the Council will canvass the votes and a majority of all votes cast is required. If the proposal is successful, the Council proclaims the annexation and sends the record to the secretary of state including all orders, resolutions and ordinances and an abstract of the vote.

It is my suggestion that, if at all possible, the Council should follow the annexation procedure rather than encouraging formation of a sanitary district.

(Section 139 of Charter of February 10, 1893, as amended by Laws of Oregon, 1903, revised.)

Section 47: DEBT LIMIT. Except by consent of the voters, the authorized and empowered to fix city's voluntary floating indebtedrates and charges for the sale ness shall not exceed a sum equal and/or disposal of electric energy. to one per cent of the current assessed valuation of taxable property within the corporate limits of sue, sell, and otherwise dispose of either public utility certificates, general obligation, limited obliga-legally authorized debt of the city in existence at the time this charter takes effect shall not be con-sidered. All city officials and employees who create or officially approve any indebtedness in excess of this limitation shall be jointly and severally liable for the excess.

Section 48: CONTINUATION OF RIGHTS AND LIABILITIES. No right or liability of the city existing at the time this charter takes effect shall be impaired or discharged by passage of this act, except as this act otherwise provides.

Section 49: OUTSTANDING BONDS. All outstanding general obligation bonds of Newberg shall continue to be general obligations of Newberg though not otherwise mentioned herein, and the Council shall, each year, at the time of making the annual tax levy for and to retire the principal amounts

thereof as the same shall mature, Section 50: EXISTING ORDIN-ANCES CONTINUED. All ordinances of the City consistent with this charter and in force when it

takes effect shall remain in effect until amended or repealed. Section 51: TIME CHARTER AMENDMENT EFFECTIVE: This act amending the Charter of Newberg of February 10, 1893, as amended, shall take effect on the 8th day of August, 1950.

Gentlemen:

The undersigned are the owners and operators of the two taxi cab services now licensed in and operated in Newberg. We are hereby requesting that the present taxi cab ordinance be amended as follows:

That Section 15 of Ordinance number 971 be amended in such manner as to eliminate the provision for a rate of \$.25 for the first 2/3 of a mile or fraction thereof and the rate of \$.10 for each additional 1/3 of a mile or fraction thereof and to further eliminate the provision that no flat or zone rate may be charged. In lieu of these provisions that a flat rate of \$.50 be set for all taxi cab service within the city limits.

In addition to the foregoing we would request that Section 27 of the same ordinance be amended to provide that carriage of small baggage without charge be restricted to baggage which can be conveniently carried within the passenger carrying portion of said vehicle and that the \$.20 rate for a small trunk be expanded to include baggage which can not be conveniently carried within said portion of the vehicle.

We are aware that these requested changes will result in an increase of taxi cab rates. However, the ordinance now in force shows that these rates were set in January, 1946, and have never been changed. It is a matter of common knowledge that all costs have greatly increased since the latter date and the costs of operating a taxi cab service are no exception. At the present

rates it is impossible to maintain and operate an efficient taxi cab service giving a reasonable return. We hope that the Council will see fit to provide for these changes and we will be happy to do our part in continuing to give the public efficient and dependable service.

AGREEMENT

THIS AGREEMENT, made and entered into this 2 day of 2pril,

1951, by and between the STATE OF OFEGON, by and through its State Highway Commission, hereinafter called the "State", and the CITY OF NEWBIEG, a municipal corporation, acting by and through its Common Council, hereinafter called the "City";

WITNESSETH:

RECITALS:

- 1. Under the provisions of Section 100-122, O. C. L. A., and Section 100-123, O. C. L. A., the Oregon State Highway Commission is authorized and directed, whenever the route of a state highway passes through the corporate limits of an incorporated city, to select and designate the street or streets of such city over which said highway shall be routed, and the Highway Commission is further authorized to construct, reconstruct, pave, and improve and is directed to repair and maintain streets through incorporated cities, where such street or streets form a link in a primary or secondary highway system of the State, or constitute a connection between two such highways, and over which street or streets there has been or is routed state highway traffic.
- 2. That certain highway which by law is designated as the Pacific Highway West, State Highway No. 1, U. S. Route No. 99W, is a primary state highway under the jurisdiction of the State Highway Commission, and that certain highway which by law is designated as the Hillsboro-Silverton Highway, Oregon Route No. 219, State Highway No. 140, is a secondary highway under the jurisdiction of the State Highway Commission, and said primary and said secondary highways extend in part through the City of Newberg.

- 3. Pursuant to said authority, the State has selected, designated, and adopted a portion of First Street in the City of Newberg over which it routes said Pacific Highway West and it has further selected, designated, and adopted a portion of College Street in the City of Newberg over which it routes said Hillsboro-Silverton Highway, and the portion of said First Street over which said Pacific Highway West is routed is intersected at one point by said College Street, over which said Hillsboro-Silverton Highway is routed in the City of Newberg.
- 4. The Highway Commission is empowered under the provisions of Section 115-309, O. C. L. A., to provide a uniform system of marking and signing highway routes, and the Highway Commission is vested with general supervision with respect to the erection by local authorities of official traffic signs and signals.
- 5. The municipal authorities of the City of Newberg are vested with authority, under the supervision of the State Highway Commission, to erect and maintain traffic signs, signals, and markings.
- 6. In the judgment of the State and City it is deemed necessary, for the safety and convenience of the traveling public, that there be erected, installed, and maintained at the intersection of said First Street and said College Street in the City of Newberg a traffic-control signal.
- 7. State and City, having conferred upon the matter as to the necessity for such a traffic-control signal at said intersection, have agreed that one be installed and that they cooperate to that end upon the terms and conditions hereinafter in this agreement set forth.
- 8. It is estimated, only, that the cost of installing such trafficcontrol signal at said intersection is in the amount of \$3000.00.

NOW, THEREFORE, in consideration of the premises, it is hereby mutually agreed by and between the State and City as follows:

THINGS TO BE DONE BY STATE:

- 1. The State shall, either by its own forces or by contract, install a traffic-control signal at the intersection of the afore-mentioned First Street (Pacific Highway West) and College Street (Hillsboro-Silverton Highway) in the City of Newberg. Said traffic-control signal shall be installed in accordance with the plans attached hereto, marked Exhibit A, and by this reference made a part of this agreement.
- 2. State shall supervise the installation of said traffic signal, but in doing so it shall confer with the City's Engineer, to the end that the respective interests of the State and the City shall be best served.
- 3. When said traffic signal has been installed and put into operation, the State shall provide the City with an itemized statement of all costs and disbursements incurred by the State in effecting the installation thereof. If the actual costs and disbursements incurred by the State in said installation are less than the afore-mentioned estimated costs of installation, then the State shall refund to the City the difference between one-half the actual costs and disbursements incurred by the State in said installation and the sum deposited by the City with the Secretary of the Oregon State Highway Commission, as hereinafter provided, but if the actual costs and disbursements incurred by the State in said installation are greater in amount than the afore-mentioned estimated costs of installation the State shall apply all of the amount so deposited by the City toward satisfaction of the City's hereinafter stated undertaking to pay one-half of the actual costs and disbursements of said installation,

and the State shall bill the City for one-half of the difference between the afore-mentioned estimated costs of installation and the actual costs and disbursements incurred by the State in connection with said installation.

THINGS TO BE DONE BY THE CITY:

- 1. City shall, before the State commences installation of said traffic signal, deposit with the Secretary of the Oregon State Highway Commission one-half of the afore-mentioned estimated cost of such installation, and when said installation has been completed the City shall, if the actual costs and disbursements incurred by the State in said installation are greater than the afore-mentioned estimated costs, promptly pay to the State one-half the difference between the actual costs and disbursements incurred by the State in said installation and the afore-mentioned estimated costs of installation, upon its being billed therefor.
- 2. It shall be the responsibility solely of the City to maintain and operate said traffic-control signal after the State has completed the installation thereof, but the City shall operate said traffic-control signal in accordance with a time program approved by the State.
- 3. All cost of maintenance and operation of said traffic-control signal shall be borne solely by the City.
- 4. City shall pass such ordinance or ordinances and take such other official action as may now or hereafter be necessary for the fulfillment of this agreement, and the City shall provide the State with certified copies of such ordinance or ordinances.
- 5. The City shall pass, in addition to any other ordinance or ordinances required to carry out this agreement, an ordinance prohibiting the parking of

vehicles upon said First Street for a distance of thirty feet, measured in an easterly direction, from the easterly curb line of said College Street and for a distance of thirty feet, measured in a westerly direction, from the westerly curb line of said College Street. Said ordinance shall likewise prohibit the parking of vehicles upon said College Street for a distance of thirty feet, measured in a southerly direction, from the south curb line of said First Street and for a distance of thirty feet, measured in a northerly direction, from the north curb line of said First Street.

MISCELLANEOUS:

It is completely understood between the parties hereto that the actual costs and disbursements which are to be incurred by the State in the installation of said traffic signal are unknown and that the sum of \$3000.00 hereinbefore set forth represents nothing more than an estimate of such costs and disbursements.





The work consists of drilling, casing and test pumping a well approximately 100 feet deep.

All proposals shall be on regular forms furnished by the City or its Engineers, Carl E. Green and Associates, 510 Henry Building, Portland 4, Oregon.

A certified check in the amount of five percent (5%) of the total bid shall accompany the proposal. Should the successful bidder fail to enter into a contract within ten days after notice of award, the City will retain the check.

SPECIFICATIONS FOR DRILLING, CASING & TEST PUMPING

1. General Information & Instructions

The work contemplated under these specifications includes the drilling, casing, development and test pumping of a well to be used as a source of water for the City. The site of the well is adjacent to a similar well drilled during 1948 in agricultural land south of the City near the southerly end of the approach to the Willamette River bridge on the St. Paul - Newberg highway.

Electric power of 440 Volts, 3 phase, 60 cycle A.C. is available and the location is readily accessible by truck from paved highway. Laterial from drilling operations may be disposed of on the site. If electric power is used during drilling or test pumping, the contractor shall make all arrangements for such service with the P.G.E. Co. office in Newberg and pay the cost of such service.

Based upon experience with a similar well drilled nearby in 1948, it is expected that the total depth will be about 100 feet and the formations sedimentary without solid rock. The water bearing formation is expected to be water worn and deposited gravels and sand. The well shall be cased full depth, the depth being determined by the engineer based upon materials removed from the well. The casing shall be thoroughly perforated at the water bearing formations in accordance with the Engineer's requirements.

2. Data on Formations

A log of the existing, nearby City well is available for review by prospective bidders. The City does not guarantee that the

formations at the proposed well site are the same as those previously encountered nearby. The bidders shall determine for themselves the character of the materials apt to be encountered in drilling, and the City shall not be held responsible if the drilling operations encounter formations different from those shown on its record of the existing well.

3. Prosecution of Work

Immediately after notice of award and signing of contract for the work, the Contractor shall obtain required casing and move his equipment and tools to the site and begin work. The City is interested in completion of the proposed well at an early date, consistent with first class workmanship and construction.

The Contractor shall carry on his operations without delay and in an efficient manner in order to complete the work in the shortest possible time and under favorable weather conditions.

4. Well Depth and Capacity

No specific depth is determined in advance of drilling but it is expected that the well will be about 100 feet deep. The Engineer shall dtermine the actual finished depth depending upon the materials and water bearing formations encountered.

The capacity of well desired is in the order of 750 to 1,000 gallons per minute with moderate draw down. Perforations in casing shall be sufficient in area to permit entrance into the casing of a flow of 1,000 G.P.II. with a velocity through the openings not to exceed 2 feet per second.

5. Construction Equipment & Operation

The Contractor shall furnish and use a drilling machine in good mechanical condition, adequately powered for the work to be done. Equipment shall include first class tools, cable, bailing equipment, perforator, etc. for all drilling operations and setting of casing.

Drilling operations shall be in charge of a competent, experienced driller.

6. Records and Log of Well

The Contractor shall keep a careful and accurate daily record of all operations, work done, hours of drilling, depths drilled, amount of casing set, formations encountered, level of water encountered, etc. and such data and records shall be available for inspection and review by the Engineer at all times.

Samples of materials taken from the well shall be kept for inspection by the Engineer. Such samples shall be kept for all of the various formations encountered. Upon completion of the work, the Contractor shall furnish in duplicate a complete and accurate log of the well showing all formations encountered, their depth, water levels, flows at various levels, depth of casing, etc. He shall also furnish in duplicate a record of the test pumping results.

7. Construction Methods

The Contractor shall conduct his operations so as to complete the well with a tight seal between the casing and the surrounding formations which will effectively prevent surface waters from following down the outside of the casing and entering the well or

the water bearing formation. If necessary to seal the upper portion of the work with cement grout or puddled clay, the Contractor shall do so at his expense.

Casing shall be installed and driven as the work progresses in order to prevent cave-ins and effectively seal out the upper formations Casing shall be installed for the full depth of the well.

Perforations shall be made by equipment especially made and efficient for the purpose, and the number and size of the openings shall be specified by the Engineer. After casing has been set and the perforations completed, the well shall be developed so as to remove sand, silt and other fines in the water bearing formation or formations by surging or agitating the water by plunger, compressed air, or other approved and efficient method, and by bailing out the materials carried into the well casing. Development work shall be continued until the gravel around the well in the water bearing formations is clean and free of sand, silt and other fine materials.

8. Casing

The entire well shall be cased to full depth with 12" I.D., standard weight, screw joint, National Tube Company or equal well casing pipe, subject to the approval of the Engineer. The driving shoe at the bottom of the casing shall be forged steel.

9. Workmanship

The well and casing shall be completed as near to perpendicular as is possible and practical, the resulting cased well being straight

and plumb for the installation of a suspended, deep well turbine pump, without the column nor bowls touching the casing. Maximum variation from perpendicular, straight line shall be three inches (3") per one hundred feet (100') of depth.

All joints in the casing shall be screwed up tight and secure, and the top of casing cut off and capped at the elevation determined by the Engineer.

At all times after the work begins, the top of the well casing shall be protected by a tight and heavy closure which will prevent the accidental or purposeful dropping of objects or materials into the well. Upon completion of the work, the Contractor shall provide and install a cap, which will effectively and securely protect the well from tampering before pumping equipment is purchased and installed.

10. Test Pumping

Upon completion of the well, the Contractor shall make a test of capacity under the directions of the Engineer. The equipment installed for testing shall have a capacity of not less than 1,000 G.P.M. and preferably 1200 to 1500 G.P.M. The test pump may be driven by electric motor, gas engine or diesel engine, but it shall be capable of variations in output over a wide range.

After the testing equipment is installed, the equipment shall be started up and run at low yield, then at variable speeds, with shutdowns and rapid starts to further surge and clear the formations and well of fines. After this has been done and the water is clear, and the well has been disinfected, the testing run shall begin. The rates of pumping shall be specified by the Engineer.

Continuous testing for no less than a twelve (12) hour period shall be required of the Contractor, and a detailed record of pumping

rates and water levels shall be kept.

11. Equipment for Testing

In addition to equipment for actual pumping of the well during the test period, the Contractor shall furnish and install an accurate measuring device for determining the flow of water. The equipment may consist of an accurately machined and installed orifice plate or Venturi tube together with connections for a manometer readings, or a weir box with accurately made weir plate suitable for flows in the range of 750 to 1500 G.P.'!. If an orifice plate or Venturi tube is used, the measuring throat shall be located in a straight run of pipe set horizontal and no less than twelve (12) diameters of straight pipe shall precede the throat.

An air line of accurately known length shall be installed between the test pump and the well casing and to this pipe an accurate pressure gauge shall be connected. Provision shall also be made for an air valve and a hand pump, all of which together will make it possible to accurately determine the water level before, during and after pumping, and the rate of recovery of water level after shutting down the pumping equipment.

12. Disinfection

After the well pumping equipment has been installed and the well surged in preparation for the extended pumping test, the well shall be disinfected by the addition of either sodium or calcium hypochlorite in solution having a total of available chlorine equivalent to one-half pound of chlorine. After adding the chlorine solution, the pump shall be started and run slowly until a strong

solution of chlorine is present in the well discharge. The equipment shall then be shut down and allowed to remain idle for not less than four (4) hours, after which the test pumping may begin.

13. Water Sampling

The Engineer or City's representative shall collect samples for bacterial and chemical analysis during the course of the test pumping run. The Contractor shall not be expected to furnish this service.

14. Records of Test Pumping

The Contractor shall keep accurate records of the test pumping run, and the data collected shall show the rate of pumping and water level every 15 minutes during the run. Readings shall also be taken and recorded each time the rate of pumping is changed or varied for any reason. Notations shall also be made relative to the presence of any gravel, sand, silt or turbidity in the water.

15. Maintenance and Clean-Up

The Contractor shall confine his operations, equipment, materials, supplies and personnel to an area reasonably needed for the operation and owned by the City. He may provide a small building for housing tools, fuel, supplies, equipment, etc. if he so desires, provided however, that same shall be removed upon completion of the work and acceptance by the City.

During drilling and testing, the Contractor shall arrange for carrying away waste water in a safe manner without damage to property. Upon completion of the work and capping of the well, the Contractor shall clean up the site, fill in any holes to uniform ground level, scatter any excess gravel, sand and soil and leave the site in a clean, neat and presentable condition.

Space around the top of the well casing shall be carefully and thoroughly puddled with clay or other impervious soil to prevent passage of surface water along the outside of the casing.

16. Basis of Payment

The work shall be done on a unit price basis, and payments shall be made for work actually done and for casing actually furnished. The estimated quantities used in the proposal sections are for the purpose of comparing bids, but they shall not be considered final. The City reserves the right to increase or diminish the quantities as the work may require.

- a. Drilling well payment per lineal foot for hole to receive 12" I.D. casing, from ground surface to bottom of well.
- b. Well Casing payment per lineal foot for 12" I.D. casing furnished and installed (and including cost of drive shoe).
- c. Perforations payment in lump sum for perforating casing as specified.
- d. Developing and Test Pumping lump sum for developing, disinfection, and test pumping for 12 hour period, and removing test pump and equipment.

e. Additional Testing - if the City should desire test pumping longer than 12 hours, the City will pay actual, out-of-pocket expense. Additional testing shall not exceed 24 hours in addition to the specified 12 hour period.





