Toaaquaint violators with the laws govening the operations of a motor vehicle in the City of Newburg and State of Oregon and to make them realize the seriousness of their violations. It is hoped that the violator, youngster or adult would relay the information obtained to his friends and also pass on to the Police Dept. any reports of serious violations which need attention.

The violator is to be cited to the Juvenidet Braffic Officer, He is given his choice of letting the Officer dispose of his case or be taken to regular Court. If he places his case in the Officers hands he will then be required to appear at Traffic School Saturday Morning at 8.30 AM. The course of instruction is to last to I2.00 Am If the case is serious, He will surrender his drivers Lic. to the Officer. It will be returnd when the Officer thinks he can drive in a safe manner.

If the results of the examanation is unsatisfactory he will be required to return the following Saturday.







With reference to the proposed improvement of 4th Street and College Street in the City of Newberg from the Pacific Highway West southerly to 4th Street and easterly along 4th Street to River Street which involves the changing of the Hillsboro-Silverton Secondary State Highway and a cooperative agreement between the City of Newberg and the State Highway Commission:

It is our understanding that the proposed change in the Hillsboro-Silverton Secondary Highway has been approved by the Yamhill County Court and we presume will be approved by the Highway Commission.

The city agreed to contribute \$2,500 of its share of the State Tax Street Funds for 19h7, and in addition to construct curbs and side-walks along the new route where no curbs or sidewalks now exist.

The city hereby agrees that it will enter into a formal agreement with the State Highway Commission with regard to these things, and also will agree to require the Public Utilities to set back its facilities at such points as may be required and will also make such changes in the city water system with regard to the moving of hydrants and pipe lines as may be required.

Where no curbs or sidewalks now exist along the proposed route, the construction shall be an obligation of the city or the property owners. If it is possible to do so, the city requests that these items be included in the general contract, and the city will make available to the State Highway Commission before the contract is awarded a sum of money sufficient to pay the cost thereof.

Where by reason of the reconstruction existing curbs and sidewalks are to be removed, the reconstruction shall be an obligation of the state.

This letter is being addressed to the Commission in lieu of a formal agreement until such time as a survey has been made and the things to be done by the city more definitely determined.

If our survey indicates that we can publish the records without loss to us, then we will publish in the same manner as we did in 1941 and for the twenty years preceding - mimeographed instead of printing.

Such a record can be published much faster than those printed by the state and you will therefore have much more use of them.

From 1928 to 1941 our price on this service was \$40.00 per year. Increased cost of labor since 1941, plus the added number of licenses issued, will more than double the expense of publishing.

Price set for 1947 is \$75.00 and if we receive enough orders on that basis, we will proceed with the work at once. If we do not, you will be notified.

With prompt action on your part and those who receive this letter, we will be able to put Volume #1 in your hands before April 1st and that will be followed by additional volumes much faster than the State was able to print them.

We solicit your cooperation at this time by giving us a prompt reply. If you want the books, sign the order enclosed and mail it at your earliest convenience. If you do not need the records, we will appreciate it if you will indicate that on the order form. But in any event, mail it back to us promptly.





- 2. The Meter Company shall advance all freight, supervision, and installation costs in connection with the delivery and installation of said meters. The installation supervisor will train the City-appointed maintenance man to properly maintain all meters installed under this agreement. The Company furnishes three (3) complete meter mechanisms and one (1) meter housing free for each one hundred (100) meters installed, for service purposes.
- 3. The Meter Company does hereby warrant and guarantee said meters against defects in work-manship, construction and materials for a period of one year from date of installation. The liability hereunder is limited to the obligation of The Meter Company hereby assumed to replace any parts proving to have such defects on the return thereof to it within said period. It is understood and agreed that The Meter Company shall not be obligated to replace any part or parts of said meters which may be damaged as a result of tampering, maliciousness, accident, acts of God, or any other external force or means.
- 4. Payments by The City to The Meter Company shall be solely from the receipts, funds and revenues obtained from the operation thereof and there shall be no obligation on the part of The City to pay for the same from any other source. The manner of payment of rental for said meters shall be as follows: The City shall deduct from the first receipts from the operation of said meters the actual cost of freight, supervision, and installation, and reimburse The Meter Company therefor. After the aforesaid deductions, all remaining receipts, funds and revenues from the operation of said meters shall be considered net revenue. Upon the fifteenth (15th) day after the installation of said meters and each and every thirtieth (30th) day thereafter The City shall pay as rental to The Meter Company fifty (50%) per cent of the net revenue from all meters so installed until The City exercises its option to purchase the meters and/or The Meter Company has received rentals and reimbursements for advances in the aggregate amount of the agreed value of the meters or until or unless this agreement is terminated or cancelled under the provisions of paragraph five (5) and six (6) hereof.
- 5. The Meter Company extends and grants unto The City the option to terminate this agreement at the expiration of the trial period by giving The Meter Company written notice thirty (30) days prior to the expiration of said period; but in that event, The Meter Company shall nevertheless be entitled to receive from The City and to retain as rental for the use of the meters fifty (50%) per cent of the net revenue from said meters, as aforesaid, which shall have accrued during that entire period, and until the meters are removed; and in the event of such cancellation or if The Meter Company shall exercise its right to cancel as provided in paragraph six (6) hereof, The Meter Company will, at the expiration of said period, at its own cost and expense, promptly proceed to remove said meters and repair any damage to the places in the pavements or other premises in which said meters were installed, and all obligation under the terms of this agreement shall cease and terminate, except as herein otherwise provided.
- 6. If at any time prior to the payment in full to The Meter Company of the agreed value, as aforesaid, of all said meters, rentals to The Meter Company since the installation of said meters, shall have averaged less than three (\$3.00) Dollars per month, per meter, or if The City shall violate this agreement or default in the full and faithful performance of this agreement, then The Meter Company may at its option cancel this agreement by giving to The City written notice of its intention to do so, and at any time after the tenth (10th) day following the giving of such notice, The Meter Company shall have the right, at its option with or without legal process or further notice of any kind, to enter upon the premises where said meters may be installed or kept and remove and retake the same for its own use, and to receive from The City as rental for the use of the meters the fifty (50%) per cent of net revenue from said meters as aforesaid which shall have accrued up to the time said meters are removed. Nothing herein contained shall be construed in any way limiting or affecting The Meter Company's right to pursue or enforce any remedy provided by law in the event of a breach of this agreement by The City.
- 7. If at any time prior to the payment in full to The Meter Company of the agreed value, as aforesaid, of all said meters any taxes are levied on meters installed, such as personal property tax, sales tax or use tax, such taxes will be advanced by The Meter Company, and The City shall reimburse The Meter Company in full from the gross receipts of the meters, before the net revenue is computed for the purposes of paragraph four (4) hereof.
- 8. It is understood and agreed that the title to all said meters shall be and remain in The Meter Company until and unless the full agreed value thereof, as aforesaid, shall have been paid in cash to The Meter Company, including the rentals aforesaid.
- 9. The Meter Company agrees that if The City pays it as rentals the full agreed value of said meters as aforesaid, it will deliver to The City a bill of sale therefor, free and clear of all encumbrances.

- 10. The Meter Company further covenants and agrees that it is the lawful owner of said meters and that the same are free and clear of all liens, contracts of conditional sales, chattel mortgages, and other encumbrances, and that The Meter Company has a lawful right to lease, dispose of, and sell the same, and that it will warrant and defend its title thereto against all claims whatsoever.
- 11. The Meter Company agrees to furnish the said meters with a mechanism regulated as to time as shall be mutually agreed to between The City and The Meter Company, and equipped with two slots, if so ordered by The City to receive coins of the denomination of 1c and 5c, and will be set to allow:

12 minutes for 1 penny
24 minutes for 2 pennies
36 minutes for 3 pennies
48 minutes for 4 pennies
60 minutes for 5 pennies, or, 1 nickel

72 minutes for 6 pennies, or, 1 nickel and 1 penny
84 minutes for 7 pennies, or, 1 nickel and 2 pennies
96 minutes for 8 pennies, or, 1 nickel and 3 pennies
108 minutes for 9 pennies, or, 1 nickel and 4 pennies
120 minutes for 10 pennies, or, 2 nickels.

or at any other available rate combination which may be mutually agreed upon.

- 12. It is understood and agreed that in case The Meter Company is delayed in the delivery of said meters on account of any strikes, lockouts or other labor trouble, or any fire, tornado, flood, embargo, shortage of transportation, material or labor, war, insurrection, civil commotion, or other cause beyond the direct and immediate and sole control of The Meter Company which may interfere with or delay the manufacture or delivery of said meters or any parts thereof. The Meter Company shall not be liable for any failure or delay to furnish said meters, and the time for furnishing same may be postponed accordingly.
- 13. It is agreed that The Meter Company may assign this agreement, or the benefits thereunder, in whole or in part, PROVIDED HOWEVER, that such assignment shall not release The Meter Company from its primary obligation to perform and keep all agreements and conditions of The Meter Company hereunder. When so assigned, it shall inure to the benefit of the assignee.
- 14. The City warrants that all necessary and proper steps have been or will be taken by the duly constituted Governmental and Municipal authorities authorizing the execution of this agreement and that all necessary or proper ordinances and/or resolutions have been or will be adopted authorizing and providing for the installation of said meters and the operation thereof, and agrees it will police the said meters after installation, and shall properly enforce all ordinances and resolutions pertaining thereto.
- 15. The City agrees to set up a special parking meter fund into which all receipts from all meters furnished hereunder shall be placed and kept. No withdrawals from said special parking meter fund shall be made until The Meter Company has been paid the cost of freight, supervision, and installation, and the fifty (50%) per cent of the net revenue has been paid to The Meter Company as hereinbefore provided, after which The City shall have the right to the remaining fifty (50%) per cent of the net revenue to use as they see fit.
- 16. This agreement shall be for a trial period of <u>one year</u>, commencing from the date of complete installation. The City shall have the option at the expiration of said trial period of entering into a further trial period.
- 17. No agent of The Meter Company shall have the power or authority to alter the terms and conditions of this agreement except its President, Vice-President, or Secretary and Treasurer. This agreement shall not be binding on The Meter Company until accepted and affirmed at its Chicago office. No other representations or agreement, written or oral, expressed or implied, have been made by either party.

To the City Council of Newberg:

We, whose names are hereunto subscribed, respectfully petition your honorable body to reconsider the present plan to widen College Street to the extent of Forty Feet, as it relates to and forms a part of highway 219, from 4th street north to the city limits.

Our objections, among others, are as follows:

- 1. It is our belief that property values along both sides of said street would be greatly impaired, due to the destruction of all the lovely shade trees, shrubs and parkways that have been undergoing development for many years and are now regarded as the finest in the city.
 - 2. That the proposed College Street route would send traffic across First Street at its busiest intersection. That the heavily loaded logging trucks from the coast mountains would turn at this point and immediately become a menace to the free flow of travel to and from the Union and Junior High Schools.
 - That it would be necessary for hundreds of people to cross this highway artery to reach the Post Office, schools, churches, the central business section and places of amusement, who would not be thereby endangered if an alternate route were chosen.
 - 4. That our whole people would be greatly inconvenienced and annoyed throughout the whole period of construction.
 - The alternate route suggested for highway 219, if there is to be a change in its present location, would be via Meridian Street, which is 36 feet in width and already paved for almost the entire distance.

In view of these considerations, will you not review the entire matter and see if a better plan is possible that the one thus far advanced?

To the Newberg City Council Gentlemen:

In connection with your avowed plan to permit the widening of College Street to extent of Forty feet, I have received copies of letters to the Council and State Highway Commission, wherein, Levi T. Pennington states practical and valid reasons why this should not be done. To these objections I sincerely concur.

The simpler and less costly alternative proposal for routing Secondary highway 219 from Fourth Street, is respectfully submitted Via Meridian Street, now complete in every respect for the purpose. Continuing North to Vermillion Street, where, from a suitable point along its course, physical connection can be had with the said highway, over terrain that at present has little but nuisance value. The Union Oil Company plant would be by-passed to the East.

It is hoped that the Council will give serious consideration to the above proposal, before committing all the citizens to the inconveniences of the proposed change, as well as, the destruction of affected residential property values by One Third.

To the Newberg City Council: --

Gentlemen: --

When I wrote you some days ago about the proposal to put the Hillsboro-Woodburn highway through the city along College street, I suggested that it be routed instead down Edwards street, which it seems to me has many advantages over the College street route, as I tried to point out in my previous letter.

At that time I was under the impression that Vermilion street, on which the route as at present turns east after crossing the tracks, did not run through to Meridian street, but it does. I wonder if you have considered that street for this Hillsboro-Woodburn highway. It seems to me that it has all the advantages over the College street routing that Edwards street has, and a good many others. In the first place, it is already paved from Vermilion street to Fourth, to a width of 35 feet or more, a width that will allow parking on both sides of the street and still leave a two lane highway its full length, without the destruction of shade trees, the spoiling of parkways and the other disadvantages of the College street route.

Another thing that it seems to me ought to be taken into consideration is the fact that this route would do away with the necessity of so much crossing of this Hillsboro-Woodburn highway, by all sorts of people, but especially by students of the various schools. Meridian Street is two blocks east of College street. If the route were down Meridian street, it would save all the folks between College and Meridian and between Fourth and Vermilian from the necessity of crossing this highway on their way to school, to the post office, to the banks, to the groceries, and to practically all the business, religious, social and amusement centers of the city.

I am told that eventually, and perhaps soon, the State Highway Commission intend to improve the situation as this highway enters Newberg from the north, by eliminating the sharp turn to Vermilian stree and then the sharp turn south. Well, at present the highway crosses four railroad tracks; if the College street route is selected, it will cross three, even after the sharp turns have been eliminated; if the Meridian street route is chosen, it will cross one. And Meridian Street runs much farther north than either College or Edwards, and it seems to me that it would not be more difficult to secure right of way and make the highway go out Meridian street than either of the other routes; and the advantages seem to me so great that it would be far better to incur that expense than to send this highway right through the center of town. There are rumors that the State Highway Commission are again considering the change of U.S. 99W to a location north of the railroad tracks, to get this heavy traffic off of First street and away from the center of the business district. What reason, then, for sending this secondary highway through the heart of the city?

To the City Council of Newberg.

Gentlemen: --

A representative of the State Highway Commission called on me one day this week, in response to inquiries that I had made concerning the proposed route through Newberg of the Hillsboro-Woodburn Highway. We went over the route that has been proposed, as I understood him by the city council, and over another route which I suggested to him, one block farther east. He stated that this suggested route on Edwards Street would answer the purposes of the Highway Commission, and stated that in his judgment it was up to the people of Newberg to decide, through the city council, which of the two routes was to be used. I am hoping that the council will reconsider the matter, and give careful study to the proposed route down Edwards Street.

It seems to me that there are serious objections to the route down College Street, some of which may be listed as follows:

- 1. This route, with the widening of the pavement from Second to Fourth Street, would destroy a large number of fine shade trees; and the future widening of the pavement north of Hancock Street, which though not in the immediate plan will be done before long, to make the widening of the street south of Second effective, with destroy many more lovely trees and mar some of the most attractive parkways in the city.
- 2. This College Street route would put this traffic past three active churches, two of them among the largest in the city.
- 3. This College Street Route would send all this traffic across First Street at the busiest corner in the city, a place where traffic is already most congested.
- 4. This route would send this traffic right down the street which carries most of the traffic both to the Union High School and to the Junior High School, which will create an additional hazard for our young people.

There are other objections to this College Street route, but perhaps none other need be listed.

The other route, down Edwards Street, seems to me to have all the advantages of the College Street route, whatever they are, and to be far better in some respects.

- 1. This Edwards Street route would require no more turns that the other. It would simply go one block further east that the other before turning south, and would then turn east again on Fourth Street, just as the other route would do.
- 2. This route would pass only one church instead of three.

3. This Edwards Street route would Cross First street at a much less busy corner than First and College.

- 4. This Edwards Street route would not be along the street which carries most of the travel to the High Schools, and would be far safer for our young people.
- 5. This Edwards Street route would destroy much fewer fine trees, and mar much fewer lovely parkways. Edwards Street is less built up than College, and in future improvements those who make their parkways and plant their trees could do it with the knowledge that the trees should be set faurther back from the street center, as those on College Street' would have done had they ever supposed that the street would be widened as is contemplated in the present plan.

In view of these and other considerations, would not the city council be willing to reconsider their request for the routing of this traffic down College Street, and give careful consideration to the proposed route down Edwards Street?

With hearty appreciation of all the good work that you do for the city, without remuneration and sometimes without proper appreciation, and with the hope that you may find it to your best interests and that of the people of the city to make this change in your request to the State Highway Commission,







Gentlemen:

At its regular meeting in Portland on November 24, the State Sanitary Authority reviewed the status of the state-wide program for the installation of municipal sewage treatment works which must be constructed by cities who now use public waters of the state of Oregon for the disposal of domestic sewage and other wastes.

The Sanitary Authority considers that your city has made reasonable progress either in planning for construction of sewage treatment works or in the adoption of a fiscal program to defray the cost of construction when conditions permit. Inasmuch as your city, however, discharges its wastes into a stream where pollution problems are serious, every effort should be made to undertake construction of your sewage treatment works at an early date.

In the meantime, the Authority desires that you furnish them before their special meeting to be held in Portland on January 10, 1948, an up-to-date report on the status of your sewerage project. This report should indicate the status of plans for your sewerage project which include intercepting sewers, pumping stations, treatment works, the estimated cost of the proposed sewerage project, together with the plan by which your city proposes to finance the construction of such sewage works, and the amount of moneys accumulated in sinking funds and set aside to finance such sewerage works construction.

Your cooperation in furnishing the Authority with the requested information will be greatly appreciated.
