### Northwest Accreditation Alliance Award of Compliance for the Dalles Police Department

The Dalles Police Department recently achieved accredited status from the Northwest Accreditation Alliance. This accomplishment took a great effort from the Police Department and demonstrates TDPD's commitment to excellence in 21<sup>st</sup> Century Community Policing. The effort included a full revision and modernization of the Department's Policy and Procedures manual as well as the property and evidence manual. Hundreds of documents were provided to the accreditation assessors to prove compliance with the highest standards in law enforcement.

The city of The Dalles Police Department is a full service law enforcement agency. The Dalles is the county

seat of Wasco County Oregon. The Department has 26 sworn officers Captain, five Patrol Sergeants, one Detectives, and 14 Patrol non-sworn positions within the professional support staff a part animal control officer, and a fullofficer. Half of the police officer Department due to turnothe Department include 24/7, 365 and detectives' response, special traffic safety enforcement, police

There are four department including two time evidence technician, an time codes enforcement positions are new to the ver. Programs supported by patrol response, major crimes emergency response team, reserves, city watershed patrol

and water resource security, school safety, and evidence and property management. The Department also supports crisis intervention, community drug take back, and a chaplain.

The Dalles Police Department is the first accredited agency in the Columbia gorge region. To maintain this status TDPD will undergo reassessment every three years. Chief Worthy said, "I am so proud of the efforts of my team at TDPD and I hope that the citizens of The Dalles and our visitors see this as a testament to our commitment to excellence in public service".

### COLUMBIA GORGE REGIONAL AIRPORT SOUTH APRON AND TAXIWAY PROJECT

Columbia Gorge Regional Airport is a very busy place this fall. We received our FAA grant and 4 Oregon Dept of Aviation grants. At the conclusion of these projects we will have 5 new taxiways and the available space to build 6 more rows of hangars. We will also have a new fuel apron and above ground 100LL self-serve fuel system and a new 100kw generator tied into the fuel and lighting systems to keep everything going in the event of a catastrophic event. A good



portion of the work has been completed this fall and will resume in the spring when we have the ability to pave and finish work. It has been a great year at the airport with lots of successful projects and flying.







### BEAUTIFICATION & TREE COMMITTEE TREE GRANT PROGRAM

The City of The Dalles Beautification and Tree Committee recently completed its first residential tree grant program, awarding 25 trees to members of the community who applied for the grants. The tree varieties

provided were October Glory Maple, Exclamation! London Plane Tree, Autumn Blaze Maple, and Washington Hawthorn. The trees are 8-10 feet tall now and will grow to a mature height of 25' to 50', depending on the species.

The purpose of the project was to help residents beautify and improve their property with trees. Trees not only enhance our homes' beauty and value, but they provide essential shade as summers get hotter, cooling our yards and saving





energy. Trees improve soil, air, and water quality and provide habitat for wildlife.

The Beautification and Tree Committee hopes to make this residential tree grant program an annual event, and plans to expand on the project with the help of grants from the state and other sources. 2024 grant applications will be available.

### **Healthy Trees for a Beautiful City**

Trees in the city provide many benefits. According to the Oregon Department of Forestry, trees lower levels of noise and dust, reduce temperature, provide shade and increase property value. But sometimes, trees near streets and sidewalks can grow into too much of a good thing and create a safety hazard.

Trees in The Dalles are cared for by citizens, not City staff, except in the Downtown Area. It is the owner's or occupant's responsibility to reduce the hazard when a tree on their property or on the right-of-way next to their property blocks public walkways and streets.

This year the City is asking citizens to make a special effort to prevent damage to street trees. Pruning low hanging branches before a collision breaks them is healthier for trees. Tree trimming also prevents damage to tall vehicles like recreational vehicles, garbage trucks and school buses.

#### **Plan Proper Pruning for Safe Streets**

Proper pruning or trimming is important for the health of your trees and shrubs. The best time to plan your late-winter pruning strategy is while branches are bare.

The Arbor Day Foundation website provides tree trimming guidance. "Pruning during dormancy is the most common practice. It results in a vigorous burst of new growth in the spring and should be used if that is the desired effect. It is usually best to wait until the coldest part of winter has passed."

If you want to slow or dwarf the growth of trees and shrubs, prune in mid-summer.

The Arbor Day Foundation website has a tree care video library to show you pruning basics.

City of The Dalles Municipal Code 11.20.020 regulating street trees requires all trees growing near a sidewalk street or alley to be trimmed so that the limbs and branches are not less than nine (9) feet above the sidewalk and not less than fourteen (14) feet above the street. These trim requirements allow safe passage for pedestrians on sidewalks as well as garbage trucks and school buses traveling on streets and alleys.

City of The Dalles Municipal Code 5.24.020 requires vegetation that impairs the view of a public treet or impairs the view of any traffic control device to be controlled or removed. These trim virgements allow vehicles to see oncoming traffic and obey traffic signs.

### **PROTECT YOURSELF FROM MERCURY!**

#### What is so bad about Mercury?

Mercury is a naturally occurring element. But it is highly toxic, resists breaking down in the environment, and accumulates in the food chain. Mercury can permanently affect fetal and child development and can damage the brain, kidneys, and lungs.

#### What are major sources of mercury pollution?

Mercury is released through coal-burning energy production, some industrial processes, abandoned mines, garbage incineration, improper disposal, and accidental spills. Rain carries it from the air to watersheds where it can accumulate in the food chain, affecting certain types of fish.

#### How does mercury get into my body?

People are most commonly exposed to mercury by eating mercury contaminated fish. People who may become or are pregnant, and children are most susceptible to mercury poisoning. Susceptible people should be cautious of eating more than one fish meal from any source in a week. Certain kinds of large ocean fish should not be eaten at all, as well as some freshwater fish. See advisories and consumption guidelines for fish harvested in Oregon waters in the **RESOURCES** section.

Other routes of exposure are from breakage of mercury-containing devices such as mercury thermometers or fluorescent tubes.

#### How can I help?

Substitute mercury-containing products with mercury-free products.

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- Dispose of mercury-containing products at a household hazardous waste collection event or facility.
- Practice energy efficiency to help reduce demand for coal-fired energy. .

### Be a Leak Seeker

The City owns the lines up to the meter but after the meter is private property. The City does not determine the location of a leak, fix a leak, or troubleshoot problems on private property. We recommend if you suspect a problem you start investigating it right away. If you would like the meter to be shut off please contact the Utility Billing Department at (541) 506-2031, if after hours, and it is an emergency please call (541) 980-7703 for the on-call service person.

#### Identify the source of a leak

- Identify toilet leaks by placing a drop of food coloring in the toilet tank. If any color shows up in the bowl after 10 minutes, you have a leak. (Be sure to flush immediately after the experiment to avoid staining the tank.)
- Look for dripping sink and bathtub faucets and showerheads. Wornout washers typically cause faucet and showerhead leaks.
- Check under and around sinks for wet spots, a musty smell or bowed cabinetry.
- Be alert to wall or ceiling discoloration, bubbling paint or bulging wallpaper.
- Look and listen for running or dripping water on refrigerators with ice/water dispensers, humidifiers, clothes washers, dishwashers, and water heaters.

All of the above are signs of a leak, but keep in mind that not all water leaks are plumbing leaks. The water could also be coming from a leak in the roof or around a window. Either way, leaks should be addressed promptly to reduce the risk of water damage.

Water meters in The Dalles are equipped with special meter reading equipment. Please do not open your water meter to look for leaks. To avoid damage to your meter, call a serviceperson if you need help with a



meter test on weekdays from 7:00 a.m. to 3:00 p.m. (541) 296-5401. A leak detection meter test will take about a half hour. An adult resident must be present during a meter test appointment.

#### **Request for Leak Adjustment**

The City does offer an adjustment to the bill for qualifying leaks. The City will consider adjusting the customer's highest bill for up to half of the excess usage for that month's bill due to a water leak that occurs between the City water meter and the line to the customer's home. The general process is as follows:

- Notify the City of any leak that has been discovered as soon as possible.
- Repair the leak within 5 working days from the time of discovery. You may ask for an extension based on extenuating circumstances.
- Submit the completed Leak Adjustment Form at <u>thedalles.org/leakadjustmentform</u>, with proof of repair within 30 days.
- A 2<sup>nd</sup> leak within a (12) twelve-month period will only be considered if it is unrelated to the first. The customer must provide the Utility Billing Department documentation noting the difference between the 1<sup>st</sup> and the 2<sup>nd</sup>
- The Utility Billing Staff will contact the Customer once the review is completed.
