Ground Water Treatment Plant History

- Constructed in 1953
 - 1953 population: 4,000
 - 2021 population: over 25,000
 - 2035 est. population: over 38,000
- Expanded and upgraded in 1961, 1970, 1980, 1997, 2006
- Vulnerable to severe damage seismic upgrades due
- OHA requires covers for filters and basins
- Many parts aging and near end of life
- Can't support full capacity





Modern, Resilient Treatment Plant

- Modern facility and treatment
- Designed and built to current requirements and code
- Build what we need now
- Expandable and flexible for community's growth
- Efficient. 25-50% reduction in Operations & Maintenance Costs



Proposed new facility with 30- to 50-year design life



Community Benefits from a New, Modern Facility


- Delivers best value for investment
- Provides safe, high-quality water
- Plans for water use in the future
- Ensures reliable water treatment after an earthquake or other disasters



Schedule

- Oregon Health Authority Drinking Water Section has agreed to give Newberg time to build a compliant water plant.
 - Must be operational by September 1, 2027
- Council Awards design contract on October 3, 2022.





In order to meet the State's 2027 deadline, the traditional design – bid – build process will not be feasible.




Construction Manager/General Contractor (CM/GC)

What is the Construction Manager/General Contractor (CM/GC) Method?

The CM/GC project delivery method consists of two phases-design and construction.

When the owner considers the design to be complete, the construction manager then has an opportunity to bid on the project based on the completed design and schedule. If the owner, designer and independent cost estimator agree that the contractor has submitted a fair price, the owner issues a construction contract and the construction manager then becomes the general contractor.

The contractor acts as the consultant during the design process and can offer constructability and pricing feedback on design options and can identify risks based on the contractor's established means and methods. As noted earlier, this process also allows the owner to be an active participant during the design process and make informed decisions on design options based on the contractor's expertise.





Exemption from Public Bidding Use CM/GC Project Method

- A competitive RFP process will be used to solicit the CM/GC
- The process is unlikely to encourage favoritism in public contracts or substantially diminish competition
- Will result in substantial cost savings to the City
 - Participation of the contractor in the design of the plant in the CM/GC process more easily incorporates quality materials and equipment.
 - Selections based on performance, integration with current systems, and cost of entire life-cycle rather than the lowest initial price
- Will result in a shorter schedule
- The required notice have been published in the Daily Journal of Commerce on September 2, 2022



Recommendation

 Adopt Resolution No. 2022-3844 to allow the use of the CM/GC Project Delivery Method for the New Groundwater Treatment Plant September 19, 2022 Council Minutes Exhibit B

Written testimony for the 9/19/2022 City Council meeting:

I am writing with regard to Resolution number 2022-3844 regarding the Water Treatment Plant. I have two questions:

- 1) In the Executive Summary, it states that the owner, designer, and independent cost estimator can decide that the contractor has submitted a fair price and award the contract to that contractor. Is the City Council included in this process as "owner"? More specifically, will the eventual decision to award the construction contract be brought before the Council for their approval?
- 2) The Resolution lists the funding sources, but does not mention water SDCs. Is the capacity of the new plant expected to be greater than the capacity of the existing plant? If so, why are SDCs not planned to be used to fund the additional capacity?

I do expect to attend the meeting virtually and raise these two questions.	I'm providing them in
advance with the hope that answers will be provided.
