#### 2. OLD BUSINESS:

#### 2.1 Gazebo Update

Larry Anderson, City Engineer, brought committee members up-to-date on the Francis Square project, explaining the previous drawing was expanded to make the gazebo twelve feet across with a concrete base, ramp, & expanded roof. The basic plan is to be completed later in the week. Larry requested input on how to dress up the final design and a discussion of possible labor and material sources followed. Suggestions and comments included:

- Rod Iron around sides of gazebo
- Old Fashioned Bicycle as weathervane
- Contract, donated, and volunteer labor from such sources as the Kiwanis and Newberg Concrete
- Donated park benches

Chairperson Bob Weaver and Mayor Donna Proctor suggested a city-wide recognition of contributors to the project to include a band and national guard.

#### 2.2 Francis Square

Larry Anderson reported that is was impractical to put dyed, stamped concrete over the entire square and that it would only be placed along the borders. PGE will more the service pole further into the square and drop electrical service. Following the first concrete pour, which is in progress, fill will be brought in and volunteers will be needed for landscaping. Mayor Donna

Proctor indicated that Sid Freadman would be willing to help with the landscaping. Johann May is to meet with Duane Cole to discuss putting trellises on the wall and other related issues.

#### 2.3 Adoption of goals for 1997

Chairperson Bob Weaver reviewed the following goals:

- Government Fair. Government Day will be discussed after the City Council approves the goal.
- To develop and promote the use of a City Flag. The Committee is still looking for the rumored past city flag with a Camellia flower. It was suggested that art students at schools compete for design of a new flag.
- ► Commitment to completion of Francis Square and the Gazebo projects

Library Director Leah Griffith distributed copies of the Library Update which is now distributed every other month. Highlights included:

- To reduce costs the library is now calling people who have over due books instead of mailing notices

- The reference librarian is leaving and the library will need to reconfigure staff.
- Web page design orientation class coming
- Historical displays at the library through the end of the week

#### 1. CALL MEETING TO ORDER:

1.1 Review and approve minutes of January 28, 1997

Bob Weaver called the meeting to order at 12:10 p.m.

**Motion: Stiefbold/May** to approve the minutes of the January 28<sup>th</sup>, 1997, as written. Motion carried and minutes will be placed on file.

#### 2. OLD BUSINESS:

2.1 Francis Square

Larry Anderson, City Engineer, brought committee members up-to-date on the Francis Square project, explaining which portions of the project are complete and which portions are yet to be done. Public Works is currently installing conduits for the sprinklers and electrical power. Distributed was a breakdown of the budget for the project. Anderson explained that funds budgeted for this project for the '96-'97 budget year have been drained; the next phase will need to be donated funds or budgeted by the City Council in the '97-98 budget year.

Fund raising was the next issue of discussion. Suggestions and comments included:

- Need an organized effort
- Fund raising should begin once the landscaping is completed
- Consider allowing one or more community service clubs "adopt" the clock tower
- Promote the square and fundraising project by putting a display in the library and re-erect the sign in Francis Square

Committee concurred with the City Manager that the Gazebo Project be completed prior to beginning the fund raising efforts for Francis Square.

#### 3. NEW BUSINESS:

3.1 Goal Setting for 1997 - Adopt three working goals for 1997

Among the City Council goals were three for the Community Relations Committee to consider:

1. Promote the development and display of the City flag (High Priority)

- 2. Promote and organize a local government day with a local government fair (High Priority)
- 3. Complete the development of Francis Square (High Priority)

It was noted there is no funding for the City flag proposal. Suggested that Economic Development money might be used for the estimated \$100 per flag. Questions to be answered prior to making a decision on this goal included:

- A. In what area will the flags be displayed on First Street, how far along First Street?
- B. How many flags are needed?
- C. Need estimate of cost
- D. Where and how should the flags be mounted for display?

Regarding the suggestion for a Government Faire or Government Awareness Day, it was suggested the event be held in late summer for better weather allowing for an outdoor event. Other suggestions included holding it in Francis Square, making it an open house type event at each City department, with a raffle. Maps to the different departments would be provided, with "stamps" needed at each department to make the visitor eligible for the drawing. City department heads should be available for the day-long event.

Consensus was that Francis Square should remain a goal for 1997. It was noted another 1996 goal, the Gazebo Project, was approved by the City Council. There cannot be an appeal of the decision and the new, small gazebo will be constructed in Memorial Park. The gazebo will be a memorial to Newberg veterans.

Committee members should be prepared at the next meeting to adopt three goals, not limited to those suggested by the City Council. Other suggestions for goals should be sent to Chairman Bob Weaver at PO Box 666 to be included in discussion at the next meeting.

#### 4. OTHER:

Mayor Proctor advised that there are several vacancies on City Council Committees and encouraged committee members to seek qualified applicants to fill these positions.

#### 5. REPORTS:

#### Library:

Library Director Leah Griffith turned Committee's attention to the written report. Highlights included:

- 85<sup>th</sup> Anniversary of the Newberg Public Library celebration on March 12
- Friends Book Sale due
- Internet Orientation scheduled for March 6
- Approximately 15 new volunteers have signed up.
- Evaluator for the Senior Outreach grant will be on site on Friday, Feb 28.

#### Police:

Deputy Chief Stan Newland distributed copies of the monthly report. Highlights included:

- The 1997 Citizen Academy has been cancelled.
- Reserve Ken Howell was hired as a full time officer under a COPS Universal grant

Newland displayed an architectural sketch depicting orientation of the new police facility. Newland strssesed that the sketch was preliminary and that changes or adaptations should be expected.

#### Fire:

Fire Chief Sherman directed Committee members to his written report included in the agenda packet. Of particular note was the fact that Burn Season begins on March 1<sup>st</sup>.

It was suggested that Chief Sherman review the condition of the tape recording answering the Fire Department Burn line to check its message and clarity of message.


Responding to a question from Ms. Stiefbold, Deputy Chief Newland addressed the issue of drugs in Newberg.


As you can see we have received another application for an OLCC license for H-Market (Everybody's Market). It appears that Nafisa Mahmood is adding Fakeer Rahim as a partner in the business. If you recall Nafisa Mahmood has been animate in the past that Rahim was not a part owner in this establishment while Rahim has indicated several times that he and Habib Naseri were the owners.

Our concern currently is with Mr. Rahim being the responsible person for an OLCC package store permit. He was the primary person inside the establishment over the past years when we were having all of our problems with the store. Those problems primarily involved alcohol and persons under 21 years of age, resulting in numerous complaints from the community along with arrests for minor in possession of alcohol and selling alcohol to a minor. One of those arrests was of Mr. Rahim himself. Since the establishment lost its OLCC permit we have had relatively few problems at that location.

Because of the past problems we have experienced with the establishment and Mr. Rahim, I would suggest that the City recommend against the OLCC permit.

#### RESOLUTION NO. 96-1965



RESOLUTION AUTHORIZING THE CITY MANAGER TO APPROVE OLCC LIQUOR LICENSE APPLICATIONS PURSUANT TO THE OLCC APPLICATION PROCESS FOR LIQUOR LICENSE APPLICANTS WITHIN THE CITY OF NEWBERG AND REPLACING RESOLUTION NO. 89-1377.

#### RECITALS:

- 1. The City of Newberg is requested to give its endorsement on liquor license renewal applications for various businesses throughout the City on an annual basis.
- 2. The City has an established procedure by which the applicants are referred to the Police Department for background checks, endorsement and recommendations.
- 3. The Council wants to delegate the authority to the City Manager to endorse such applications as long as no significant problems exist and provide for a procedure to address appeals.

**NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED** by the City Council of the City of Newberg. Oregon, as follows:

- 1. That the City Council authorizes the City Manager to endorse the annual liquor license renewal applications for the various businesses throughout the City of Newberg as requested by the Oregon Liquor Control Commission pursuant to the following procedures:
  - A. Upon receipt of the application or request of endorsement by the business, the application will be referred to the Newberg Police Department for review.
  - B. The Police Chief or a designee shall provide a recommendation whether to grant or deny the endorsement and any liquor license related problems or other enforcement problems that might be occurring at the business or with the owners, or managers, or employees of the business.
  - C. After taking into consideration the Police Department's recommendation, the City Manager shall decide whether to recommend to the Oregon Liquor Control Commission that the application be granted or denied.
- 2. If the City Manager decides not to endorse the license, the applicant shall have ten (10) days from the date of written notification of denial from the City Manager to appeal the City Manager's decision in writing to the Community Relations Committee. The Community Relations Committee shall have thirty (30) days to

hold a hearing on the proposed appeal unless an extension is requested by the appellant. The Community Relations Committee shall receive information supporting the denial from the City Manager, City Attorney or Police Chief and any written documentation from the applicant. This information shall be provided at least seven (7) days prior to the Community Relations Committee meeting at which the appeal is to be heard.

- 3. If the Community Relations Committee decides not to endorse the license, the applicant shall have ten (10) days from the date of written notification of denial from the City Manager on the behalf of the Community Relations Committee to appeal the Committee's decision in writing to the City Council. The City Council shall receive information supporting the denial from the City Manager. City Attorney or Police Chief and any written documentation from the applicant. This information shall be provided at least seven (7) days prior to the City Council meeting at which the appeal is to be heard.
- 4. The City Council shall provide an opportunity for the applicant and interested parties to be heard. The decision by the City Council to recommend to the OLCC that the application be granted or denied shall be final.


# **Newberg Fire Department**

Month End Report

February 1997

#### Meetings:

This month the department responded to 165 calls, 118



of which were medical related calls. The staff and volunteers attended their normal meetings; apparatus night, drill nights, business meeting, EMS meeting, officer's meeting, case reviews, and a department staff meeting. The Fire Chief attended City Council meetings, Newberg Rural Fire Protection District Board meeting, Oregon Fire Chiefs' (OFCA), weekly Rotary meetings. Community Relations, and Budget Committee meetings.

Al Blodgett, as President, attended the meeting of the Willamette Fire Instructors' Association at Polk County Fire District #1. Al Blodgett and Jill Dorrell attended an Old Fashioned Festival Committee meeting. Dorrell, Secretary of Oregon Volunteer Firefighters Association (OVFA), attended an Oregon Burn Center Advisory Council meeting at Emanuel Hospital, a regular OFVA board meeting, and the Oregon Fire Office Administrators Conference held in Portland.

#### EMS:

Division Chief/EMS Coordinator Frank Douglas attended an Oregon Fire Medical Administrators Association (OFMAA) meeting in Lebanon. He also taught a Water Rescue class at the Newberg Fire Department.

#### Fire Prevention & Investigation:

Division Chief/Fire Marshal Chris Mayfield hosted a Yamhill County Fire Investigation Team (FIT) meeting at the fire station. Chris also investigated five fires this month, and taught a fire extinguisher class.

At February's business meeting, the membership voted to purchase two Global Positioning System (GPS) units. They will be used for establishing scene coordinates when LifeFlight has been activated. These units will be carried on the first out ambulance and the rescue

Also at February's business meeting the membership voted to accept the recommendation of a committee chaired by Rod Meade for the

disposition of a \$20,000.00 donation received from the trust fund of the late Ernest and Marion DeAlton. recommendation was to disburse the funds as follows: \$3,000.00 for the purchase of dive rescue equipment (the City has budgeted \$2,000.00 for this purchase); up to \$15,000.00 for the upgrade of the Hurst tool (added to this money will be the donation from the Newberg Community Foundation): all remaining funds would be placed in a contingency fund. Upon completion of the above projects, the committee and the membership will revisit the use of remaining monies.

The Centennial Committee is in the planning process for NFD's 100th Birthday. At the last business meeting Chairperson Rod Meade announced a request for a t-shirt design. suggestions to be presented to the department soon. Plans call for a centennial design t-shirt to be ready for sale by May 9, 1997, a year in advance to the big celebration. Plans are also in the works for a cobalt blue centennial coffee mug and medallion. again Meade emphasized ANYONE with historical stories or pictures contact the department.



#### Long Range Plan Activities:

- The Internet Orientation sessions are continuing monthly. A volunteer is assisting with the presentations along with a library staff member.
- Measure 47 again meant a number of meetings with city staff, library staff, library board, and city council and the budget committee in February. Victoria Fee, hired as a reference librarian in October tendered her resignation to take a full-time job in New Mexico where the outlook for library positions is much brighter. She has indicated the only reason she was looking for another job was the uncertainty of Measure 47 and her future with the City of Newberg. She will be leaving the end of March. That will put us short two staff members since we did not fill the children's reference position in November. Scheduling will need to be adjusted accordingly.
- The Library continues to offer both state and federal tax forms to the public as a service.
- A series of gardening programs is being held in February and March in cooperation with the Master Gardeners of Yamhill County. The High School Drama Club presented another quality play for children to a packed audience.
- A volunteer has designed a new Internet Web page for the Library. You can find it on your computer at www.open.org/newlibr
- The library is developing a CDBG application for building improvements to meet the Americans with Disabilities Act. The grant will be submitted in March.
- A program discussing the qualities of children's picture books was held in February. A number of
  families as well as adults participated in the Mock Caldecott Award program to select their favorite
  picture book of 1996.
- Storytimes continue to be very popular with crowds of 40 or even 60 preschoolers at a time attending to hear stories, sing songs, and learn about language.

#### 1996-97 Budget Objectives Activities

- The Library Friends held their first book sale of the year in February and raised \$1,500.
- Library staff hosted the regional library system meeting in February and prepared the regional newsletter as well.
- The Partners for Senior Services grant was completed in February with an evaluation by an outside
  evaluator to be submitted by March 31. The program has really started to take off with a number of
  homebound individuals requesting service. We serve those individuals with volunteers selecting
  books for them and volunteers from the Interfaith Volunteer Caregivers program actually
  delivering the books to their homes.
- Volunteer training sessions were held twice in February. The volunteer program continues to bring
  in quality individuals to assist with library activities. The staff and volunteers work well together
  as a team.


