Weaver indicated that it would be nice, but left the time line up to City Staff. Weaver reminded May that May was to produce a plan/drawing of what he envisioned how the kiosk would appear. Weaver indicated he did not think it feasible to get funding for a clock in addition to the kiosk.

Weaver asked that a Committee be appointed to plan a dedication ceremony for Francis Square, noting that Audra Fisher should be involved. Proctor indicated that everyone should be part of the committee. Discussion following regarding what is expected for the dedication. Suggestions included:

Dick Meyer distributed photographs of steel benches manufactured by All Fab Steel. The benches are painted with a near-porcelain finish and cost \$750 each.

By consensus, the Community Relations Committee directed Staff to No one being opposed, the Community Relations Committee approved the purchase of benches for Francis Square at \$750 each.





# w Hours Start

People start coming in earlier each day

Phase 1 of the Library's expanded hours was implemented in August. The doors to the building were open at 10 am on Tuesdays through Saturdays starting on August 4th. In September, the hours will be fully expanded with the addition of evening hours (until 8:30 pm) on Tuesdays, Wednesdays, and Thursdays. These new hours have proven popular so far and it is anticipated that when school starts in September the extra time in the evening will be heavily used.

In celebration of the expanded hours, programs will be held the first two weeks of September. These include a paperback exchange, a prize drawing, and a presentation from the Oregon Chautauqua programs, "An evening with George Washington" on September 10th.

Summer Reading activities finished in August. All three programs offered had high levels of participation by area residents.

The program for elementary school aged children had 726 children register and an average of 390 children come in each week to report their reading activity. Also 1,364 children and their parents attended the weekly programs held from June through August 5th. The highlights included the kick-off summer carnival with 411 children registering for the program that day, the juggler, that brought in 350 people (and also sent them outside when he set off our fire alarm system with his flaming torches!) and Pigtasia, the final program that featured three performing pigs. Pigtasia was held at the Public Safety Training Room due to its greater size which accommodated the large crowds successfully. Sandi Olmstead, children's librarian, is to be commended for her excellent program.

The adults and young adults had their own programs to encourage reading and they participated regularly. Young Adults had the opportunity to win a variety of prizes for reading and 79 of them did just that. They read, completed trivia sheets, or even read to a preschooler to earn the chance to win a Leonardo DiCaprio book, signed pictures of movie stars and of course pizza.

Adults were pleased to have their summer program back after it was canceled last year. With 81 signing up, only about half that were lucky enough to win a prize, but all had great fun reading and completing literary trivia sheets. Carol Foutts, assistant director, and her reference staff take charge of the adult and young adult programs and did an excellent job in encouraging reading for the summer.

# CCRLS Discusses Equity

The Chemeketa Cooperative Regional Library Service (CCRLS) is still in discussion regarding the issue of equity among taxpayers in the region. A recent study by Moore Briethaupt indicates that the average city resident (in a city that operates a library) pays 53¢ per \$1000 in taxes for library service, while a rural area resident in the district pays just 8¢ per \$1000. This inequity is being discussed by the CCRLS members and will be coming before city councils and boards this fall. Solutions are limited, but all are being investigated. Any solutions or actions will be presented to the Library Board in September and go to the Council later in the fall.

# New Staff Start

Cataloging Manager brings years of experience Cynthia Peterson started work August 17th as our final regular employee needed to implement our expanded hours. Cynthia comes to Newberg after eight years in various capacities at Oregon State University Library and she and her family are just settling in after moving to area in late August. Cynthia primarily will work with cataloging new books for our computer system, as well as providing some assistance in reference. When our student workers (from George Fox and the high school) start back in September, we will be up to full staffing.

# Library Foundation presents \$7,500 in grants

The Library Foundation met in August and approved the following projects for 1998-99. The Foundation will continue its support of the Kindergarten Cards for All project which began this year. This project places a library card in the hands of every kindergarten student in the area and in 1998 almost 500 cards were presented. The Foundation will also assist with the purchase of science materials valued at \$1,500. These resources will primarily be in the reference collection for use at the library, but some will be for items that can be checked out. The biggest project for the year will be the funding to implement the Searchbank Magazine Index. This Index to over 500 magazines will be available through the library computers, however, one of the most exciting parts is that it will be available through the Library's web page on the Internet to any library card holder. This will provide people with access to an index as well as the full text of the articles to thousands of resources at a time. This information is different from the standard materials you receive on the Internet as it is material that has been published in books, magazines, journals, and newspapers. Students and the general public will find access to this to be of tremendous assistance. We anticipate having it up and running in mid September.

# Library Board Report

The Library Board met on August 18th. Their primary activity was interviewing candidates for the Board and they recommended to the Mayor that David King and Cherie Taylor be appointed. The Board will be meeting from now on at 7:00 pm on the third Tuesday in the Director's office due to the modifications in the meeting rooms.

# Director's Activity

The Director attended meetings of the department heads and the CCRLS Equity Task Force. Much of the month was spent in finalizing activities for the expanded hours and new staffing. She took a few days off in August to watch her nephew play in the Shriner's Football game in Baker City. The West side lost, but it was great fun to watch football in the heat and sunshine, rather than the rain and wind.





# **CDD Home Improvements!**

CDD saw some personnel changes in August that will allow our department to continue its tradition of excellence.

Eva Smith has been selected as Community Development's new receptionist (part-time), effective August 24. Eva was a work study student her senior year and has also assisted the department during periods of short staffing.

Bob Stewart was chosen to replace Mike Hailey as the new Building Official, effective August 21. Bob has been acting Building Official since Mike left the City.

Ron Layne has filled a new position in water system maintenance. Ron's tasks include assisting with meter reading and service calls and he will also conduct a fire hydrant maintenance/waterline flushing program. Ron has over five years experience with the City of Keizer with this type of program.

Raymond Hubbell took over duties of Street Sweeper Operator, after the retirement of Stan Garwood. Stan was employed by the city for over 25 years.

## **Public Works**

The division has completed installation of water distribution system sampling stations in various locations. These sample stations are installed in permanent locations to provide accurate samples of the complete water system.

Traveling to and from Newberg High School has become safer. The section of Elliott Road from Haworth to the school has been graded, widened and rocked along the road's shoulder. The areas lack of a shoulder and sharp pavement drop offs for a road of such high traffic volumes have been a serious concern for the past year.

Speaking of school, the division has repainted all the crosswalks and yellow curbs (no parking) in all school zones in preparation for school opening.

Other selected areas in the City's streets continue to be repainted or remarked with heat applied material. This process will continue for street areas scheduled for repair/replacement by the City, the County, and ODOT in the next 3-5 years.

A section of Francis Square downtown has been excavated and concrete poured as a foundation for a new flagpole. The division is waiting for the new flag pole and light fixtures to complete the installation, which is anticipated for mid-September.

Finally, no mainline sanitary sewer blockages have been experienced during the last **180 days.** Our employees' continuing cleaning

and inspection program is responsible for this great record!

# **Engineering**

The Villa Road Trestle Project bid opening was scheduled for September 15. A survey was conducted of the six pre-qualified bidders prior to the opening and discovered that only two were going to bid. consultant, David Evans and Associates recommended that we postpone the bid opening until we had more competition. Other bidders are interested in the project, but contractors are very busy this time of year trying to wrap up projects before the rains come. The consultant believes the job will come in \$50,000 to \$80,000 lower if we bid it in November. This will not delay the road widening portion of the project, which is the main purpose of the trestle work.

The neighbors on either side of the trestle have been very cooperative and are allowing us to use their property for equipment and material storage and staging construction. This will allow us to keep the equipment off the road and two lanes may remain open throughout most of the project.

ODOT bids opened for the First Street Signals Project in late August. This project will install signals and curb extensions (bulbouts) on First Street at Howard and Meridian to interconnect all the signals downtown. In the spring, ODOT will grind, overlay and remark the surface. The bids came in about 10% over the estimate so ODOT is examining

alternative cost-reduction options.

ODOT's Right-of-Way Section has begun contacting property owners to acquire the additional right-of-way they need to widen Highway 99W. The consensus and recommendation of the Project Development Team was that a bridge is the alternative to meet all of the fish passage regulations at Hess Creek. A bridge is also less expensive than the alternative they originally proposed which

was to install a larger box culvert.

We have also been working on the Springbrook Road intersection details. For the City's purposes, the intersection goes from Haworth to Hayes Street. ODOT agrees that these streets will impact the Springbrook/99W intersection and they will have their traffic engineers do the design for us. We are updating the Transportation Master Plan and will include this as an Systems Development Project.


# **Planning**

Revisions to the Sign Code continue to be considered by the City Council. The Planning Commission completed its review of the Sign Code and forwarded a recommendation to the City Council. The Commission deliberated long and hard to make sure the proposal was comprehensive and met the needs of businesses and the community at large.

The City Council has authorized the start of a Springbrook Oaks (Werth property) specific The plan would be for 270 acres of plan. industrial, multi-family, and single family property on the east side of Newberg.

The Yamhill County Board Commissioners has approved a zone change request that will accommodate the planned Baker Rock Asphalt Plant by the Willamette River near Roger's Landing. The Newberg City Council authorized the development and submission of an appeal to LUBA, which staff has submitted.

Last May, the City Council authorized the initiation of an effort to change the Comprehensive Plan designation of a large area of land along the Willamette River from "Industrial" to "Riverfront". The Planning Division staff has determined the process to accomplish a Comprehensive Plan amendment.

August is typically a large month for water use and this year was no exception. Several days showed demand exceeding five (5) million gallons, with a peak of 5.2 and a monthly average of 3.7. As such, the focus of the Utility Division was water production. Although demand exceeded supply for several days, we were able to balance supply and storage and not go below critical reservoir levels to the point of having to institute mandatory curtailment. Fortunately, Schneider Equipment was able to refurbish the well #4 pump to have it back on line just in time for the peak demand period. Also, we were fortunate that the new Electrical and Instrumentation and Control improvements at the water plant allowed us the position to treat water more efficiently than in past years. These factors coupled with: 1) no equipment down time; and 2) demand decreased through the month as well field capacity diminished with decreasing water levels, got us through

August.

August also found us struggling with new demands on facilities maintenance responsibilities, due to the needs of new City facilities and major landscaping projects. The redefining of responsibilities in this function is in the proceedings to balance the demands.

Significant CIP accomplishments included: 1) moving to the startup phase of the dechlorination project; and 2) on-going construction proceeding of the dewatering process monitoring project at the wastewater plant.

Another August highlight was Jadene Torrent's continued implementation of the City's Water Conservation Program through public education and specific interface work with our largest water users.

# Newland Elected 2nd VP for FBINAA

Deputy Chief Stan Newland, at a recent conference of the FBINAA, was elected 2nd Vice President of the Association. FBINAA (FBI National Academy Association) provides continuing education for those who have graduated from the FBI National Academy. Beginning January 1, 1999, Deputy Chief Newland begins what will be a three year process moving through the chairs of the association, culminating in president in 2001.

Founded in 1935, the FBI National Academy has long been a vital element in the continuing improvement of law enforcement standards, knowledge and cooperation

throughout the world. Acceptance into this program includes a referral from a past graduate and passing an extensive background investigation. Waiting lists can be from two to five years after nomination.

Since 1935, the National Academy has graduated over 29,000 students. Of those participating in the program, more than 1,500 of the officers have represented over 100 difference foreign countries.

Deputy Chief Newland was in the graduating class of the 185th Session on June 14, 1996, and has been an active participant in the association since that time.



#### **Grant Awarded for Purchasing Bicycle Helmets**

The Newberg Traffic Safety Commission is a recent recipient of a \$3,275 grant for the purchase of bicycle helmets and bicycle safety education materials.

ACTS Oregon (Alliance for Community Traffic Safety in Oregon), made the award based on the application of Community Resource Tech Cindy Bolek. These funds will go towards the purchase of 300 helmets and some child size traffic control devices for use at the bike rodeos. Some funds will be used to purchase some professional production time for safety bulletins to be shown on TCI local cable access. The subsidized helmets will be distributed free of charge to area children identified as having a financial hardship. Miniature stop signs, crosswalks, yield signs, and other obstacles will be created for use in a bicycle safety course designed to teach children the correct rules of the road for bicyclists.

Bicycle safety and education on the helmet law has been a priority of the Newberg Police Department. Since January 1997, the police department has issued more than 125 warnings and citations for violation of the Oregon bicycle helmet law. In addition, a follow-up letter is sent home to parents notifying them of any warning issued. If the parent indicates that there is a financial hardship, the department provides a helmet to the child at no cost.

The ultimate goal is to reduce bicycle related injuries in the City of Newberg through increased knowledge of bicycle laws and safe riding by youth and families.

#### Neighborhood Watch!

During the month of September, Newberg Police officers met with citizens in two neighborhoods to effect some crime prevention strategies. Neighborhood Watch meetings provided an opportunity for the discussion of law enforcement concerns between neighbors and police, and created a proactive environment for solving these concerns.

Sitka Street neighbors gathered on September 10th to discuss issues related to home security, and traffic safety concerns associated with Newberg High School and arterial traffic off Highway 99W. The issue of littering was also raised. Several strategies were discussed and will be utilized by both neighbors and police: increased reporting and communication, education efforts by police relating to traffic problems, speed studies and enhancing enforcement.

Newberg Police officers also met with neighbors from the 5th & Willamette Street area, a first time meeting for this group. Officer Ken Howell and Reserve Officer Cassie Lea, together with Community Resource Tech Cindy Bolek, provided a presentation and information on home safety, reporting suspicious activity to police, general safety issues, and assisted with an information exchange.

Neighborhood Watch is a positive opportunity for police and citizens to be involved in crime prevention, share information and work together to enhance the livability and safety of our neighborhoods.

#### New Fingerprinting Policy In Effect

Effective September 14,1998, only persons living within

the Newberg city limits will be able to get fingerprinting services at the Newberg Police Department. Persons living outside the city limits will be referred to the law enforcement agency serving their area. An exception will be allowed for a school or university located within the city limits; they may schedule an annual fingerprinting session to print their employees or students.



Fingerprinting will be done by appointment only. A \$15 fee will be charged for the first two print cards. Each additional card will cost \$5.00. There will be no charge for reprints resulting from print cards which were rejected for illegible prints.

These changes were made after it was determined that the vast majority of applicant fingerprinting done at the Newberg Police Department was not for Newberg citizens but persons living outside the region.
