



Program Timeline






E-Cycles 2026: Changes to the Program

Oregon Department of Environmental Quality Oregon E-Cycles Modernization: Rule Concepts Rulemaking Advisory Committee Meeting 2 May 9, 2024

Background

In the modernized Oregon E-Cycles system, producers of covered electronic devices will participate in an Oregon E-Cycles program by joining an electronics producer responsibility organization. The electronics producer responsibility organization will operate the program on the producers' behalf, in accordance with a program plan approved by DEQ. If DEQ approves multiple plans, producers may choose between multiple electronics producer responsibility organizations to join. The electronics producer responsibility program, or programs, will offer convenient collection for electronics recycling throughout the state. DEQ will monitor program operations and producer participation for compliance with the Oregon Electronics Recycling Law.

Overview

DEQ proposes four rule concepts to address the submission process and content for plans and reports





A PRO:





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Submits a plan to DEQ (before a program year)

Implements a program under an approved plan (during program year) **Submits a report** to DEQ describing implementation (after program year)



1. Rule Concept: Letter of Intent

DEQ may require a prospective PRO to submit a letter of intent regarding plan submission





2. Rule Concept: Schedule

Unless directed otherwise by DEQ:

- Plans due July 1 before a program year*
- Reports due March 1 after a program year*

July 1: Initial plan for 2026 due	January – December: Implementation of approved plan for 2026	January – December: Implementation of approved plan for 2027
	July 1: plan for 2027 due	March 1: report for 2026 due
		July 1: plan for 2028 due

*Program year runs on a calendar year



3. Rule Concept: Plan content

DEQ may require information sufficient to describe how the proposed program plan will comply with statute, including information on:

- Coordination
- Public awareness
- Program financing
- Environmentally sound management practices
- Fair financial compensation
- Goals



4. Rule Concept: Annual report content

DEQ may require information sufficient to evaluate whether PRO implemented its program per plan and statute. This includes information on:

- Coordination
- Public awareness
- Program financing
- Environmentally sound management practices
- Fair financial compensation
- Goals


Overview

DEQ proposes three rule concepts related to coordination body designation process and coordination tasks





Timeline for coordinating body designation:





Multiple programs must coordinate through a coordinating body

- As required by statute, including on:
 - Financial obligations reconciliation
 - Education and outreach
- As directed by DEQ



1. Rule Concept: Letter of intent and additional information

DEQ may require a letter of intent and additional information from a prospective coordinating body



2. Rule Concept: Plan content regarding coordination

DEQ may require a PRO to name an entity PRO would designate as coordinating body if multiple plans are approved



3. Rule Concept: Coordination tasks

DEQ may direct a coordinating body to conduct any coordination for program implementation pursuant to statute.

This includes:

- Public education and outreach activities;
- Program goals, including collection goals and public awareness goals; and
- Conducting of surveys or other public awareness measurements

Overview

Statute requires a PRO to provide "fair financial compensation to collection sites calculated to cover the costs of collecting, storing, managing, and transporting covered electronic devices."

DEQ proposes four rule concepts to clarify this requirement.





Some considerations:

- Compensation typically price per pound
- Requirements for collection network changed by new law
- PROs must work with all willing transfer stations, landfills and material recovery facilities with a DEQ solid waste permit



1. Rule Concept: Rates

DEQ may require plan to describe how PRO will provide fair financial compensation.

Examples:

- Offering rates to secure a collection site where one is required by statute
- Offering comparable compensation rates for collection sites that
 - have similar operating characteristics or
 - operate in similar geographic areas



2. Rule Concept: Costs

As part of calculating fair financial compensation, a PRO may

- review costs across a range of collection sites, or
- use reasonable estimates.



3. Rule Concept: Permitted Sites

For any willing transfer station, landfill or material recovery facility with a solid waste disposal permit, PRO must offer compensation rates **comparable to collection sites with similar operating characteristics**.

4. Rule Concept: Third-party evaluation

Evaluation on fair financial compensation:

- Conducted by a qualified, independent third party
- Hired by PRO (or PROs through a coordinating body)
- Required for 2028 and 2031
- Then upon DEQ's request (up to once every two years)



4. Rule Concept: Third-party evaluation

Evaluation must review:

- Collection site costs (urban and in rural areas)
- Trends in Oregon
- Alternative compensation models
- Was compensation comparable among collection sites (similar geographic areas / operating characteristics)?



4. Rule Concept: Third-party evaluation

PRO must cooperate with third party and DEQ on evaluating fair financial compensation.

This may include providing a list of prospective collectors solicited and rates offered to prospective collectors.

Overview

PRO must provide for environmentally sound management practices of covered electronic devices.

Rule concepts:

- Definitions related to practices
- Standards for practices
- Specific practices
- Report content
- DEQ's use of tracking devices



Statute:

Examples:

- Adequate record keeping
- tracking the fate of recycled materials
- performance audits and inspections
- provisions for reuse and refurbishment
- compliance with worker health and safety requirements
- maintaining liability insurance and financial assurances

The Environmental Quality Commission may adopt other practices, or standards for practices, through rule.



1. Rule Concept: Definitions

Terms include:

- Final disposition
- Materials of concern
- Service provider or downstream vendor



2. Rule Concept: Standards for practices

What must practices ensure?

- Program operates safely, legally, and pursuant to waste hierarchy
- PRO can track and provide downstream information
- Materials are processed, not stored beyond what's allowed
- Materials are safely handled under all circumstances
- PRO is aware of issues and can respond
- Oregon entities comply with state and local recordkeeping requirements



3. Rule Concept: Specific Practices

- Practices from statute (adequate recordkeeping, tracking the fate of recycled materials, etc.)
- Adequate training, site management, and operation requirements for service providers and downstream vendors; and
- Regular monitoring, inspections, performance audits, and auditing in each program year, including auditing with tracking devices



4. Rule Concept: Report Content

DEQ may require information on practices, including:

- Information on service providers and downstream vendors:
 - Name
 - Contact
 - Type of materials received
 - Processing conducted
- Results of audits



5. Rule Concept: DEQ's use of tracking devices

DEQ may use tracking devices to track the fate of recycled covered electronic device materials.
