The Telephone Survey

INTRODUCTION

This survey of community attitudes held by residents of the City of Newberg was conducted, by telephone, during the middle two weeks of April, 1995. Its purpose was to obtain current information about the attitudes, perceptions and opinions of Newberg residents as they relate to city services, finances and community needs in the area. In February, 1993, Western Attitudes conducted a community attitude survey for the city and, where appropriate, results for similar questions on the two surveys are compared. In early April, the city also distributed a mail survey to all residents of the community which asked some general questions and made specific inquiries about three ballot measures slated for the May election ballot. The results of the mail survey are discussed in Part II of this report.

The telephone survey was fielded by Western Attitudes staff, using a randomized list of over 2,000 telephone numbers to ensure an adequate cross-section of the community would be polled. 361 responses have been tabulated. A representative sample of this size is sufficient to ensure that the margin of error, even if opinions are evenly divided, is within plus or minus 5 points at the 95% confidence interval. Questions for the survey were developed by Western Attitudes in consultation with city staff.

Responses have been cross-tabbed to indicate how the views of respondents differ according to different groupings:

- ♦ Use of specific services
- ♦ Area of town (precinct)
- ♦ Gender
- ♦ Homeowner/renter status
- ♦ Age

Tables displaying this detail are contained in the appendix to the principal report, on file at the City Manager's office. In reviewing this report, readers should be aware that, as the size of the sample under review diminishes, the potential margin for sampling variability error is likely to increase. Cross-tab analysis for each question is therefore less reliable than figures for the entire sample.

Note: *This survey report, and all materials generated in the conduct of the survey, are the property of the City of Newberg. All questions concerning the use of information presented in this report should be directed to the City Manager.*

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

Survey respondents appear to be pleased with their overall quality of life in the city. While many people do not use the city services identified, those that do seem well pleased with the city's efforts. It is clear that, as in 1993, transportation issues continue to be the dominant concern and improvements, particularly in the form of a By-Pass, are perceived as needed by a significant majority of people.

Quality of Life

In general, residents are pleased with Newberg as a place to live. On a 1-10 scale, where 1 is Poor and 10 is Excellent, respondents give the livability of the city a median average rating of 8.0, up from 7.6 two years ago.

Use of City Services

In the past year or so:

- 13% of the responding households have requested planning and building services,
- 8% have requested services from the fire department,
- 10% have requested ambulance services,
- 14% have called 9-1-1, and
- 27% say they have requested police services.

71% of the responding households say someone in the household has a library card.

Satisfaction with City Services

Ratings of service quality by service users reveals that 82% of those who requested police services were satisfied with the way in which their requested was handled, and 86% were satisfied with the department's response time. Of the four alternatives suggested in the survey to report minor complaints of a non-emergency nature, 60% favor calling a report in on the phone.

On a scale of 1-5, where 1 = Not at all Satisfied and 5 = Very Satisfied, respondents rate their satisfaction with library services as a 4.7, with almost two-thirds of the users providing a 5 rating.

Apparent satisfaction with fire services can be read into the high level of support for a \$1.00 a month charge to finance the purchase of fire engines. 79% say they would be supportive of providing funds in this way to replace fire engines. 14% indicate their opposition. By a 47% to 28% margin, with 25% undecided, respondents also appear willing to consider a bond issue to build an additional fire station.

Opportunities to Participate and Influence City Decisions

64%, up from 60% two years ago, believe the City provides adequate opportunities for people to become involved in city issues. 17%, down from 24% in 1993, say it does not.

Council Issues

Clearly transportation issues are still high on the minds of respondents. In 1993, 49% of those responding said this was the most important issue the Council should work on in the coming year. In this 1995 survey, the percentage of those who express this concern has risen to 56%. Traffic and By-Pass issues far outweigh other concerns such as growth and development (7%), taxes (6%) and crime and safety issues (4%).

At the neighborhood level, traffic, speeding and road conditions are also the dominant areas of concern.

Observations:

Our comments of two years ago still make sense today. Newberg, like most other cities, is a community of neighborhoods. Its older, more established areas, have a different socio-economic mix of people than those in newer, more recently settled areas. This diversity reflects differences and these differences are in turn, reflected in this survey.

There is much that people agree on - although levels of support and agreement vary around the community:

*Newberg's quality of life is good and likely to get better;
Transportation system improvements are crucial to the future well-being of the community;
City services are generally of high quality and enjoy strong community support;
Council is doing a good job meeting the needs of the community and providing adequate opportunities for people to participate in and influence City decisions.*

SURVEY OVERVIEW

Quality of Life

Question 1: On a scale of 1-10, where 1 is Poor and 10 is Excellent, how would you rate Newberg as a place to live today?

Overall, respondents give the city an 8.0 rating on a ten point scale.

By comparison with surveys we have conducted in other communities, this is a very positive rating and an improvement on that recorded two years ago in Newberg.

- ♦ There is no apparent difference in quality of life ratings among those who have requested city services and those who have not.
- ♦ Males tend to give higher quality of life ratings than females, a change when compared to the 1993 survey.
- ♦ Ratings by precinct vary from a low of 7.8 among those from precinct 2, to a high of 8.2 among those from precinct 5. Precinct 31, which in 1993 provided a much lower than average quality of life rating, is right in the middle on this year's chart.
- ♦ On the basis of age, the highest ratings are given by those 65 and over (8.3), while the lowest ratings come from those in the 45-54 age group (7.8). This is consistent with the findings recorded in 1993.
- ♦ In the 1993 survey, only 9% of the respondents gave Newberg a top rating of 10. In this 1995 survey, 18% rate the community as a 10.
- ♦ There is little difference among homeowners and renters in their perceptions about the quality of life in Newberg.

Observations:

Overall, respondents are more positive about their quality of life than they were in 1993. Older residents continue to be the most positive age group.

Satisfaction with city services does not appear to make much difference when it comes to rating one's overall quality of life in the community.

Question 2: Do you believe the city provides adequate opportunities for people to participate and influence decisions made by the city?

- ♦ By a 64% to 17% majority, with 20% undecided, respondents believe the City does provide adequate opportunities for citizen involvement. *This compares favorably to the answers to a similar question in 1993, where 60% said "yes", and 24% answered "no".*

- ♦ Even more inclined to feel **positively** on this issue are those who have requested city services in the past year; those from precincts 4 and 36 and those under the age of 44.
- ♦ More likely to react **negatively** are those who live in precinct 5, males, and those in the 45-64 age group.
- ♦ When responses to this question are examined by precinct, some interesting patterns emerge.

- There are fairly dramatic differences between the 1995 and 1993 ratings in both precincts 4 and 31. Perceptions about the adequacy of opportunities to participate and influence city decisions have shown significant improvement in these two areas. As Table 2.2 indicates, the 1993 rating by respondents from precinct 31 was clearly an aberration, perhaps reflecting a particular issue at that time.

Observations:

The City can continue to feel good about the overall perception Newberg residents have regarding their ability to participate in, and exert influence on, city decisions.

Use of City Services

Questions 3: In the past year or so, have you or a member of your household, requested any of the following services from the city?

- ◆ **Planning and Building** services are more likely to have been used by users of the other services identified in the survey. While overall, only 13% of the respondents said they had requested planning and building services, in precinct 4 22% of the respondents had made such a request. Contact was lowest among those from precinct 31, where only 7% indicated they had requested these services. Renters and people over 65 were least likely to request services.
- ◆ Requests for **fire services** were also more likely to come from users of other services. Almost one-third of those who said they had requested fire services, reported that they had called in to the 9-1-1 system, while almost half reported requesting services from the police department. There was a higher incidence of usage of fire services among respondents from precinct 4, and among those in the 35-54 age groups.
- ◆ Three-quarters of those who said they had requested **ambulance services** during the year also reported use of the 9-1-1 system. The incidence of calls for service is higher among respondents from precincts 4 and 2, and among those in the 65 and over age group. A higher percentage of renters (14%) than homeowners (9%) reported calling for ambulance services.
- ◆ Among the 50 households in the survey which reported calling the **9-1-1 telephone system** in the past year, 26 reported calling for ambulance services, the same number, 26, reported calls made for police services and 9 indicated they had called 9-1-1- for fire services. (Numbers add to more than 50 because some households made more than one call in the past twelve months). The incidence of calls to 9-1-1- was highest among respondents from precinct 5, higher among women (16%) than men (11%), and higher among renters (22%) than homeowners (13%).
- ◆ Just over one-quarter of those who say they requested **police services**, also reported making calls to the 9-1-1 system. The incidence of requests for police services (27% overall) was significantly higher than average among respondents from precinct 3 (40%) and precinct 4 (38%) and lower than the average among those from precinct 2 (17%) and precinct 36 (16%). By age group, there were relatively more requests for service from those in the 35-44 age group (39%) and the 55-64 age group (35%) and a much lower incidence of requests among those aged 65 and over (11%).

Observations

While preoccupation with the delivery of these services consumes much of the staff and elected officials' time at City Hall, it is apparent that relatively few households actually request these services throughout the year. This is not to say that they lack public support. Rather it is to point out that, absent contact with the service, the general public may have little idea about what is going on in each of these areas.

There are some interesting usage patterns that may bear further exploration by staff.

Police Services

Question 4: Were you satisfied with the manner in which your request for police services was handled?

Among those who had requested police services during the year, 82% said they were satisfied with the manner in which their request for police services was handled.

- ◆ Satisfaction with the response to their request for police services was higher among those from precinct 2 (100%) and precinct 4 (90%). It was lower among those from precinct 5 (73%) and precinct 36 (73%). Satisfaction was higher among women (85%) than men (77%) and was higher among those over 65 (90%), but lowest among those in the 55-64 age group (72%). Renters (87%) tend to more satisfied than homeowners (81%).

Question 5: Were you satisfied with the department's response time?

Eighty-six percent of the respondents were satisfied with the response time of the department in responding to their request for service.

- ♦ Women (90%) compared to men (79%) seem to be more satisfied with the department's response time. By precinct, satisfaction is highest among those from precinct 36 (91%) and lowest among those from precinct 3 (83%).
- ♦ Among those who expressed concern, in response to either Question 8 or 9, about the way in which their request for police services was handled, the following comments were noted:

Dog bit my daughter. Dog is still around and not being restrained
 CB radio was stolen. Police said I'll never see it again. Didn't seem concerned
 Took too long (2)
 No restitution for lost bicycle
 There was no resolution to my case
 They did not show up (3)
 They had a poor attitude (2)
 Didn't show me any respect
 No action taken. They didn't even show up
 They were abusive
 Slow response time (2)
 They didn't recover property stolen from me
 There was no contact after I made a report
 Officer mishandled the situation. Would not call again
 They were not really professional
 Noise problem. When they came out they acted like I was the criminal - took 2 hours to come
 We were having problems with kids from high school. Took so long to come called and told them to forget it
 They really drag their feet when investigating anything to do with teens
 I got the feeling they show up but don't plan to do anything

Question 6: To better utilize police officers' time, the department is reviewing how minor complaints of a non-emergency nature are reported. As an alternative to immediate dispatch of a police officer, which of the following four options would you be willing to consider if you wanted to report minor complaints of a non-emergency nature?

Making a minor, non-emergency report over the phone is a clear preference among the alternatives offered.

- ◆ Among those who had actually made a request for police services in the past year, there is an even stronger preference, (67%), for telephone reporting.
- ◆ By precinct, phone reporting is the preferred alternative across all precincts. It enjoys even more support among those from precinct 4 (76%) and precinct 2 (72%). Interest in making a later appointment with a police officer is highest, (30%), among those from precinct 36, while 32% of those from precinct 3 would prefer to come to the department and file a report.

Observations

The fact that eight out of ten respondents express satisfaction with both how their request for police services was handled, and with the department's response time, should be measured against departmental standards of performance in these areas.

With adequate publicity and care taken to help shape the publics' expectations of what to do about minor, non-emergency complaints, it would appear that telephone reporting is a viable option to officer dispatch when there is agreement among the caller and the call-taker that the incident being discussed is a minor, non-emergency event.

Fire Services

Question 7: In 1990, the city approved a \$1.00 a month fee to pay for a new fire engine. The fee appeared in the water and sewer bill each month. By December, 1993, the fire engine was purchased and paid for. The City Council, as promised, rescinded the fee at that time, which was one year earlier than expected. The Fire Department needs to replace two old fire engines and the ladder truck by the Year 2000. Would you support or oppose reinstating the \$1.00 a month charge to finance the purchase of fire engines?

By a very solid majority (79% to 14%, with 7% undecided), respondents appear willing to finance the purchase of fire equipment in this way.

- ◆ Support for using this financing method is strong regardless of whether people have requested fire services in the past year. Support is highest among respondents from precincts 31 and 4. It is higher among men (82%) than women (77%). There is a direct correlation between support for the idea and age groups. 89% of those 35 and under support the monthly charge. Support then drops slightly with each group until it reaches 70%, still a healthy level of support, among those 65 and older. There is also more support among renters (86%) than among homeowners (78%).

Question 8: The fire department's long range plan shows the need for an additional fire station that would cost about \$1.2 million. Would you be likely to support or oppose a bond issue to build a new fire station if it added about \$20 a year to the cost of an average homeowner's property tax bill?

By a 47% to 28% margin, with 25% undecided, respondents appear willing to support this option.

- ◆ Support for the proposed bond issue is strongest in precincts 4 (60%) and 31 (57%); weakest in precincts 2 and 5. Renters tend to be very supportive of the proposal. Opposition is likely to come from those over 55 years of age and homeowners.

Observations

The fire department appears to enjoy strong community support. The monthly fee for fire engine purchases has a good track record and people appear very willing to initiate it again.

Library Services

Question 9: Do you, or does any member of your household, have a Library card?

Seven out of ten of the respondents say either they, or someone in their household, has a library card.

- ◆ By precinct, penetration of library cards is over 70% in all precincts, with the exception of precinct 5, where only 51% of the respondents report having a library card in the household.
- ◆ By age group, over 80% of those under the age of 54 report having a library card. Among those in the 55-64 age bracket, 65% say they have a library card. However, among those who are 65 and over, only 46% have a library card.
- ◆ Library card possession reflects little difference between homeowners and renters. 71% of homeowners, and 67% of renters, report having a library card.

Question 10: In the past year, about how many times have you, or members of your household, used the library?

While overall, 25% of the respondents say they have not used the library in the past year, and further 5% indicate that they don't know how often members of the household have visited the library, three-quarters of the library card holders report at least monthly usage and one-third indicate usage at least every two weeks.

- ◆ Not only is there a high incidence of library card holders. There is a high level of usage of the library. Seven out of ten responding households report using the facility in the past year.
- ◆ Users, regardless of their frequency of use, seem well satisfied with the library. Across the board, almost nine out of ten respondents rate their satisfaction with library services as either a 5 or a 4.
- ◆ By precinct, library use is way down among respondents from precinct 5, where 46% indicate that they have not visited the library in the past year. Frequency of use is greatest among those from precinct 3 where four out of ten respondents indicate they use the library at least every two weeks.
- ◆ By age group, a majority of those over 65 have not used library services in the past year. Three out of ten respondents in the 55-64 age group have not used library services, a further one-third have only used the library once in the past year. The most frequent users age in the 44 and under age groups - four out of ten respondents under 44 report usage of at least every two weeks.

Question 11: On a scale of 1-5, where 1 = Not Very Satisfied and 5 = Very Satisfied, how would you rate your satisfaction with the library services you receive?

Among those people who have used the library in the past year, the median average satisfaction rating, on a 1-5 scale, is 4.7, a very high rate of approval.

Question 12: Are there changes you'd like to see made at the Newberg City Library?

Seven out of ten respondents did not offer any suggestions for changes at the library. Among those who did, extending hours and adding more books and resources were the most prevalent comments.

Observations:

The library enjoys considerable popularity and a hefty approval rating. Public perception is that it is working well.

There is one glaring service gap in the library services profile - the lack of participation by respondents over the age of 54. If the survey is correct, many, many seniors are not partaking of a free service that could add enrichment and enjoyment to their lives. Seniors would seem to represent a target market for library programs. Since seniors tend to vote with more frequency than younger people, the lack of attachment to library services may be one reason for the failure of the city's library levy at the May ballot election.

Council Issues

Question 13: What, in your opinion, is the one most important issue you want to see the Newberg City Council work on over the next twelve months?

While 12% did not identify any particular item, transportation issues were suggested by 56% of the respondents (up from 49% in 1993). Nothing else made it into double figures.

- ◆ Transportation issues are more significant among those from precinct 31 (74%). They are more likely to be mentioned by those over 55, and by renters
- ◆ For additional detail on these issues see answers to a similar question in Part II of the report.

Question 14: Is there a specific problem or project that the City should address in your neighborhood?

While 57% did not identify a problem or a project, among those who did, traffic, speeding and road conditions were the primary concerns and the only issue to reach into double figures.

- ♦ For additional information about local issues see responses to a similar question in Part II of this report.

Demographics

Question 15: Do you rent or own your own residence?

- ♦ In this sample, only 14% are renters, while 86% are homeowners. The number of rental units in the community is likely much higher than this. Where the views of renters differ from those of homeowners, those differences are highlighted in the report. From a practical viewpoint, renters are less likely to be registered voters and usually less involved in city issues.
- ♦ **Renters** responding to this survey are proportionately higher users of certain services. For example, 22% of renters reported calling 9-1-1 - compared to only 13% of homeowners. 14% of renters had requested ambulance services, - compared to 9% of homeowners. While renters account for only 14% of the overall survey, they make up 19% of the respondents from precinct 5 and 22% of those from precinct 31. Renters are more populous at either end of the age scale - 28% of those under 35 are renters and 18% of those over 65 rent rather own their own home.

Question 16: In which of the following age groups are you?

The mean average age of the sample group is just over 49 years, which is older than the average age of 44 years recorded in 1993.

- ♦ The average age of fire service users was 44 years, compared to 50 years among non-users.

- ♦ The average age of those requesting ambulance services was 62 years, compared to 48 years among non-users.
- ♦ The average age of those reporting requests for 9-1-1 services was 52 years, compared to 49 among non-callers.
- ♦ The average age of those requesting police services was 43 years, compared to 52 years among those who did not request such services.
- ♦ Renters have an average age of 47 years, while homeowners average 49 years of age.
- ♦ The average age among precinct 2 respondents is 59, while precinct 4 records the lowest average age of 41 years.

Question 17: Gender

- ♦ 58% of the sample are female while 42% are male.
- ♦ There were proportionately more women respondents from precincts 2, 5 and 31.

Question 18: Precinct.

The City of Newberg is divided into six precincts.

- ♦ Precinct 2 includes the area around Friendsview Manor and George Fox College
- ♦ Precinct 3 is the area north of 1st and west of Meridian
- ♦ Precinct 4 is south of 1st and west of Meridian
- ♦ Precinct 5 is east of Meridian to Springbrook
- ♦ Precinct 31 is the Springbrook/High School area
- ♦ Precinct 36 is the North Newberg area

The percentages on the second row calculate that number's percentage of the total at the top of the column (read down the page). Re: City of Newberg Mail Survey

To date, Western Attitudes has received and entered 468 completed surveys into our Survey System. This report will highlight the key results of the survey and contain a random sampling of verbatim comments people made in response to survey questions. These survey responses are no guarantee that actual election results will turn out the same way. In the final analysis, there is only one "true" poll - and that is the one taken when the election ballots are counted.

Question 1: On a scale of 1-10, where 1 is Poor and 10 is Excellent, how would you rate Newberg as a place to live today?

Respondents provided an overall median rating of 7.1, which is lower than the 7.6 recorded in the City's telephone survey in February 1993. This difference may be attributed to the difference in survey methodology, a fact we will know a little more about when we complete data entry for the current telephone survey of city residents.

It is interesting to note that in all three questions relating to proposed levies by the City, those who support the measures are more likely to rate Newberg more highly as a place in which to live. Also, those who say they don't know how they feel about the levies tend to be fairly positive about the city as a place to live. In this respect, the "don't know" voters more closely resemble those who support the measures than those who oppose them.

Question 2: Do you support or oppose a three year levy for the Fire Department?

By a 43% to 38% margin, with 19% undecided, respondents narrowly support additional funding for the Fire Department.

Those who support the fire levy are also strongly inclined to support the police levy (by an 81% to 13% margin) and also favor the library levy (by a 58% to 26% margin).

Those who oppose the fire levy are also strong opponents of both other measures.

Among those who say they don't know how they will vote on the fire measure, there is clear support for the library levy (45% to 29%) and also support for the police levy (38% to 20%).

Question 3: Do you support or oppose a three year levy for the Police Department?

By a 50% to 38% margin, with 11% undecided, respondents clearly support the idea of a three year police levy.

As indicated in Question 2, those who tend to support this measure are also strongly supportive of the fire measure (70% to 13%) and also supportive of the library proposal (55% to 28%). Respondents opposed to this measure are also strongly opposed to the other two.

Among those who say they don't know how they feel about the Police measure, almost seven out of ten say they also don't know about the fire measure (the balance split fairly evenly between support and oppose). However there is support among this group for the library levy (47% to 21%).

Question 4: Do you support or oppose a three year Library levy?

By a 45% to 43% margin, with 12% undecided, respondents suggest that this measure may be much harder to pass than the two public safety measures.

The same general observations apply to this question. Supporters generally support other measures; those opposed also oppose the other measures. There is strong support among "don't know" voters on this library measure for both the police and fire levies.

CITY OF NEWBERG - MAIL SURVEY, APRIL 1995

Verbatim responses from a random sampling of surveys mailed back to the City:

Question:

On May 16, you will have the opportunity to vote on three city levies. Each levy will be for three years, beginning July 1, 1995, and the money raised may only be used for the specific services identified on the ballot. We would like to know how you feel about the Fire Department's three year levy of \$0.495 per \$1,000 of Assessed Value (adds 4 firefighters and purchases small equipment) for a \$100,000 home, cost will equal \$49.50 per year.

We need a stop light on old Hwy. 99W and 2nd St.

Put Hwy. 99W. across the river.

TAXES

Keep taxes and property values affordable for senior citizens.

Lower property taxes. This is not Burlingame Hills, CA.

More care in preparing and implementing budgets. Give quarterly line item reports of how tax money is spent.

Cut taxes.

It's fine, except for too many taxes and too much regulation.

Lower taxes.

To lower housing costs and lower real estate taxes.

Keep taxes low.

Reduce taxes.

Don't keep taxes going higher, this is an older people town.

Cut taxes.

Reduce the tax structure so that people will have more money to spend to improve their own homes and improve the economy.

Quit spending money on asking for more money every year. Every year, the city budget goes up in excess of cost of living. We're getting assessed and taxed and levied right out of town.

Try to become more prudent in our fiscal policies- Particularly spending. I do feel the fire dept. needs more funding, but can't vote for measure under these provisions.

Lower the water rate and the building permit rate.

Decrease property taxes!!

Change financial policies to guarantee wasted spending is gone. Cost of living increase only decrease the 2 - 3 highest paid city employees and roll back () financial income for retirement/car/ housing and yuppie perks. This would help the community feel these city employees really love our town as their very own, not just a step up the ladder in their personal career.

The water rates need to be lowered significantly, to that of other Portland area cities. We are forced to let our lawn die each summer, and to avoid washing cars. Even our guests try not to use our showers.

We need to establish more police presence in the North Springbrook area, even its own neighbor hood precinct.

Better police service.

Quicker response by law enforcement.

We need adequate police to control gangs and crime in our fast growing community.

The Newberg Police Dept. needs to improve their service. Start cracking down on drugs, violence, and teenage curfew and alcohol abuse.

I do not think police officers should sit in their car on a side street and tear out into traffic to give a traffic ticket for a few miles over the speed limit. One did this in front of me and almost hit me. I slammed on brakes, man behind me bumped into me. Do your job, don't sit around listening to radio or reading.

Need to crack down on the juvenile delinquents in this town. Improve the existing older neighborhoods before adding more new projects.

APPEARANCE

Clean it up and get on the ball.

More trash cans available so city will be neater.

Downtown needs to be cleaned and painted. Freshen up the place and make it look alive.

On Salmon ST. and Meridian Corner, it looks like a garbage dump.

Have homeowners and renters clean up their yards. City should put more responsibility on it's people.

Downtown area needs to be revitalized and traffic rerouted elsewhere. Slow down housing developments build walking a bicycle paths.

The hanging flower baskets along the "main drag" are nice for aesthetics. A good portion of 1st. needs a face lift. Road quality need to be addressed (especially on Portland Rd- Hwy. 99). Newberg sometimes seems like run down city.

Eliminate the smoke blanket. Muffle or ground the early morning crop duster.

There is nothing quaint, appealing, or attractive about Newberg. Get American Cities Corp. (Rouse Co.) in here to tell us what to do to attract commerce. No pride of ownership, residential or business. The town is dumpy.

Need a bowling alley more than a golf course.

What we need is a "Teen Center" to provide activities such as music and dances, etc., to keep teens off drugs etc and let them have a place they can call their own to hang out.

More wholesome place to take a family for fun.

Recreation facilities for teens! Also more recreation places for seniors!

More than anything, Newberg needs a Teen Center. Newberg is very slow in recognizing the need to keep the young occupied.

Skating rink- Bowling not with Park & Recreation. Better Hospital service.

There needs to be more activities offered for children.

Programs for youth development- adults/ Current growth issues regarding traffic and urban development.

Continue Park & Recreation programs, even expand them.

Collaboration needs to be emphasized. Youth/ Community Center. Also, more planning and progress on combining city facilities under one roof.

Recreational opportunities; rejuvenation of downtown core; increased quality shopping; "good" restaurants; divert traffic around downtown.

We need a country dance club better than Eden Gate. Lower rent.

Need more things for kids to do- not golf courses.

Something needs to happen to help our kids. The community is letting our teens down.

More activities or whatever to keep the youth focused away from mischief.

BUSINESS/ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT

need to keep the public better informed about what's happening and allow more business to come here.

Bring in new business. Current retail situations forces people to go out of Newberg to shop.

Oppose development of silicon chip industry and boom type growth. Control expansion, plan parks and greenways so we don't turn into another Beaverton or Tigard.

We need industry instead of housing. Industry would put less of a burden on school system than equal dollars spent on housing.

TRAFFIC/ROADS/TRANSPORTATION

Light at Hwy. 99 & Elliot. Crime.

Re route Hwy. 219 over to Springbrook to cut down on traffic through the city center.

Work on city roads and with county on roads to new schools.

More and more traffic up Libra St. to Crestview. The new subdivisions by Austin will just make it worse. Children in danger.

Sidewalks on Laurel, Holly, and Villa Rd. (East side) More and better cooperation among us. Not waste our money, make it work with results.

Reduce speed limit entering Newberg from Rex Hill. It is 45 MPH now. We have cars and trucks going by our house on Aquaruius & Vittoria at 65 MPH.

Raising more money for public transportation.

Homeowners should repair their sidewalks for safety sake. Prohibit city from using "sick" leave for drug and alcohol rehab.

Put some tax money into improving South River Street to Rogers Landing.

Crater Lane is a disaster. Heavy trucks leading to the new schools have damaged it more.

When we called the city we were told it's a country road, which got us no where.

We pay city taxes yet our services don't match others within the city.

Get the toll road started this year.

Pave River Street. More police patrol in the off streets.

There should only be parking on one side of the road, our streets are too narrow for all the cars on them.

Add a sidewalk along East 2nd St. There are a lot of people who walk there and the street is too narrow for cars and people.

Because of the living outside of city limits, you wouldn't be able to help control the speed of new neighbors.
