2050 Vision and Framework for Action



The 2050 Vision:

Oregonians in 2050 produce and use materials responsibly conserving resources • protecting the environment • living well



E-Cycles Overview

- Statewide program
- Requires electronics manufacturers to provide responsible recycling for their devices



- Launched in 2009
- Covers computers, monitors, TVs, printers, keyboards and mice



Program Administration



- Program is funded by:
- Manufacturers of covered devices
 - Must register with DEQ



- Program is implemented by:
- Producer Responsibility Organizations
- State contractor program (default)



DEQ's role:

- Register manufacturers
- Calculate market share
- Provide oversight



How E-Cycles Works

Takes devices to collection site



Collection site

Prepares devices for reuse or processing



Processor

Processes device materials




End Market



Convenient Collection

- Collection network of sites and events
- At least 1 site in every city with a population of 10,000 or more
- Currently ~ 175 sites across the state

Current E-Cycles Sites & Events



Outreach and Education

- PRO education
 - Statewide and on a regular basis
- DEQ campaigns
 - Outreach through online channels
- Retailer information
 - at point of sale



Why Recycle Electronics?

- Electronics can contain:
 - hazardous materials
 - valuable materials
- Reuse and recycling of electronics can:
 - keep toxics out of landfills
 - conserve natural resources
 - reduce greenhouse gas emissions



Keys to the Program's Success

- People know about the program
- The program is convenient and people use it
- Collected products are managed in an environmentally sound manner



Why Modernize E-Cycles?

- Limited list of covered devices
- Cumbersome administration
- Potential instability to collection network



HB 3220: Expands What is Collected

HB 3220: Streamlines Administration

 Eliminates the State Contractor Program and DEQ invoicing for that program

 If there are multiple PROs, requires coordination through a "coordinating body"



HB 3220: Stabilizes Collection Network

- Sets a robust convenience standard
- Network must include:
 - 95% of residents within 15 miles of a collection site
 - Number of sites in cities with 10,000+ increases with population density
 - Any willing permitted transfer station, landfill or material recovery facility can be a collection site

HB 3220: Advances Equity and Reuse

Equity:

- Program must provide convenient and equitable service
- Requires engagement with historically underserved populations

Reuse:

- PRO must coordinate activities with recycling and reuse programs
- Collection sites can recover devices for reuse

HB 3220: What Stays the Same

- Manufacturers' obligation to finance and manage E-Cycles
- DEQ oversight of program
- Oregon's access to convenient and free electronics recycling

- Compliance and enforcement


