







### **Heating Oil Tank Program Workload**

Features an estimated 2% decline for each year after 2018





# Heating Oil Tank Projects (2018)



- DEQ received and reviewed 1,930 project certifications in 2018.
- The HOT Program is designed to function with 4.3 FTE.
- Current fees only fund 3.2 FTE.



### OAR 340-177-0065

- Three cleanup options:
  - Soil Matrix: Removes contamination above threshold (usually 500 milligrams/kilogram total petroleum hydrocarbons)
    - **➤** Considered relatively "Simple" in complexity
  - Generic Remedy: Allows leaving up to 10,000 mg/kg TPH if less than 65 cubic yards in volume
    - **➤** Considered relatively "Intermediate" in complexity
  - Risk-Based: Allows leaving larger areas of contamination if detailed testing shows no risk of significant exposure
    - > Considered the most complex of the cleanup options



### Current Fees

### Report Filing Fees

- Last updated in 2007
- Clean Decommission Report: \$75/project
- Cleanup Report: \$200/project (regardless of complexity)

### Licensure Fees

- Established in 1999
- Service Provider License: \$750/year
- Service Provider Supervisor License: \$75/year



## Senate Bill 40 – Statutory Amendments

- Modifies license fees for HOT regulatory program
- Modifies HOT decommissioning certification fees and HOT corrective action certification fees
- Requires the Environmental Quality Commission to define Simple, Intermediate and Complex corrective actions by rule
- Applies to fees assessed on and after January 1, 2020
- Passed by Senate and House in June 2019



# Rule Language (Differences <u>Underlined</u>)

#### Certified Reports, OAR 340-177-0095 (3)

**Current language:** Certified reports submitted to the Department must <u>be accompanied by the required filing fee of \$50 for decommissioning of a tank with no confirmed release and \$125 for decommissioning of a tank with a confirmed release. Filing fees are non-refundable.</u>

Proposed language with <u>table</u>: Certified reports submitted to the Department must <u>include the</u> required filing fee. Table 2 below specifies the fee amounts for each type of project. Filing fees are non-refundable.

## Rule Language (Differences <u>Underlined</u>)

Fees, OAR 340-163-0150 (1)

**Current language:** Heating oil tank service providers must pay a non-refundable license fee of \$750 for a twelve (12) month license.

**Proposed language with <u>table</u>**: Heating oil tank service providers must pay a non-refundable license fee for a twelve (12) month license <u>as listed in Table 1.</u>

OAR 340-163-0150 Table 1 Service Providers Fee Schedule	
Date License Application Received	Fee
On or before December 31, 2019	\$750
On or After January 1 to December 31, 2020	\$800
On or After January 1 to December 31, 2021	\$900
On or after January 1, 2022	\$1000



## Rule Language (Differences <u>Underlined</u>)

• Fees, OAR 340-163-0150 (2)

**Current language:** Heating oil tank supervisors must pay a non-refundable license fee of \$150 for a twenty-four (24) month license.

**Proposed language:** Heating oil tank supervisors must pay a non-refundable license fee for a twenty-four (24) month license according to the following schedule:

- (a) \$150 for license applications received on or before December 31, 2019;
- (b) \$200 for license applications received January 1, 2020 or later.



### Heating Oil Tank Fees

DEQ recommends the Environmental Quality Commission adopt the proposed rules in Attachment A as part of Chapter 340 of the Oregon Administrative Rules.
