Item A: Action item, Process decisions for director's recruitment

A. Action item: Meeting minutes

Commissioners reviewed the draft meeting minuets from the Aug. 17-18, 2016, regular EQC meeting. Vice-chair Armstrong noted an edit for a special meeting related to criteria for the director's search – he and Director Whitman noted the clarification regarding that item.

B. Public forum

The commission opened a 50-minute public comment opportunity at approximately 9:15 a.m. Twenty people submitted forms to speak in Ashland, No one presented comment remotely from the Bend, Pendleton or Portland DEQ offices.

- 1. Frances Oyung, Rogue Riverkeeper, presented comments in support of DEQ's work regarding MS4 permits.
- 2. Clair Klock, farmer and water conservation district representative, urged the commission to err on the side of human health and environmental well-being for all regulatory efforts.
- 3. Krystal Abrams, Beyond Toxics, presented comments regarding neonicitinoids and the deadly effects of these chemicals for bee and environmental health.
- 4. Josephine Warden, presented comments reading bee health and a need for a ban of neonicitinoids
- 5. Laura Bee Ferguson, echoed the comments regarding the ban on chemicals that kill bees and damage the environment
- 6. Kenda Swartz Pepper, Pollinator Project Rogue Valley, noted her opposition to the use of neonicitinoids and pesticides and asked the commission to make choices that support all inhabitants of the earth.
- 7. Carolyn Minson, Pollinator Project Rogue Valley, presented her concerns about pesticides and other chemicals affecting pollinators and other creatures.

- 8. Nancy Nelson, Pollinator Project Rogue Valley, provided a copy if information regarding bee deaths and other chemical harms.
- 9. Susan Ekstrom, Bee City USA, expressed her concerns for the pesticide and chemical damage to song birds and other animals.
- 10. Jim Thompson, Bee City USA, noted his personal experiences with pesticide exposure and read a copy of his comments to the commission.
- 11. Kristina Lefever, Pollinator Project Rogue Valley, presented comments regarding neonicitinoids and asked the commission to consider taking action to remove these pesticides from commercial availability in Oregon.
- 12. Shelly Candel, Bee City Canada, presented comments on the success of the Bee City program in Toronto and other Canadian cities.
- 13. Evan Rattle, OSPIRG, expressed his personal and professional concerns regarding the use of neonicitiniods in farm and residential areas. He asked the commission to consider a ban on these chemicals for environmental and human health.
- 14. Ceara Kornblum, OSPIRG and Southern Oregon University student, echoed prior comments regarding the requests to ban neonicitinoids and noted that the bioaccumulation of these chemicals has similar outcomes to the bioaccumulation of DDT and other now-banned chemicals.
- 15. Kieryn Eagy, OSPIRG and Southern Oregon University student, noted her concerns about neonicitinoids building up in soil and affecting all life.
- 16. Morgan Bechtold-Enge, OSPIRG, expressed her concerns about declines in bee and bird populations due to neonicitinoids use
- 17. Mike Freese, Associated Oregon Industries, presented comments related to regulatory obligations and concerns of Oregon's business communities. He noted his intent to continue to work with DEQ for meaningful engagement through the agency's budget process. He asked that the commission direct DEQ to reconvene the Air Toxics Science Advisory Committee to make decisions regarding air quality benchmarks and other policy decisions for air quality.
- 18. Jenica Faye, Pollinator Project Rogue Valley and Bee City USA (Talent), described the work that the Bee City USA group is doing in Talent to remove neonicitinoids from parks and residential areas.
- 19. Vicki Simpson, Ashland resident, presented comments in opposition to the Oregon LNG project proposed for Coos Bay. She asked several clarifying and informational questions of the commission and agency regarding the processes for the project.
 - a. Director Whitman responded to the questions to provide clarifying information for DEQ's processes.
- 20. Bob Palzer, Ashland resident and co-chair of Rogue Valley Citizens for Clean Air, presented comments regarding air quality issues in the Rogue Valley. He noted his concerns regarding prescribed burning being used for fire management in the Ashland Watershed.

Chair O'Keeffe closed public forum at approximately 10:15 a.m.
