Why this is important

Commissioners have expressed interest in evaluating the commission's meeting processes and protocol to foster increased engagement with Oregonians. DEO staff, at the direction of the commission, researched public

comment formats and mechanisms used by other state boards and

commissions.

Background

The Environmental Quality Commission's past practice has been to not take public comment on agenda items that come before it. The Commission does, however, set aside a time-specific public comment period at each regular meeting, known as public forum. During that time, a person may present comment on any matter, with few limits related to content.

This practice has led to frustration both on the part of commissioners and the public. By not allowing public comment on agenda items at the time they are heard by the commission, we are limiting the ability of the public to engage the commission. In some matters (contested cases, where only parties are allowed to participate, and rulemakings, where the record is usually closed prior to the commission meeting) there are legal reasons for not allowing public engagement. But on informational items and many action items (such as DEQ's budget), there is no legal reason for not allowing public comment.

Commission options for public comment

The commission may modify its processes, meeting structure and protocol at any time, provided that the changes do not violate public meeting law, commission rules, or Oregon Administrative Procedures Act requirements.

EQC may:

- 1. Keep its current process, allowing comment during a public forum at a set time
- 2. Modify its process, allowing topic-specific comment after each scheduled item, with an additional public forum scheduled for topics not on the meeting agenda

Action item: Public comment process at commission meetings Nov. 2-3, 2017, EQC meeting

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- 3. Allow public comment only on specified agenda items, as identified by the chair in advance (as the agenda is developed in consultation with the department), and drop or shorten the public forum
- 4. Adopt other practices, so long as they are within the confines of legal requirements

Practices of Other Boards and Commissions

The Board of Forestry and Land Conservation and Development Commission use an item-specific public comment structure, with additional time for unscheduled items, as described in option two, above. These bodies have regulatory authorities similar to EQC's role and responsibilities. Recent agendas for the Board of Forestry and Land Conservation and Development Commission are attached to this report for reference.

The Oregon Transportation Commission, the Oregon Fish and Wildlife Commission, and the Oregon Water Resources Commission all have a set comment time (similar to public forum), and also allow item-specific comments, as time allows (typically limited to three minutes per person).

DEQ recommendation

DEQ recommends that the Oregon Environmental Quality Commission modify the structure of EQC meeting agendas to allow topic-specific public comment after each item (except for contested cases, rulemakings, executive session items, and other items identified by the commission chair), with an additional period of 30 minutes for subjects not on the agenda, and that this practice begin with the January 2018 EQC regular meeting.

DEQ also recommends that the commission direct DEQ staff to consult with the Oregon Department of Justice regarding the modifications and notice of the meetings to ensure all public meeting laws and administrative requirements are met.

- Recognize that substance, not length, determines the value of testimony or written information;
- Endorse rather than repeat the testimony of others;
- Sign-in at the information table located near the entrance.

Written comments for public testimony provide a valuable reference and may be submitted before or during the meeting for consideration by the board. Please bring 10 copies for distribution. Written comments received before or during the meeting will be distributed to the board. Oral or written comments may be summarized and attached to the minutes.

The board cannot accept testimony on a topic for which a public hearing has been held and the comment period has closed. If you wish to provide comments to the board, you must sign-in on the sheet provided at the Information Table, located near the meeting room's entrance. (Note: All persons attending a board meeting are requested to sign in, whether or not they intend to provide comment.)

Three minutes will be allotted for each individual. Those wishing additional time for testimony should contact the Board Support office at 503-945-7210 at least three days prior to the meeting. The maximum amount of time for all public comments under this agenda item will be thirty minutes.

WORK SESSIONS: Certain agenda topics may be marked with an asterisk indicating a "Work Session" item. Work Sessions provide the board opportunity to receive information and/or make decisions after considering previous public comment and staff recommendations. No new public comment will be taken. However, the board may choose to ask questions of the audience to clarify issues raised.

- During consideration of contested civil penalty cases, the board will entertain oral argument only if board members have questions relating to the information presented.
- Relating to the adoption of Oregon Administrative Rules: Under Oregon's Administrative Procedures Act, the board can only
 consider those comments received by the established deadline as listed on the Notice of Rulemaking form. Additional input
 can only be accepted if the comment period is formally extended (ORS 183.335).

The Land Conservation and Development Commission

Oregon's seven-member Land Conservation and Development Commission, assisted by the Department of Land Conservation and Development, adopts state land use goals, assures local plan compliance with the goals, coordinates state and local planning and manages the coastal zone program. Commissioners are unpaid citizen volunteers appointed by the Governor and confirmed by the Senate. Commissioners are appointed to four-year terms and may not serve for more than two consecutive terms. The statute establishing the commission, ORS chapter 197, also directs that members be representative of the state. The commission meets approximately every two months to conduct its business and direct the work of the department.
