\* Exploring funding options"

## Other Notes

<u>Levels of effort for planning process</u>: Discussion was held on the possibility of conducting surveys and taking input from community groups. The Library Director suggested that surveying and extensive community input be held for future planning processes. The following observations were noted:

\*Surveying takes time, expertise, and money that is not available at this time
\*The Board identified a need for educating the public before they could provide
good ideas and prioritization for library roles and activities. To be effective, the
education process will also take time; more than is available in order for the
Board to meet other deadlines.

The Library Director recommended that surveying and educating the public as to current and potential library services both be activities or objectives to be considered in the action plan that is developed through this planning effort. In this way funding can be established for those activities in the next cycle of the planning process.
