5. Friends of the Center for the Arts Update (Boughey)

B. Project Description (a short description of the proposed program or project including for what purpose or how the CEP funds will be used and the location of the project):

The Sherwood Cultural Arts Commission, as part of their 2016/17 Visioning Efforts, have identified an opportunity for a Public Art Plan for Sherwood. As the community grows and expands its focus on arts and culture, there is a clear opening to begin plans for incorporating public art in community planning and engagement efforts. Public Art, art owned by the public, for the public to enjoy, is known to enhance community identity, to engage the public and to add aesthetic and cultural value to public spaces. Sherwood is at a prime time in its development to benefit from a Public Art Program, and to further engrain the arts and community culture in its identity.

With the intent of initiating this program with a clear vision and mission, as well as working with community input to influence acquisition and location choices, the Sherwood Cultural Arts Commission plans to work with a consultant to create an initial Public Art Plan. Funds from the CEP Grant will pay for the consultant's fees. It is the hope that with a clear and focused plan, the Sherwood Public Art Program will be a representation of the values, identity and spirit of the Sherwood Community.

The value and benefit of the arts in local communities has been a subject long debated; attempts have been made to find empirical evidence of the positive economic impact of art on local business districts and its contribution to the vitality of neighborhoods. While the debate still rages on throughout the country, the Sherwood community has undoubtedly shown that it values the arts and cultural experiences. Sherwood has shown this through investment in the Sherwood Center for the Arts, the robust local arts organizations and businesses, the award-winning school arts programs and its participation in a wide variety of arts events. A Public Art Program will take that creative identity that Sherwood has developed for itself, and give it visual, physical markers throughout the City.

PROJECT MANAGEMENT

The project milestones for the Public Art Plan will be community info gathering sessions with various stakeholder groups, which will happen early in the planning cycle. These sessions will bring together community stakeholders, internal and staff stakeholders and the stakeholders from the City Council, Cultural Arts Commission and Parks Board to get input on what the citizens of Sherwood would want to see in a Public Art Program.

B. Describe prior experience managing similar projects, including prior Community Enhancement Projects.

The Director of Community Services, Kristen Switzer and the Manager of the Center for the Arts, Maggie Chapin will oversee the project and work with the consultant. Both Switzer and Chapin have experience with consultant led project plans. The Sherwood Cultural Walking Tour, a previous CEP granted project is overseen by Switzer, and Chapin is a part of the planning team on that project as well.

C. What community resources will be used as support for this project (i.e. community, city-owned property, city departments, transportation services or other civic groups)?

Community resources for this project will be local citizen groups such as the Sherwood Main Street organization, and local arts businesses and organizations, which will be asked to participate in the community info gathering sessions. City departments and boards and commissions will also be asked for input or support, including: City Council, Cultural Arts Commission, Parks Board, Planning Commission, Community Services Department, Public Works Department, Planning Department, and others as needed. This will truly be a community project.
