Call to Order

Chair Wuertz called the meeting to order at 6:05 pm.

Approval of Minutes

Mr. Libal made a motion to approve the August meeting minutes as written. The motion was seconded by Mr. O’Keefe and all present board members voted in favor.

Citizen Comments

Mobile Speed Enforcement Program Discussion

This discussion begins at the 3:21 mark on the video.

- Chief Hanlon discussed the possibility of implementing a mobile speed enforcement program in the city through the current photo enforcement vendor and wanted the board’s input. He added that these units would operate 24/7, providing continuous enforcement, unlike officers who can only work so many hours a day. He indicated that the program’s cost is estimated at \$6,000 per unit per month, which would cover full operation and back-end processing, with the citation revenue expected to offset costs. He explained that it would be an annual contract, and the city

can end it after the contract expires if staff is not satisfied with the product. He also stated that these units can be moved every 30 days to cover different locations within city limits.

- Board members expressed cautious optimism, but raised concerns about the potential for temporary compliance spikes that may fade once the units are moved, emphasizing the need for data to confirm long-term effectiveness. There was a consensus that while the mobile units will help, they do not replace physical traffic calming measures. The board members endorsed moving forward with exploring this program but asked Chief Hanlon to continue discussions with the City Council and the vendor to finalize contract terms and operational details.

November & December meeting cancellations

- The November and December meetings were cancelled as both meeting dates fall on a holiday.

New Traffic Safety Requests

Request for speed limit reduction on Sunset Blvd — Request #2025-019 & Request #2025-019.1

Conversation for this request begins at the 40:21 mark on the video.

- Chair Wuertz stated that changing the speed limit is a lengthy process, and Mr. Sattler agreed and added that ODOT would need to be involved to approve the change. Mr. Libal stated that it took two years to change the speed limit on Edy Road. Mr. Amicci stated that he saw Chief Hanlon's presentation on mobile enforcement at the Police Advisory Board meeting last week and added that PAB members mentioned speeds on Sunset. The data showed that the top speed was 39 mph, which is in line with the posted speed of 35 mph.
- Chair Wuertz expressed that the issue the requester is bringing forward is that they want the speed limit lowered because it is a residential area and is a safety issue. The board reviewed various speed-related requests and the challenges of changing speed limits on arterial roads like Sunset Blvd, concluding that lowering speed limits is unlikely without strong engineering or legislative support. Ongoing and planned pedestrian safety projects on Sunset aim to improve safety without lowering speed limits
- Mr. Amicci made a motion to close the item as this request would be part of a larger project. The motion was seconded by Mr. O'Keefe and all present board members voted in favor.

Pending Traffic Safety Requests

Request for street improvements at Main/Division intersection — (Request #2025-003 & Request #2025-003.1)

- Mr. Sattler stated that staff have not analyzed this location yet and requested to table the discussion until January's meeting.

Speeding concerns at SW Washington to SW Meinecke by Sherwood Middle School —

Request #2025-009

Conversation for this request begins at the 54:00 mark on the video.

- Officer Pierce indicated that there was no change in the speeding issue and that he noticed speeders traveling in both directions. Captain Jentsch stated that other officers who patrol the area indicate that speeding is an issue in the school zones.
- Chair Wuertz asked if the mobile camera would make a difference in this area. The board agreed that mobile speed enforcement units could provide continuous monitoring here, though programming must accommodate school zone hours with variable speed limits. The board agreed to keep these enforcement issues on the agenda pending evaluation of mobile camera effectiveness.

Speeding concerns at SW Roellich/SW Eldred, requesting speed limit or stop sign —

Request #2025-013

Conversation for this request begins at the 1:02:48 mark on the video.

- The speed trailer has been up for a while, and the data does not reflect any speeding issues on this street. Officer Pierce has also not observed any speeding issues and indicated that it could be a perception issue, and it may appear cars are traveling faster than they are. A motion was made by Mr. O'Keefe to close the request with no action taken. The motion was seconded by Mr. Libal and all present members voted in favor.

Request for two additional stop signs at Woodhaven/Pinehurst intersection — Request #2025-014

Conversation for this request begins at the 1:04:38 mark on the video.

- Mr. Sattler stated that this location requires additional analysis, but he should have more information available at the January meeting.

Request to restrict parking on Smith Ave to only one side of the street due to parked cars impeding the view of oncoming traffic — Request #2025-017

Conversation for this request begins at the 1:05:19 mark on the video.

- Mr. O'Keefe stated that the City of Sherwood should have a response to these types of requests. Captain Jentsch explained that if parking is restricted in one area, residents will need to start parking in nearby areas, which will make parking more difficult for neighborhoods.
- Mr. Sattler stated that staff previously reached out to TVFR and did not identify any concerns with emergency vehicles fitting down the street. Mr. Amicci made a motion to

close with no recommended action from the board, but that city staff send a response to the requester. The motion was seconded by Mr. O' Keefe and all present members voted in favor.

Speed concerns on hill of SW Willamette St up to Division St, requesting extra speed enforcement, speed bumps, or speed cameras — Request #2025-018 (Lincoln)

Conversation for this request begins at the 1:08:13 mark on the video.

- Captain Jentsch indicated that the speed trailer was moved to the hill of the complaint location. He added that Lincoln Street shows average speeds below limits, and officers stated that there is a problem with stop sign compliance rather than speed. Councilor Standke stated it could be a perception issue as he also lives around the area. Mr. Sattler stated that staff could collect additional data on Lincoln Street. This item will remain pending until more information is obtained.

Councilor News

Councilor Standke spoke on the upcoming election on November 4th, the library funding bill on the ballot, and the 4% rate increase for Pride Disposal's services. He also added that residents can dispose of organic food waste in the yard debris bin free of charge.

Board Announcements (Chair)

Mr. Amicci asked about the paving project on Main & Sunset. Mr. Sattler replied that the Sunset/Timbrel project is underway, with preparatory excavation preceding scheduled grinding and paving targeted for late October, including planned full road closures twice daily for up to 30 minutes. He added that the closures will impact areas from the intersection of Main and Sunset west to the intersection of Cinnamon Hill Place. These improvements will support ongoing pedestrian safety and traffic flow enhancements in the area.

Staff Comments

- Ms. Chang discussed the school zone crossing assessment update and added that the City Council prefers the HAWK signals that command full stops over rapid flashing beacons. Council preferred half signal and RFB for all schools. An additional analysis is needed once staff has the funding. Ms. Chang will update the board in the new year when she has more information.

Staff will evaluate criteria and policies for selecting ped crossing treatments during the Transportation System Plan (TSP) update, balancing traffic flow and safety. Ms. Chang indicated that there are no monies available, however, the potential grant opportunities will be explored once the concepts are finalized.

Ms. Chang stated that the TSP update has progressed since April with multiple public engagement events and committee meetings completed; the plan is drafting existing conditions and public engagement strategies for winter. The upcoming Citizen and Technical Advisory

Committee meetings will finalize goals and public engagement plans by November 19th, with board members Jason Wuertz and Lisa Patterson representing the Traffic Safety Board. A new Youth Advisory Board, active since July, will contribute to youth perspectives to the plan, and expand community input.



Current posted speed limits are irresponsibly increasing risk to our community.

Dear Members of the Sherwood Traffic Safety Committee,

I hope you will accept this letter as the sincere voice of a concerned resident and father, seeking a safer environment for our children, neighbors, and all who travel through Sherwood's streets.

My name is [REDACTED] My family of 5 are Sherwood residents who frequently walk, bike, and play in our neighborhood and park areas. Over time, I've grown increasingly concerned that Sunset Blvd's current 35 mph speed limit is too high for a road that bisects residential zones, school zones, parks, pedestrian crossings, and recreational routes. Thus, I respectfully propose that the speed limit on Sunset Blvd be lowered from 35 mph to 25 mph.

Below I present the rationale, supporting data, and suggestions for implementation:

1. Safety for Children, Pedestrians & Residents

Sunset Blvd cuts directly through dense residential areas and passes near (or by) schools, parks, and community amenities. In such environments:

- Lower speeds substantially reduce the severity and probability of collisions involving pedestrians or cyclists.

- At 25 mph, drivers have more reaction time, and the stopping distance is markedly shorter.
- The presence of children (walking to school, waiting for buses, playing near sidewalks, walking to friend's houses, walking home from after school programs, etc.) elevates risk. A lower speed limit would be an effective proactive step in preventing tragedies (backed by irrefutable nationwide data that supports lower speed limits where frequent pedestrians/bicycles/scooters etc. are present).

2. Minimal Impact on Overall Travel Time

Sunset Blvd spans approximately 2.1 miles end-to-end. The following calculations were done without the presence of the current stop signs or activated current school zones:

- At 35 mph, a vehicle would cover that distance in roughly 3.6 minutes.
- At 25 mph, the same distance would take about 5.04 minutes.
- Thus, the incremental travel time is 1.44 minutes, or approximately 1 minute and 26 seconds.

In my view, the safety benefits justify such a modest increase in travel time for drivers. Even for cut-through users, the additional delay is relatively small, especially considering the increased comfort and security for residents.

3. Mitigating Cut-Through Traffic Concerns

It is true that many drivers utilize Sunset Blvd as a “shortcut” between major roads (especially when alternate main roads are congested). However:

- The modest time penalty (1.44 minutes) is unlikely to deter all drivers, but it helps signal that the road is a community street rather than a high-speed throughway.
- Coupled with additional traffic-calming measures (see recommendations, below), the slower speed limit can serve to discourage aggressive use while respecting necessary local access.
- It is more acceptable for drivers to choose alternate arterial roads for their commute rather than compromising the safety of children and residents in an attempt to save <2 minutes of their commute.

4. Precedents & Best Practices

Elsewhere in Oregon and across the U.S., communities with similar residential-school corridors frequently adopt 25 mph limits or sustainable speed zones. Evidence supports that lower speeds in residential and school zones significantly reduce crash frequency and severity.

Suggested Implementation / Supporting Measures

To bolster the effectiveness of the proposed speed reduction, I recommend the following complementary elements:

1. Clear signage and street markings
 - New 25 mph speed limit signs at all major entrances to Sherwood Blvd (north, south, east, west).
 - Road markings or “25 mph” pavement legends at regular intervals.
 - Supplemental signage near schools, parks, bus stops, crosswalks, etc.
2. Traffic calming features
 - Raised crosswalks or speed tables in proximity to pedestrian zones or school crossings.
 - Curb extensions (bulb-outs) or chokers at key mid-block crosswalks to visually narrow the road and slow turning vehicles.
 - Painted crosswalks with high-visibility striping, possibly with flashing beacons in heavy pedestrian zones (e.g. near schools).
3. Enforcement & community awareness
 - Work with local police to schedule speed enforcement operations, especially during school arrival/departure times.
 - Use radar feedback signs (“Your Speed Is”) to alert drivers.
 - Publish community outreach materials (flyers, newsletters, social media posts) explaining the rationale for the speed change, the modest time impact, and safety goals.
4. Monitoring and evaluation
 - Before and after speed and volume counts to measure driver compliance and traffic diversion.
 - Crash statistics review (pre- and post-implementation) to assess impact.
 - Community surveys to get feedback from residents, pedestrians, schools, and drivers.
5. Staged implementation (if needed)
 - Consider a pilot period (e.g. 6 months) with 25 mph signage and traffic-calming measures, then reevaluate.
 - Use temporary or removable signs and markings initially to test community impact before permanent installation.

Closing & Request

Lowering the speed limit on Sunset Blvd from 35 mph to 25 mph is a prudent, effective, and morally responsible decision that places community safety above marginal convenience. The extra 1.44 minutes per traverse is a small and justifiable cost for protecting our children, residents, and neighbors. The objective in making this adjustment is to proactively decrease risk to our community; and not wait until an avoidable irreversible tragedy occurs.

I respectfully request that the Traffic Safety Committee:

1. Review this proposal and the supporting data.
2. Commission speed studies, traffic counts, and safety audits if not already done.
3. Place the proposal on the next meeting agenda for formal deliberation.
4. Engage with residents, schools, and stakeholders for input and support.

I would be honored to attend a committee meeting to present this proposal in person if necessary. Please feel free to contact me to coordinate next steps or answer any questions.




